Dear General,

In the Report that I saw had to the Board
Report, by the command, upon the Memorandum Lieutenant
Colonel Murray's Memorial to them, I have confined
myself entirely to the point concerning the Superannuated
Lieutenant Colonel of the Life Guards, or regarding
Lieutenant Colonel Murray, not thinking it right to enter
further into the subject in a paper, that may eventually
come before the Public with that, unless by the Prince
Regent's particular Order, I see no right to interfere -

At the same time, I think it my duty, as the Prince
has referred the matter to me, to call His attention
through you to the peculiar situation of the Superannuated

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Lieutenant Colonel of the 1st Grenadier Guards, who certainly do
 stand in a predicament in that so other Officers, I believe,
 in any sense, are stood before; I have not that duty
 a certain degree of duty and takes a certain command of time,
 and a case with that being as by his Majesty's
 reserve declaration, set to consider themselves in a way
 since concerned but connected with.

The only reason that occurs to me is having
 occasioned this arrangement was, that the Majesty
 thought the duty to be too severe considering the
 attendance at least upon few Field Officers,
 that has the number originally belonged to
 per Corps; but the Majesty, having been pleased
 some that time to attend the additional Major
 to each of them, and having however ordered

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that the Field Officer of the Royal Regiment of Horse
Guard has equally than in that duty, it shall be
that it will open to the Duke Regent will understand
unwilling to call upon the Supernumerary Lieutenant
Colonel of the Life Guards for any further duty whatsoever
should it ever happen the same to all future
claims of a higher nature to that Lord to
