Though you will perceive that it is under circumstances of great urgency that I have the honor to address you, it is not without extreme reluctance that I submit to the necessity of requesting your attention to the situation in which I have long stood in respect to the affairs of Chipmoy's annuity.

I was in hopes that the correct impression which Lord Meira entertained on the subject, and the friendly interposition which he intended between three and four years ago, would long since have led to a proper termination of the affair. Under that expectation I called upon Mr. Sparrow the purchaser of the annuity, to state the main points of the case in the form of an affidavit, which, after he had sworn to, I gave to his Lordship, who considered it as containing ample testimony whereon to ground my claim, and having done so, I willingly waited his convenience to act upon it. After a delay, that I could not account for, I reminded his Lordship of the friendly commission he had undertaken, and learnt that the delay had been occasioned by his mislaying the affidavit.

Persuaded however that he should be able to find it, he repeated the confidence he had in bringing my anxieties respecting it to a satisfactory conclusion, & in that state it remained till he was nominated to go to India.

The multifarious objects which divided his attention from that period to his departure, made me feel it to be extremely ungracious in me to press him on my affair, but it was unavoidable, and it would be ungrateful in me not to declare the extraordinary solicitude he bestowed upon the recovery of the lost document without which he could not proceed. His labours to that end, though often resumed, ended finally in disappointment, and that led me to address to him such a statement of facts as I conceived might be best calculated for his acting upon, at a period so critical, and I deem it very necessary herewith to enclose a copy of that letter to you.

The contents of that letter met with his Lordship's approbation and he considered the affair as placed on a footing likely to overcome all the difficulties of the case, and he assured me, that so prepared, he would forthwith urge the subject in such a manner at Carlton House as he trusted, and did not doubt, would produce a satisfactory termination of the affair.

A few days after this, he embarked for India, and in addition to the anxious expectation I have ever since been entertaining of the result of his efforts, I have devoted myself to the procuring such further testimonies in corroboration of the principal facts, as have fallen within my reach, and as I deemed it not unlikely I might find useful. Besides a second affidavit which I have got from Mr. Spenser I availed myself of Lord Donaghat's recent visit to London who readily certified to some important points, and having thus strengthened the evidence of the case, I have the mortification to be again served with notice on the part of the holder of the annuity,

that he means to resume proceedings against me in the Court of Common Pleas. In justice to the liberality of Mr Sparks the holder of the annuity, I must not omit to represent that near four years ago on his return from India he proposed to cancel his purchase on being repaid the purchase money and 5% interest. He had stopped proceedings ever since, waiting the result of Lord Baines' interference, which, being now deemed at an end by his going to India, is the inducement for again resuming those proceedings, on notice of which I applied to Mr Bicknell through whom I was in hopes of satisfying Mr Gray of the obvious mistake, which has governed his replies, and I know no way whereby that important mistake can be rectified, but that of requesting that you will do me the kindness and the justice at the same time, to run your eye over the materials which accompany this, including among others, my affidavit, whereby you cannot fail to be satisfied of the utter impossibility of your going as you thought it proper to do, to instruct Mr Gray on the object and intention of Mr Sparks's intended application to him, with any other view than that of making Mr Gray the medium for confirming to Mr Sparks the only fact which would induce him, or any man, to pay as he did, the full market price for an annuity, during a given life.

Your previous confirmation of its being with His Royal Highness's gracious approbation that Chiffney sold the annuity, left Mr Sparks only one thing more to be satisfied about, and that was, that the declared and perfectly understood intention of all parties would meet with no check or interruption from the forms of office.

It was that he might be satisfied on that head that you suggested the propriety of going to the Duchy Office to instruct Mr Gray as to what was intended and arranged, and I am sure you will agree with me that the intention which at that time was so perfectly understood by all, and by no one more clearly than by Mr Gray, and that the arrangements which were then considered as effective to the final security of those who relied upon their sufficiency, ought not and cannot be rendered nugatory by any subsequent forgetfulness on the part of Mr Gray as to your instructions, from which forgetfulness all the difficulties of the case appear to have arisen.

That the mistaken impressions under which Mr Gray speaks on the subject, originates in a forgetfulness on his own part of the instructions he received from you at the time, and not from any want of accuracy in the instructions you gave or from any want of just consideration in him when he received them, is rendered clear and unquestionable by the following simple facts.

1st It is established by Mr Spasher's Affidavit that he, from Mr Gray, actually did receive the precise assurances which it was your object in going to him, to dissent.

2^{dly} Mr Spasher's Affidavit, or indeed any testimony on his part, to that effect, is superfluous, because nothing can be more certain than that if he had not received those assurances from Mr Gray, he would not have advanced the money. Nothing can be more clear than that.

It is ^{not only} so obvious as to desire no increase of confirmation from any affidavit whatever, but it is so absolutely unquestionable, as to be sufficient to sustain itself even if Mr Gray or any other person had sworn to the contrary.

I trust my dear Sir you will see through the medium of ^{these} incontrovertible facts and the arguments which grow out of them, that Mr Gray's present impression is a complete variance with that which he entertained at the time he acted under your instructions, and perfectly obvious as these things are, they are not more so than the certainty of his not giving such assurances to Mr Spenser without the authority of the orders from you, which as before explained, you thought it right to go to his Office on purpose to deliver to him.

My motive for urging these very important points with so much earnestness is, that as Mr Gray's present erroneous impression can be corrected by no other means than your pointing out and convincing him of his mistake, no pains can be too great to satisfy your mind, (in case the recollection of the circumstances has been in any degree enfeebled by the years that have elapsed since the transaction took place) of the precision with which you gave to him those instructions, which it is so plain that he did actually obey and enforce in his communications to Mr Spenser, and which he could not have done if he had not (though he had now forgotten it) been directed by you to do at the time.

Mr Bichnell in his letter to me of the 3^d Inst observes that Mr Gray understood it to be a Pension only payable during pleasure, but I trust my

My dear Sir that you will make Mr Gray sensible of
his forgetfulness in this respect. I found similar
circumstances; the most conscientious man living was
to give evidence to that effect in a Court of Justice
upon oath, and if to that oath was opposed the
simple fact of Mr Sparker, ^{who was himself a professional man, and acting for his brother} advancing his money to
complete the purchase in consequence of what was said
to him at the time, no Jury upon earth however satisfied
of the integrity of the deponent, and of his belief that
he swore the truth, would hesitate a moment in deciding
against the oath of a man so palpably mistaken.

Mr Bichnell further says that all the receipts
given by Mr Sparker are expressed to be for a pension,
and that he signed those receipts as "Attorney for Sam^l
Chifney" and that Chifney's receipts were "for a quarterly
pension" but all this implies nothing more than that
Mr Sparker (being satisfied that the annuity for
which he was about to pay the full market price
would, according to the declared intention of all
parties be paid agreeable in all respects to the
terms of the purchase) complied with such forms
of office as were dictated to him, utterly regard-
= less of what those forms were, finding them as
he did, the necessary medium for procuring him
the quarterly stipend for which he was induced to
pay his money.

Concerned beyond measure at this
unreasonable but at the same time unavoidable
