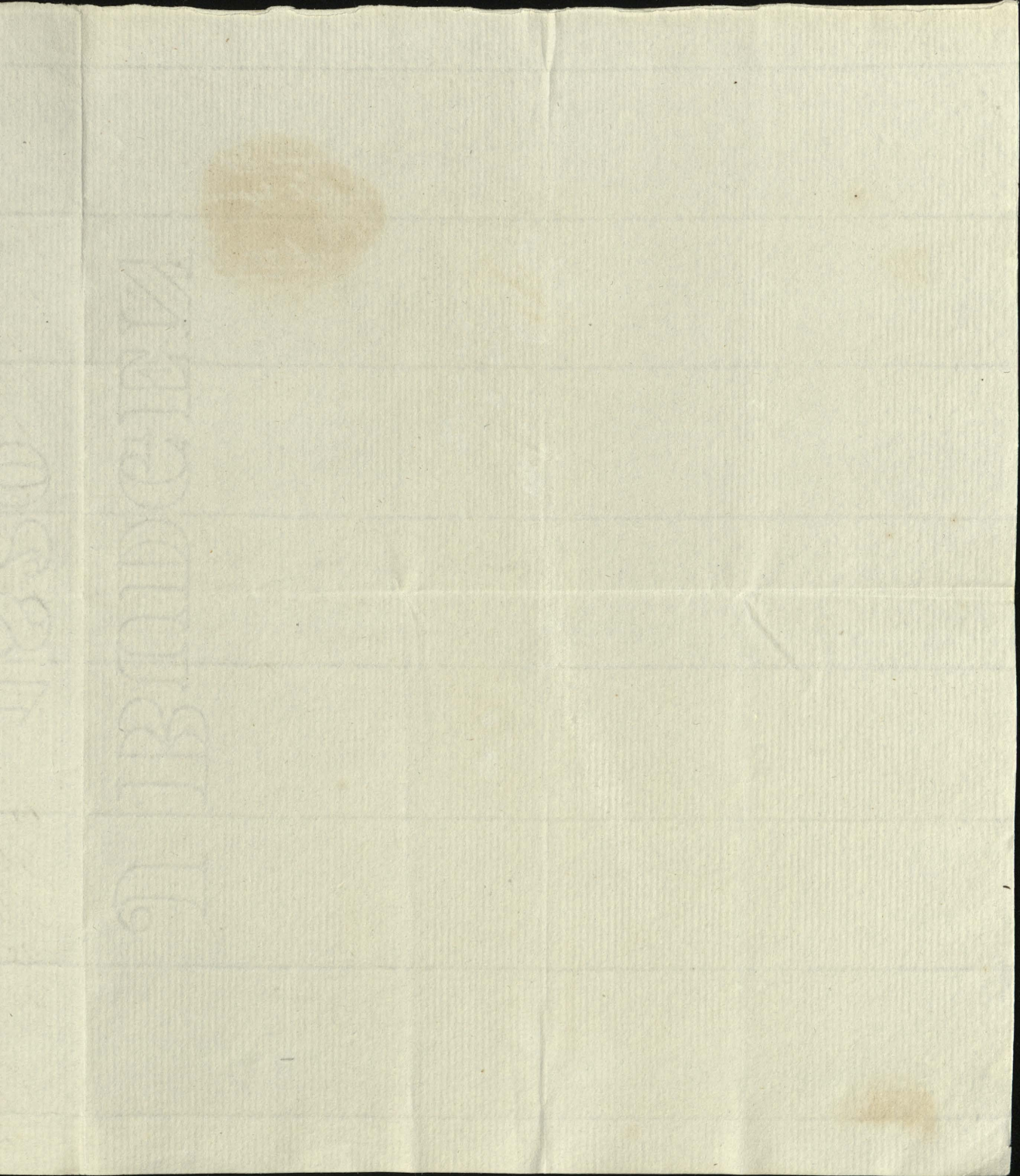

Honored Sir

On the Northern & Western Shores of Mounts Bay are numerous Children of Sailors & Fishermen, many of them Orphans, whose Fathers have perished at Sea, or are deceased. Melancholy is the situation of a Widow & Family when the hands on which they depended for daily support are sunk in the deep, or deposited in the grave! They suffer a kind of shipwreck with the head of the family, & are cast on Divine Providence & a humane Public-Parochial aid is readily extended in such cases, but lays no foundation for the future welfare of the Children. Some benevolent characters residing in the Parishes of Madron & Paul on the Coast of the Bay, commiserating the wretched appearance of many of the children at the sea-side, & aware of the importance of Moral & Religious Instruction to the forming of Loyal Seamen for the Naval & Merchant Service, first collected them together as a Sunday School, keeping them in some order on the Sabbath day, & causing them to attend Divine Service, & seeing that many of the Boys were scarcely able to leave the huts of their Mothers for want

of apparel, & yet were anxious to be at School, & Public
 Worship, they were led to consider of a plan, of establishing
 a Free School for cloathing, regularly 100 of the poorest
 of the boys, & giving them a very plain Education in Rea-
 ding, Writing, & Arithmetic, as they are all destined to
 the Sea — It was at length resolved to erect a School Room
 for the accommodation of the Sunday School, & Free
 School in the Parish of Paul. This design was advertised
 in the County Papers, & approved, many of the Gentry, Clergy,
 & Naval officers of the County becoming Subscribers
 - The Expence of this building is estimated at £300,
 The donations & subscriptions amount to £143^{..} 3^{..} 6^{..} &
 we anticipate a few farther Contributions, but as the
 whole will be insufficient to accomplish the undertak-
 ing. In the name of the Provisional Committee, I
 humbly, & earnestly ^{entreat} your kind interposition in your
 official capacity, & your humane intercession with those
 who now hold the Duchy of Cornwall in the behalf
 of an Institution, which, whether considered on the sacred
 principle of benevolence, or on the prospect it presents of
 local, & national utility, will I trust appear entitled
 to liberal patronage, & Support — On the other side, I
 have added the names of the principal Donors, and
 subscribers, & also those of the Provisional Committee,
 Submitting the whole to your generous solicitude.

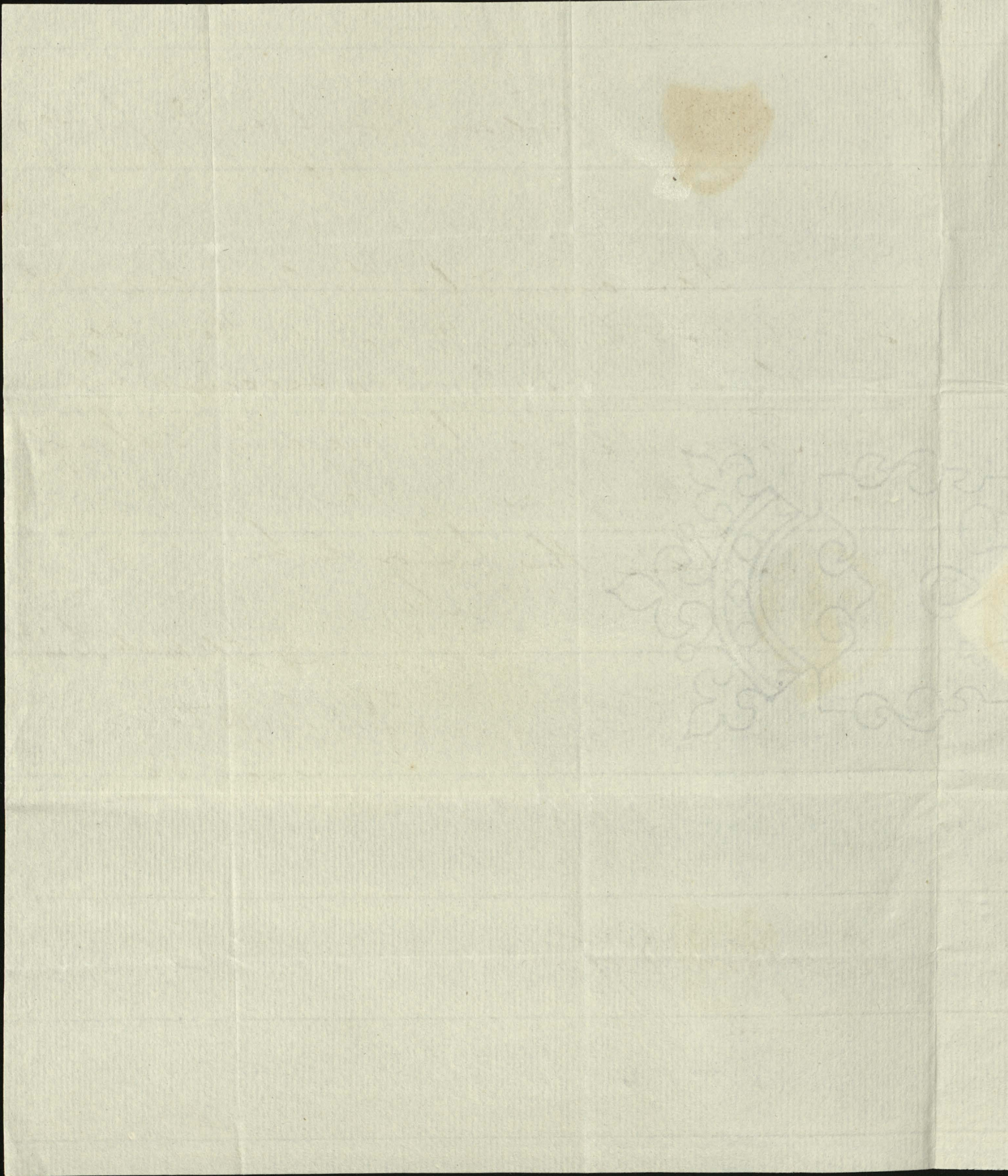

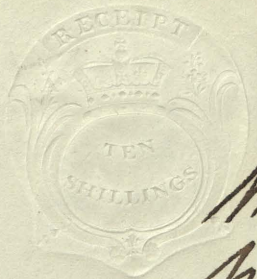

It appears that the amount of loss is about £9597. and that of money subscribed about £3000 - The number of Individuals deprived, some totally & others partially of their Subsistence, clothing & every necessary of life, between

between four & five hundred. I think I
before said that the largest sum subscribed is
100 Guineas

I regret exceedingly my absence from London
at this time, if it should at all protect the
period at which His Majesty maybe pleased
to show my mark of His Royal Bounty to these
poor people, more especially, as I cannot
but anticipate that it may operate very
beneficially, by inclining others to follow so
excellent an example.

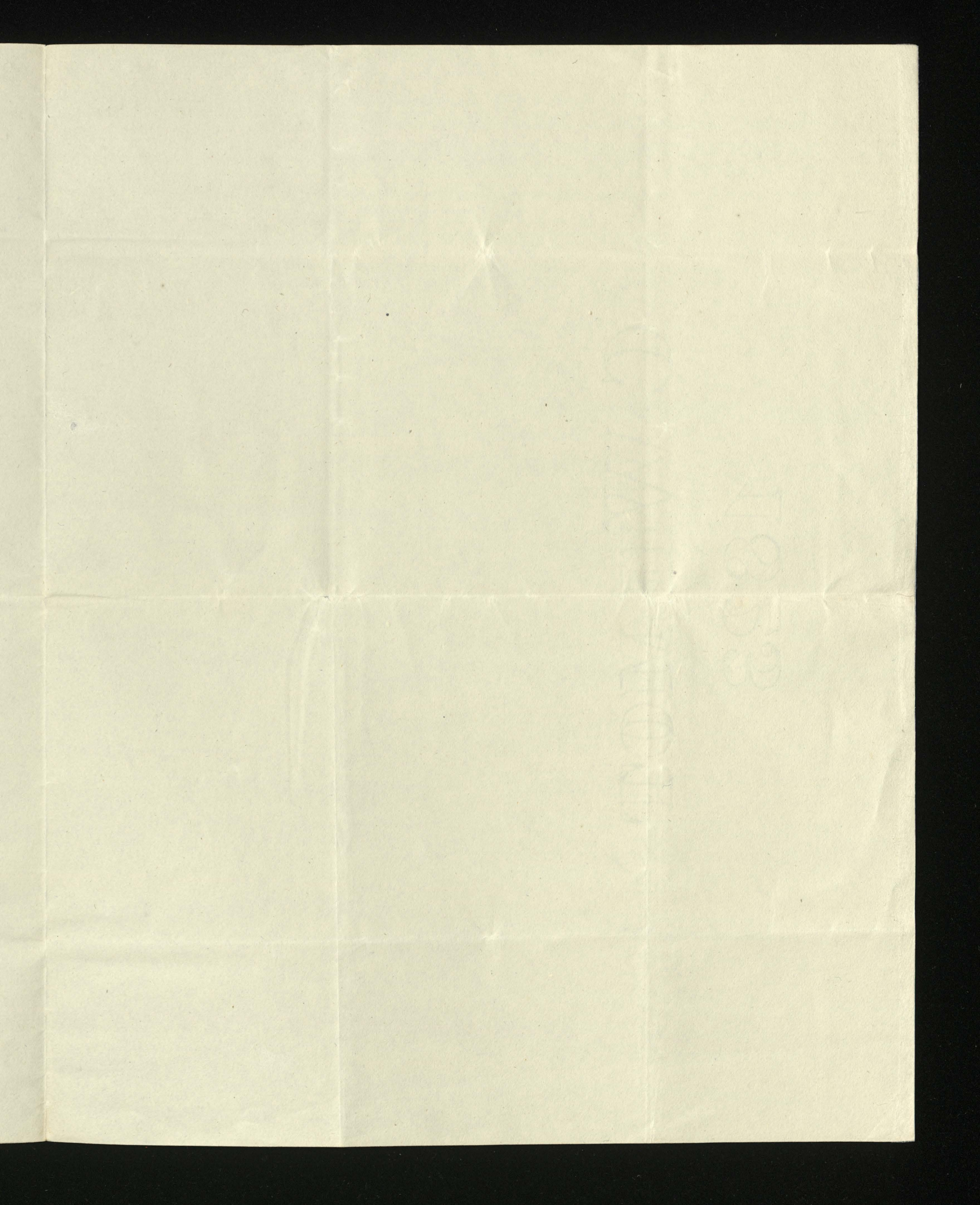

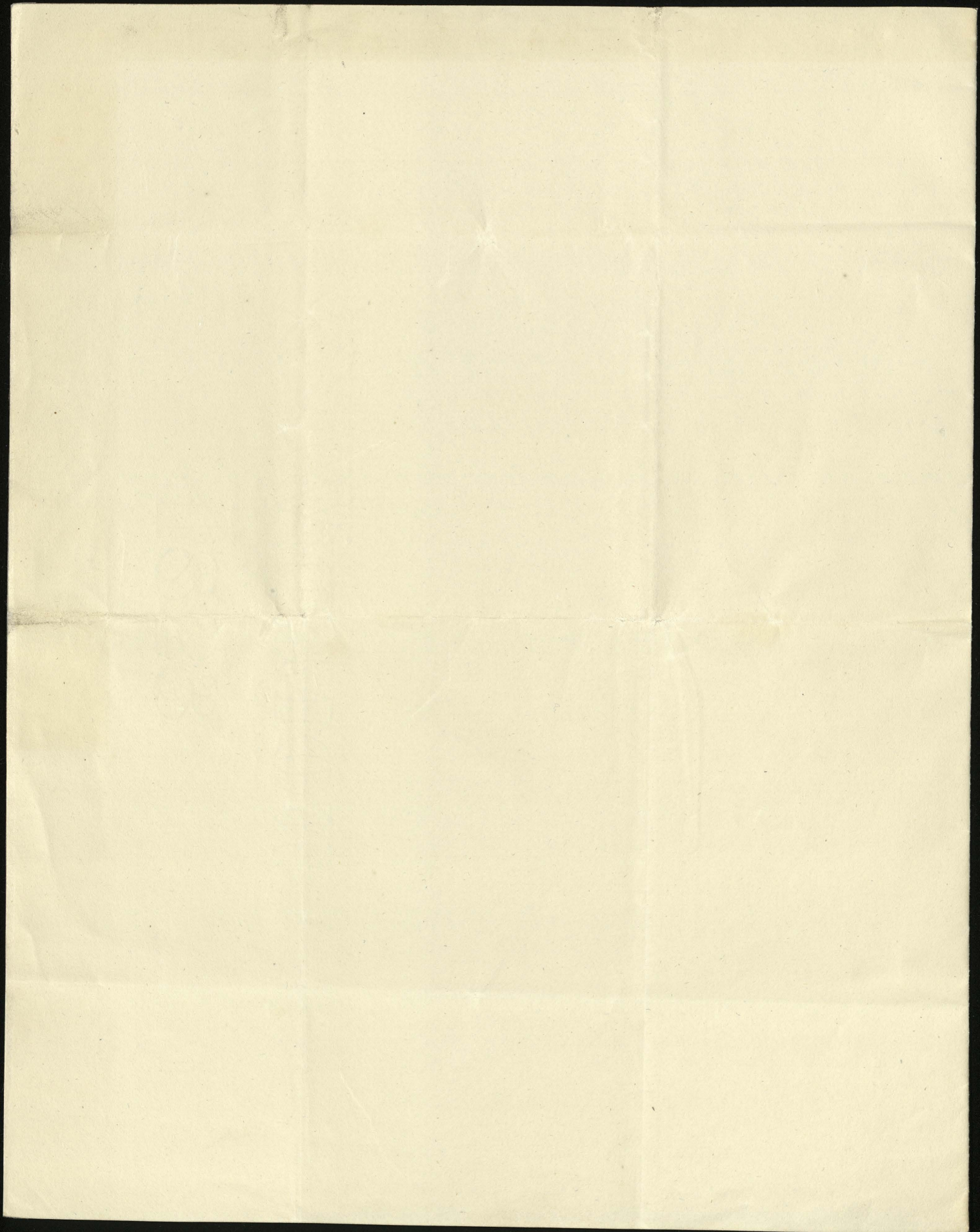

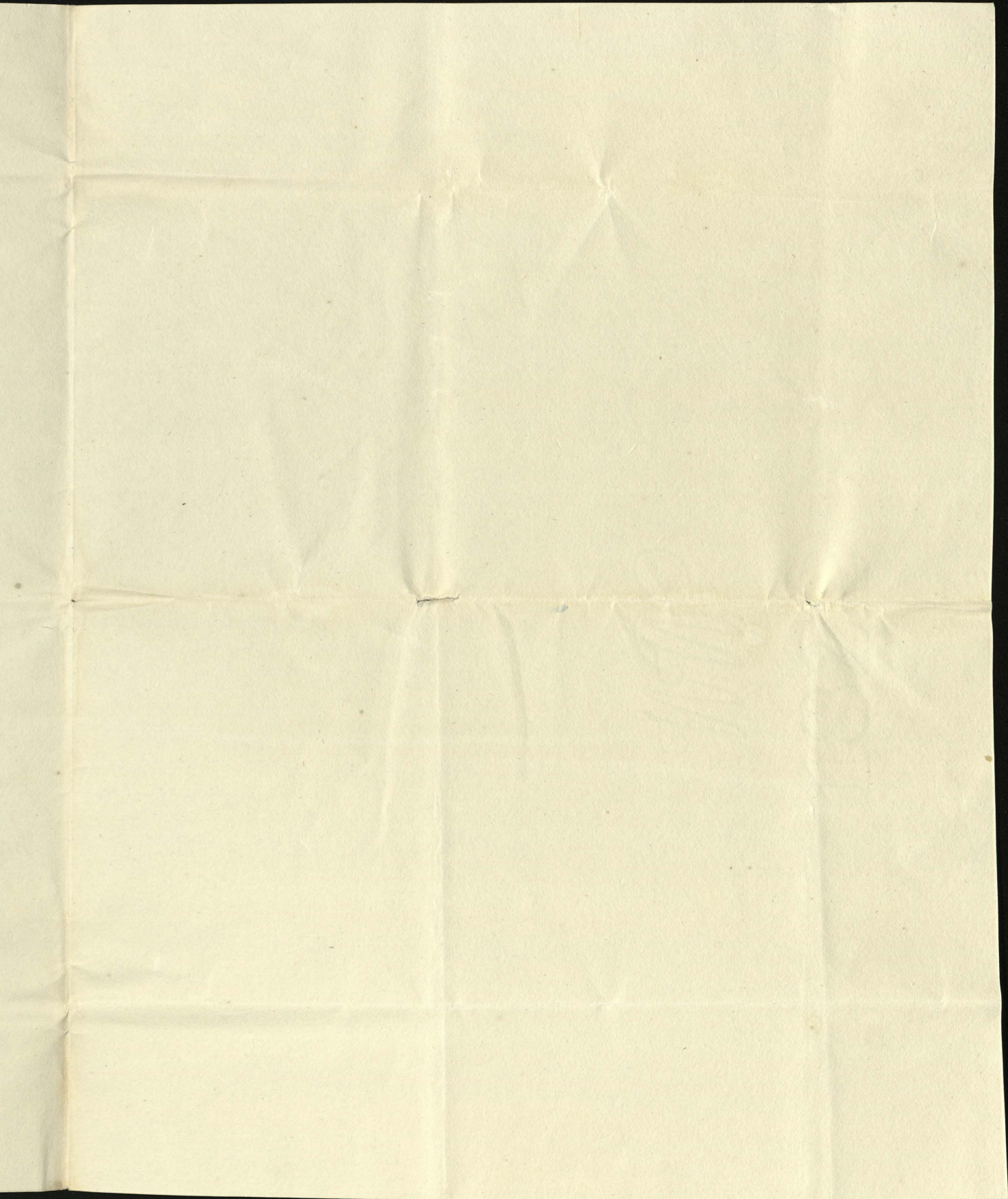

Present His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury
in the Chair.

"His Grace the Archbishop of
Canterbury informed the Board, that
His Majesty had been graciously
pleased to make a Donation of
One Thousand Pounds to the Funds
of the Society."

"Ordered, that it be referred
to the Sub Committee for raising
subscriptions to consider the best
use to be made of the countenance

"graciously shewn to the Society, His
"Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury
"having condescended to offer to sign
"as President, and deliver to each of
"the members of the Royal Family
"a letter soliciting the countenance of
"their Royal Highnesses to the objects

"to draw up a suitable letter for
"His Grace's signature".

Extract from the proceedings

pointed for the purpose of pro-

"His Majesty having been graciously
"pleased to make a Donation of One
"Thousand Pounds to the Society for
"promoting the enlargement and building
"of Churches and Chapels, the Com-
"mittee are encouraged most respectfully
"to lay before Your Royal Highness
"the following Statement. The Society
"confining its operations to the very
"numerous cases to which Parliamentary
"grants for building new Churches
"are by law inapplicable, has by
"the expenditure of £83,745. been
"the cause of providing Church-room
"to the extent of 109,952. Sittings
"of which 81,586, are for the poor."

"The Society having thus fully
"proved, how much good it is ca-
"pable of accomplishing and its funds
"being now utterly inadequate to meet
"the many pressing claims which con-

"continue to be made upon them. - The
"Committee, previously to a further ap-
"peal to the Public, venture to submit
"the Situation of the Society to the
"favorable consideration of Your Royal
"Highness."

Sir

I called at your house by direction of the Committee of the Society for promoting the enlargement and building of churches and Chapels, to make known to you, that His Majesty's gracious donation to the funds of the Society, in the year 1825, of £1,000 remains unpaid.

The Committee instructed me, to ask the favor of your instructions, as to the mode which should be adopted in reference thereto. - The funds of the Society are now almost exhausted; while claims of great importance continue to present themselves, and hence it is most desirable, to collect every outstanding donation,

in order that they may as effectually as possible, answer the benevolent intentions of His Majesty.
