Lord North, If every Man would maturely consider what is  
most for his own sake, he would conduct himself as the  
Solicitor General does on the present occasion; I do not  
mean by this to take away any of his merit, but to point  
out that it is judicious as well very handsome, and  
must make a deep impression on my mind to his  
advantage; I must desire that it be examined whether  
some mark of my approbation cannot be conferred  
on him on this occasion; but I decidedly decline  
the arrangement proposed the other day of vesting  
the Chief Justice of the Common Pleas for the  
Speaker whose adverse conduct cannot make me  
deem it either wise or expedient to place him  
in that Office, more particularly with a Foreign  
I authorize you to and this day for the Attorney General

his instantly getting the Great Seal, and that I wish

you will take effect~~  
I will offer him a security whenever he shall lose the

him tomorrow, when I will notify it by letter to  
the Chancellor, whose personal conduct to me deserves  
every mark of attention.

You shall on Monday receive a letter from me  
fixing the whole of this.
