

The Lord Chancellor, offering his most humble Duty, has the Honour to enclose the Form of the Declaration required to be made by The King according to the Bill of Rights (1 W. and Mary, Sep. 2. c. 2. sec. 10) upon the Meeting of the first Parliament next after his coming to the Crown, or at his Coronation, which shall first happen.

It is to be made (according to the Act) & subscribed, & repeated in the Presence of the Lords and Commons in Parliament assembled.

It must, therefore, be made, subscribed and repeated after the Commons have come, with their Speaker, to the Bar of the House of Lords.

And it is to be made, subscribed & repeated before his Majesty's Speech is delivered from the Throne -

It will be seen, in the words of the



Declaration, that it is to be "read" unto  
his Majesty, and, in the words of the  
Bill of Rights, "to be audibly repeated  
" by his Majesty."

It will be read to His Majesty  
by The Lord Chancellor

After it has been read to, and repeated  
by his Majesty, it is to be subscribed  
by his Majesty, <sup>and</sup> ~~thereupon~~ an engrossed  
Copy of the Declaration, and a Pen & Ink  
will be offered to his Majesty with  
all due Reverence.
