Mr. B. Gray has the honor herewith to
present to the Vice Chancellor the ^{induced} substance
~~of the~~ information ^{collected} obtained respecting Coronations.
He has not applied to the Herald's College, or to
the Lord Chamberlain's Office, lest the object of
Enquiry should be unnecessarily circulated,
there being reason ~~whether~~ ^{possessive} to doubt the attendance
of a Queen to depend upon any invitation passing
through those departments. It may rather be
considered to depend upon her name being
specified in the Proclamation, or upon her
intended Coronation being otherwise made
known by the King's ~~order~~ in Council,
as in the case of Her late Majesty. If ^{indeed} any
~~as matter of form, of which the Council books afford no evidence,~~
invitation be requisite, it seems most suitable
to the ^{rank} dignity of the Personage that it should
