AT a GENERAL MEETING of the Governors and Friends of this Charity, held at the Freemasons Tavern, on Saturday the 20th of May, 1820,

SIR W. W. WYNNE, BART., in the Chair.

The following is a short Abstract of the Report.

THE object of this Institution is to afford medical relief gratuitously to such of the Sick Poor, natives of Wales, as may be incapable, from their ignorance of the English Language, of obtaining that relief through the medium of any of the existing medical establishments, and to such of them as may from any other cause be found to be fit objects of the charity.

The single consideration that there are in this Metropolis not less than 50,000 Welsh, of whom by the best computation, upwards of one fourth are found to be *so circumstanced as to know only their mother tongue*, and that among so great a number there must inevitably exist a great proportion of unalleviated suffering and disease, must of itself make the *necessity* of such an Institution sufficiently apparent.

But when it is further recollected that the Irish and the Scotch, and even those connected with our colonies, have all their peculiar medical institutions, in various parts of London, the Committee cannot but ardently trust that the period is at length arrived when the poor Welshman will no longer be allowed to be the only individual without an asylum, where he *can make his complaints known in his own language*, and where he may receive that relief by the liberality of his countrymen, he is prevented even from asking elsewhere.

Looking moreover at the liberal spirit of the British public, at the noble institutions to which that spirit has given rise, and the readiness with which it has always stepped forth to succour the *distressed and unfortunate of all nations*, and on the other hand contemplating the strong national claims of the Welsh, especially the lower orders of that people resident in London; it is confidently hoped, that they will not on this occasion be backward to aid the Committee in these their benevolent exertions.

The Committee in submitting their Annual Report, feel the most cordial satisfaction in stating, that from March the 25th, 1819, to last March, 560 poor objects, natives of Wales, have received medical relief, (exclusive of nearly 200 at present on the Books) the greatest part of whom were not only laboring under the most painful and afflictive diseases, but likewise under circumstances of extreme distress and misery.

Mr. MORGAN, Surgeon to the Charity, ever anxious to meet the wishes of the Governors, with the kind permission of the officiating Minister of Guildford Street Chapel, Borough, attends on certain days in the week at the Vestry Room of the Chapel, to meet those poor patients who are incapable of attending at the Dispensary.

National Free School

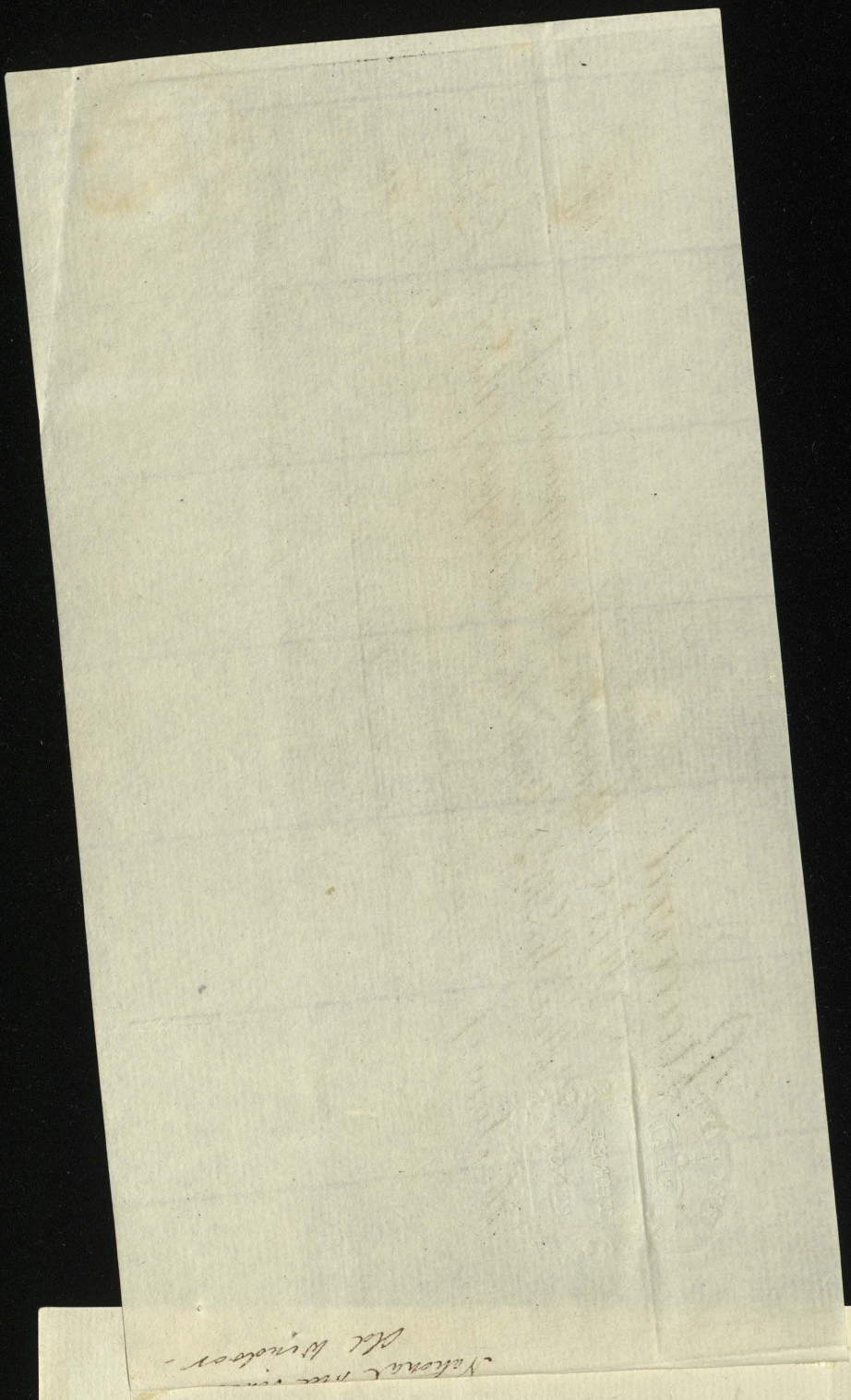
Old Windsor. June 23^d 1721.

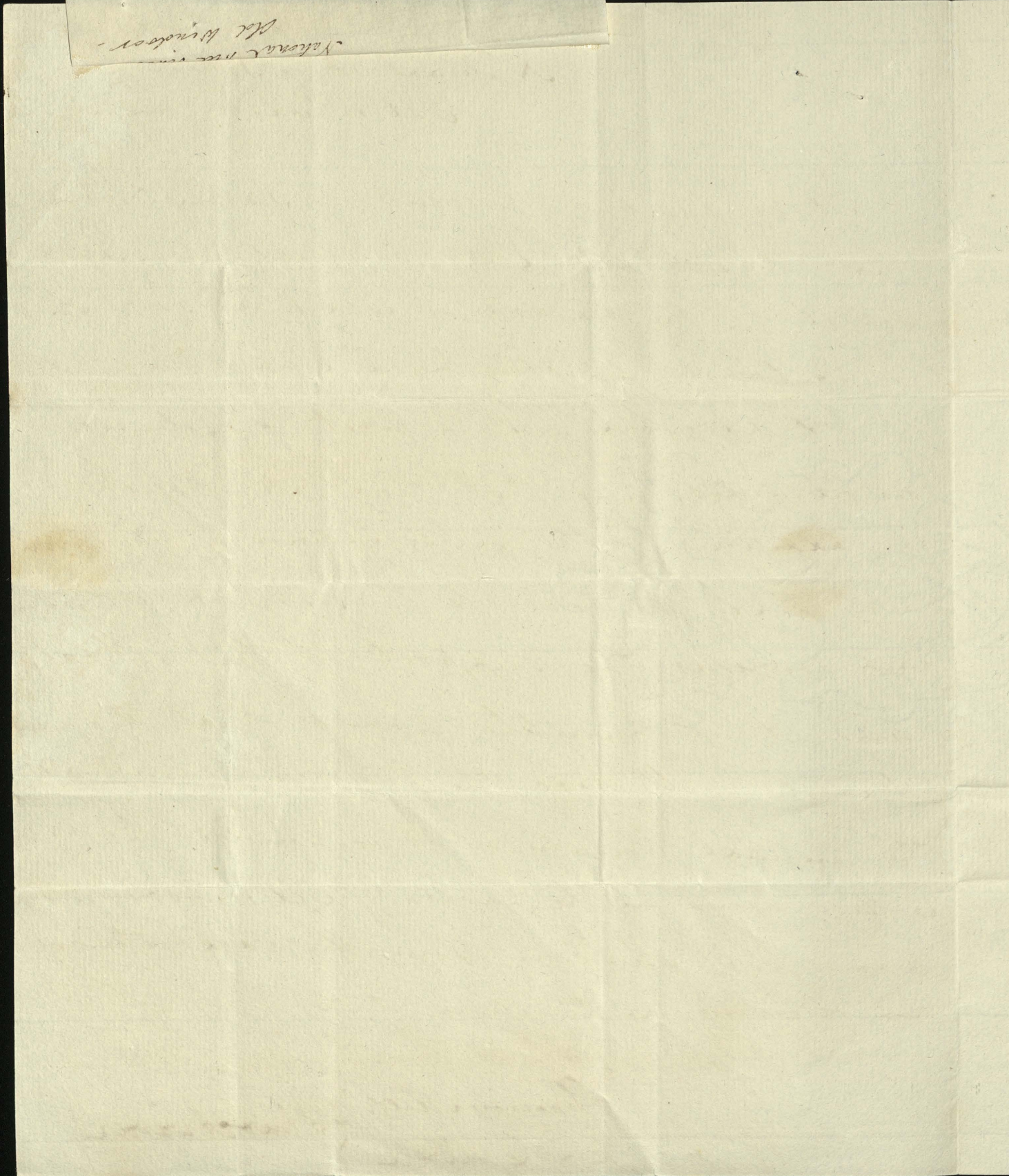
