The Lord Chancellor, offering his most humble Duty to your Royal Highness, has the Honour to send the warrants for the Judges & their Associates to go the respective Circuits, to receive your Royal Highness's sign Manual, if your Royal Highness shall graciously so please.

The Lord Chancellor, having had Communication with Col. Macmahan upon the Subject of Mr Leach's and Mr Harrison's proposed Appointments, presumes to state that, in his humble Judgement, the Appointment of Mr Leach, as proposed, will, upon the whole, be advisable upon the very liberal Terms, upon which your Royal Highness



has thought of making that appointment.  
Whilst the Chamber was writing the above Sentence,  
Mr Leach has informed him that Colonel  
Inamaker has communicated to him your  
Royal Highness's Pleasure: and the Chamber  
has Reason to believe that Mr Leach will  
act most properly as to his Seat in  
Parliament. The Chamber also thinks that  
Mr Harrison may be, in many Respects, a  
most useful Servant to your Royal Highness:  
he would however humbly request that, for  
Reasons, which he will crave your Royal  
Highness's permission hereafter to state, that  
Mr Harrison should not be promised the Seat  
he was immediately upon his Appointment. The
