

Memorandum - 9. Feb. 1830 -

Mr. Herbert Lloyd called, by appointment,
this Day, at Mr. Garrison's, in Spring
Garden Terrace, and was informed
by Mr. Garrison, in the presence of
Wth James Dawes, that the claim
recently made in respect of Two Clocks
stated to have been supplied to His
Majesty, when Prince of Wales, by Mr. Lepine
Clock-Maker of Paris, had been before
made when the Prince of Wales' affairs
were in the hands of Commissioners
appointed to settle D. Robt's Debt, - and
that those Commissioners having rejected
the claim, it was impossible to entertain
it at this period - upon which Mr.
Herbert Lloyd said, this explanation
was quite sufficient to satisfy him.

His with feelings of the greatest diffidence that I lay before you the accompanying correspondence which arose from circumstances I have an equal delicacy in alluding to.

It was proposed on H. R. H. the Duke of Clarence taking office as Lord High Admiral, that a commemorative medal should be struck. it was necessary that some person should undertake the management, which duty I accepted. I wrote in consequence the note No. 1. to the Marquis of Conyngham, and altho' by Mr Brist. reply, I could not ascertain what was His Majesty's gracious pleasure, I directed two medals of gold & corresponding

cases, valued 100 guineas, to be
prepared. The one H. R. H. the Duke
of Clarence paid fifty guineas
for, and presented to Greenwich.
The other, I had the honor of sending
with note No 2 to the Marquis of
Conyngham, for his Majesty's
approval and gracious acceptance,
and inconsequently received the
annexed gratifying reply from
his Lordship. The subscribers
were then numerous, and I could
hardly keep the Artists up, to meet
the impatience of demand, but
the unexpected retirement of
H. R. H. from office threw the
greatest damp on the transaction,
and I then found myself in a
situation of difficulty, and
responsibility, foreign to my habit,
and which I could not foresee,
that I stood between the public

and the artist, and that while the latter called on me to fill my engagements, and came down on me for large sums of money, I had to suffer it in quietness from many hundred persons, who, with few exceptions, no longer felt any interest in the matter, that while the subscribers who have paid, and not received the medal, ungrateful of the great, or any expense incurred, are clamorous for a completion of the work, those who have not paid, almost wholly decline coming forward. Then circumstances Sir, and having a heavy arrear of expenses, and debts to artists to meet, compelled me to do the mortification to my feelings, of making the application I did to you this morning, and which nothing but being so peculiarly placed could have obliged me to. Should on consideration you be of opinion


there is anything offensive in it, or derogatory to myself, I must again beg to recall it; if on the contrary, Messrs Coutts & C. bankers, Whitehall, are the trustees to the subscription, to whom, should it be allowed you will be pleased to direct the amount, fifty guineas, may be paid.

With many apologies for troubling you with a letter of such detail, but which I thought most unnecessary, to enable you to judge, and place the circumstances and application in a fair light before you.

* D.D. had previously made out one Receipt for the two sums to avoid the additional stamp, but as the Receipt specified both payments, he concluded that the end would be answered just the same.

Please I put down the Cost to the Disbursements of the Executors -

I have taken every precaution, in paying the almost respect I entertain to his Royal Highness - which I hope will succeed.




