My Dear Sir

I took the liberty of writing you from Gosport previous to my sailing for this Country reminding you of the kind offers you were good enough to make me when I had the Honor of waiting on you in London, I again avail myself of this opportunity and trust you will excuse my so doing at so short a period as promotion in the Army is as anxiously prevalent in all ranks, this is the only excuse I can offer and which I sincerely hope is sufficient

I had the good fortune to share the fate
of the 18th June with my brave Countrymen
who fought that glorious action, when
the Captain of the Light Company was killed
and the Senior Subaltern badly wounded
I had the Honor of commanding it for
some hours, untill I was carried off the
field severely wounded in the face and
in the side, which I am at present
suffering under, the medical men
however give me hopes that I shall in
a few weeks be able to join my
Regiment - and more, an anxiety
