We have carefully examined the present
 state of His Majesty's health; we are not
 at ease respecting the embarrassment
 of which His Majesty complains about
 the chest - but nevertheless are so bold
 that His Majesty's existence may be
 preserved unless new circumstances
 of disease should arise - We
 earnestly hope and desire that His
 Majesty will avoid as much as
 possible every thing calculated to pro-
 duce anxiety of mind - and we
 are decidedly of opinion that His
 Majesty's frame must not be exposed
 to any great exertion in the way of
 exercise -

It may however be proper, when the
 weather permits, that His Majesty
 should take air in His carriage for
 two hours, daily - but we do not
 think horse exercise admissible
 at present. We wish to speak of

His Majesty's Diet - with some solicitude

and perhaps when we say that the
greatest care should be taken not
to quite or heat the circulation
of the blood, we have said every
thing which the occasion calls
for - Abstinence is neither necessary
nor proper - but indulgence
would be dangerous -

As His Majesty uses his bed as
a sofa we do not wish to inter-
fere with that ^{habit of} repose which
seems necessary to His frame.

Doctors' view of H. H.'s condition (by Sir H. Keightley)

Dec. 7 1822 A.A. No. 1052

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His Majesty from time to time in the
course of his life has been subject
to severe attacks of inflammation
about his chest - From the present
symptoms we are disposed to
fear that the heart has been
at some time perhaps involved
in part in such inflammation -
Under these circumstances we
explain the irregularity of the
pulse, the occasional pain about
the precordia - the tension
in the left arm, and the sudden
breathlessness which now and then
takes place; and produces anxiety

and alarm to His Majesty's mind.
Notwithstanding all that we have
here stated, we are decidedly of
opinion that if His Majesty adhere
to the rule of conduct which we
have laid down, His constitution,
naturally so good, may still
continue to preserve His invaluable
-able life for years. - Never-
-theless we put this on record
as a most confidential private
Document for Sir William Knight
-ton to shew that we are alive

for it does sometimes happen
that life is extinguished

The Gentlemen who were appointed Trustees of His Late Majesty's private property upon that melancholy occasion, most liberally submitted to His Majesty and the late Queen to grant an increase of that allowance to continue the Plan to its completion by printing this Catalogue upon which occasion His Majesty afforded an additional proof of his affectionate regard for the memory of his revered Parent and of his anxious study to promote an object which had so long engaged His late Majesty's attention, by sanctioning the proposal with his entire approbation, & authorizing it by his Commands, to be carried into immediate execution.

This account may with propriety be closed by a short extract from another private Letter of the same eminent character whose early assistance has already been so particularly acknowledged.

" That I may in any manner be able to promote so noble so regal a design you will easily believe me earnestly to wish.

The King under whom we have the happiness to live exerts his influence & his bounty for the general illumination & improvement of Mankind. His design is to mend the world by imitable example & to excite diligence by attainable praise. He leaves his character to vindicate itself & those honours which he scorns to buy, will be paid by voluntary veneration.

By a London letter this morning,
& from the best Authority, I learn,
that Mr. Wile, the Irish Minister,

need not tell you the magnitude
of the Irish Appointment in
any point of view, neither need
I bring your affectionate recol-
lection to the desire the King
expressed of placing me at

any of the Southern Stations
when H. Majesty made those
several Communications of
which you were the Bearer.
My Health, the Ages of my Children
all conspire to make me call
upon your best exertions to
befriend me upon this almost
vital occasion, to which I am
persuaded H. Majesty will
not be indisposed. I'll not
say one word more upon

the Subject your ²²⁹²⁰ feelings
will be a stronger stimulus
than anything even that I
could myself urge.

The horrible Outrage in
Dublin has further degraded
my unhappy Country. It is
deeply felt throughout this
District of it & still we dare
not risk the assembling of the
Country to express our sentiments
upon the most disgraceful

of all our Acts -

I am busily engaged in
attendance upon our Lamentable
Leprosy & have only time to
add the sincere affection
of your devoted friend
