

By command of His Majesty I apply
to you nearly three years ago for instructions
relative to a Picture I painted for the late King
and was favored with a call from a Gentleman you
sent (I believe your Secretary) who said that you would
call to see the Picture, but which I have ^{not} had the
privilege of doing. When I was sent. I took the liberty of intro-
ducing an account of that Picture.

My Lord Duke

I have just been favoured with a call from the Secretary of Sir W^r Houghton to say that the late King's Executors do not know how to recognise the Picture I painted for His late Majesty of yourself and Generals &c - I inform'd him of the particulars and he thought it advisable to recall them to your Grace's memory.

You will My Lord Duke - probably recollect bringing a message to me from the late King thus, the King desires me to inform you that He considers the Picture as His, and that you are to take your time to finish it, alluding to the Picture in question.

About three or four years afterwards I had the honour of waiting upon your Grace my Daughter being with me, when you asked me if the King had taken the Picture, to which I replied that the King was not ready to receive it, and wished me to take more time, this was through Sir A. Barnard. In the year 1822 I wrote through the Marchioness of Cunningham informing the King that the Plate for His Picture was finished and requested permission to dedicate it to him, to which through the Marchioness I recd a most gracious reply with the permission, whic. was tacitly acknowledging the Picture as His. again I presented the first Proof Print to His Majesty

at Bathurst Woods Sir A. Bernard engrav'd at the bottom were
these words (this Engraving from the original Picture painted for the King)
had that been improper His Majesty would have object'd to it, The
King went into all the minutiæ and return'd for answer that the
was very much præfided, and ^{not} to harrp the Picture.

I had two other communications from him through Lord
Francis Cunningham (now I believe the Marquis) and to the same
effect, the last run thus, The King say's that his Pictures are all paid
for and His Pictures all warehoard'd that he has no room to receive
or putt up a Picture at present; and when he was ready to receive
it he would let me know. But the Kings lamentable illnes
came at the time I reported his command respecting it.

As a collateral evidence, only two days after I received the Kings order
for the Picture, a deputation from the British Officers who had fought
under your Grace command wishing to present something to your
Grace as a testimony of their regard. This deputation mad me the
offer of two thousand five hundred Guineas, and all above that
sum the subscription amount'd to which they expected would be
doubled, for the Picture or their present to you.

The Empress Alexander sending me a diamond ring desir'd me
to tell him have the Picture if the Prince Regent did not take it.
The Prince of Orange would have had it if the Emperor did not
and another Monarch desir'd it, and all upon my own terms.

Therefore the whole transaction must go with toward's me by all Path's
has turn'd out unfortunate so far as to keep me so many years out
of my Money, a circumstance in the Arts which has no parallell
for above a Century and yet without the possibility of blame
attatching to any Individual.

In one of my communication to the King I staled that the Relation
would not be benefit by remaininges long without being fram'd and
a glas before it, altho' every possibl. care would be taken of it.
and I doubt not that had His Majesty not been taken so ill
I should have had an order to have it fram'd.






