so trusting a sum might easily be

stances thro' you to His Royal Highness  
for altho' it would be unpardonable &  
ungrateful to ask for any addition



to what has been so freely given, I could  
not help thinking that if any members  
of the Society contributed even so small  
a share, such a participation of the  
expense might lessen the value of  
His Royal Highness's bounty in the  
estimation of the Society —

Sir  
 In the application of the Prince of Wales's  
 Donations to the Literary Fund, I have been hitherto  
 unfortunate: for though I had agreed for a House in  
 Leicester Square, the People with whom I negotiated,  
 advanced in their demands of Rent & Indulgences, as  
 they became acquainted with the Circumstances of  
 the Society & the Interest which the Prince took in  
 it's prosperity. — That House has therefore been  
 given up, & the sub-Committee is looking out for  
 another.

But it is necessary to have your Permission.  
 Lord Chichester & you, by the appointment of the Society  
 are Trustees to the Donation & Lessees of the House; the  
 Society not being incorporated is incapable of being  
 Lessee; Lord Chichester with his usual Goodness re-  
 moved the Difficulty by engaging for it & undertaking  
 to speak to you to join him. The responsibility is very  
 trifling; for the term will be only seven Years; the



sent to Lays shall not exceed the Prince's Donation,  
the Money is in your power, & may, if you please,  
always come through your hands. The safe will  
then be in the power of Lord Chester & you; &  
it is advisable it should be so, for reasons which  
I have stated to his Lordship, & which he, I presume,  
has explained to you, unless your absence from  
Brighton may have deprived him of an opportunity.

That absence has, a little, disconcerted me; for I  
had intended to make a short Tour on the Coast;  
in which I should have endeavored to obtain the  
honor of some private Conversations with you, in  
the Intervals of the Festivities of the Pavilion.

The Donation of the Prince has occasioned a  
considerable Alarm; some of the reasons & possible  
consequences of which, I could explain in Conversation.

Almost every thing depends on the first Mea-  
sures taken in the House, & on the manner of  
taking them; & I wish to feel my way, with your  
Direction & your Assistance

Lord Chester is every <sup>thing</sup> that can be wished,  
respecting the Society, & the Prince & Patronage of it.  
But he seems inclined to devote himself principally  
to his private concerns, & to reside generally at  
Hammer.

If you should pass through Town to Brighton,

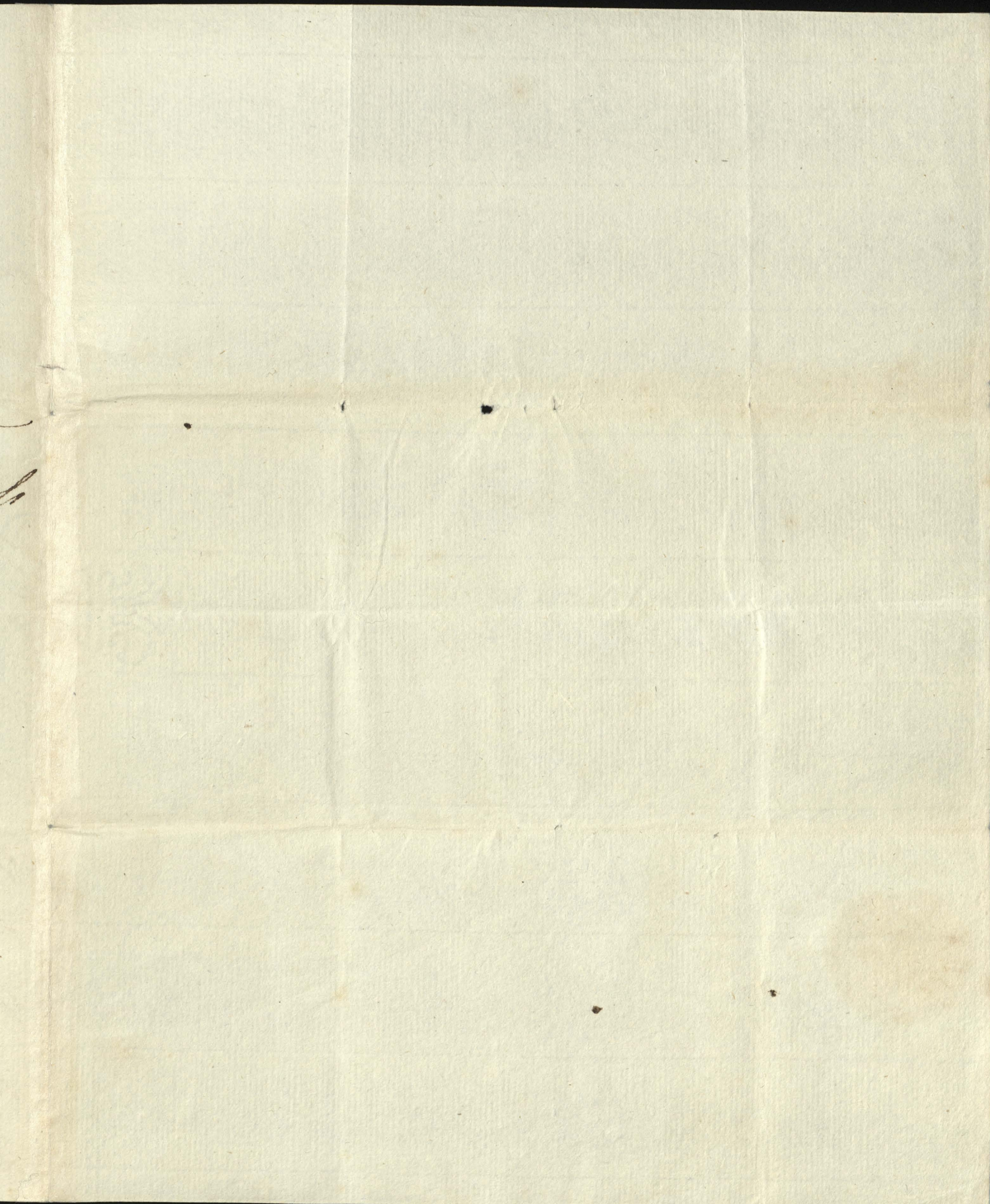

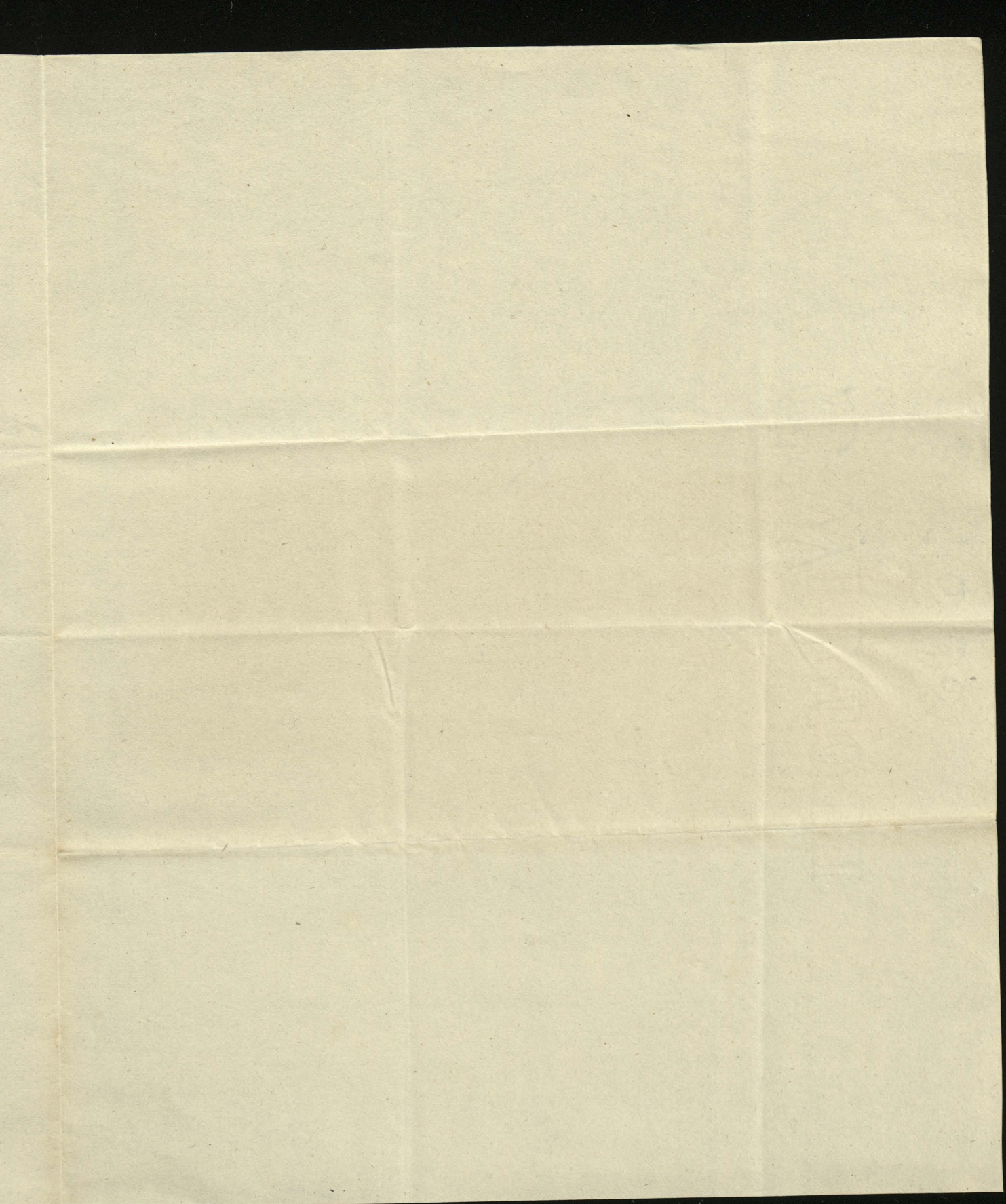
