





The non-existence of some Public Institution, established for the purpose of rendering pecuniary aid to distressed members of the Literary profession, but more especially to Reporters and Gentlemen connected with the Public Press of the Empire, has long been viewed with feelings of extreme regret by all classes of persons who take an interest in the well-being and prosperity of the Literature of our Country.

It is under such feelings, and with an anxious desire to promote some design to carry into effect the establishment of a LITERARY BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION (without intending, even remotely, be it understood, to set up a rival in opposition to that highly praiseworthy Institution, "The Literary Fund Society"), that I have roughly sketched the outlines of a plan, which I beg leave to submit to you for your consideration; and if you think favourably of the hints I have thrown together, and of the practicability of their being carried into effect, any assistance, on your part, in giving efficiency to my suggestions, would be rendering an invaluable service to the members of the Republic of Letters.

In the event of the establishment of such an Institution, I would gladly give up my time and services to assist in its formation, and perform the duties of Honorary Secretary, in order to co-operate with other friends to Literature, fully to carry into effect those plans, and bring to maturity the LITERARY ASSOCIATION, which I have suggested.

SUGGESTIONS, &c.

FOR FOUNDING AN INSTITUTION, AND PROVIDING A FUND, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ADMINISTERING RELIEF AND PECUNIARY ASSISTANCE TO MEN OF LETTERS, THEIR WIDOWS, AND CHILDREN, WHOSE NECESSITIES AND MISFORTUNES REQUIRE THE EXERCISE OF PUBLIC CHARITY AND PRIVATE BENEVOLENCE.

It is proposed that an Institution be established under the name of "The United Literary Benevolent Association."—Its funds to be appropriated to the use of members only; and, as a qualification to become a member, the person, making application, must be connected, in a literary point of view, with a newspaper, or some other periodical work, either as editor, reporter, translator, corrector of the press, &c., or, in a similar manner, engaged in the literary department of any such publications within the united kingdom.

The Institution to be supported by the annual subscriptions of its members; by the contributions of the affluent in the literary world; and by the public, generally, who may be so disposed.

If we except "The Incorporated Society for the Management and Distribution of the Literary Fund," there is no Institution in the united kingdom having for its object the rendering of pecuniary assistance to distressed literary merit; but "to entitle persons to come under the consideration of the Literary Fund Society', for relief, sufficient testimonials of their having written and published some literary work of a respectable character must be produced;" and, therefore, those individuals for whose benefit the establishment of "The United Literary Benevolent Association", is suggested are, generally speaking, rendered incapable of partaking of the benefits of that ("The Literary Fund") society: for, although there be hundreds of literary men engaged in the various departments of newspapers, magazines, reviews, &c.—men possessing abilities of the very first order, and ranking amongst the most celebrated and eminent of the literati of the day—yet, perhaps, scarcely fifty of these are to be found who have "written and published a literary work" in a detached form, their time being fully and industriously occupied in fulfilling those duties they are called upon to perform, in consequence of the extremely varied nature of their engagements upon a public paper. Therefore, the establishment of "The United Literary Benevolent Association" could not be viewed in the light of a rival to "The Literary Fund Society;" but rather as a humble imitator of those highly praiseworthy and charitable intentions which first excited its benevolent founders to so beneficent, so noble, and so Christian an undertaking.


The exact number of literary works which are issued periodically from the press could only be obtained with very considerable difficulty; and, therefore, no correct estimate can be made of the number of persons actually engaged in the literary department of such publications. But, with regard to newspapers, we have much better means of ascertaining the fact, and of judging, by rough computation, of the probable number of individuals so engaged upon them.


It appears that the various newspapers published in London amount to about 40; in the country, 137; in Ireland, 54; in Scotland, 31—making, together, 262 newspapers published throughout the British isles. Therefore, only computing that eight persons are actually engaged upon each publication as literary assistants (which number is considerably under the average, some papers having from fifteen to twenty-five persons thus engaged), it appears that upwards of TWO THOUSAND persons of education and respectability are deriving their daily subsistence from so precarious a property as a newspaper—a property which is subject, in "one little month," to be reduced in value, (by fifty different causes acting upon it in as many different ways,) forty or fifty per cent., and, sometimes, absolutely ruined! The only thing, then, to be done is to reduce the expenditure, and the first sacrifice is invariably some portion of its literary dependents, who are thus thrown out of employ, with their wives and families (relying upon the successful exercise of their literary talents) deprived of the means of common support. "To dig they cannot, and to beg they are ashamed;" and their last resource has been, but too frequently, either the dreadful alternative of beggary, and starvation on the one hand, or the equally disgraceful and degrading humiliation of becoming a pauper for parish alms on the other. If proof were wanting, numerous instances might be adduced, and many of recent occurrence, where distress, arising from illness, and other uncontrollable causes, has reduced the most respectable and talented of literary dependents upon the periodical press, to seek an asylum within the walls of the parish poor-house. His spirit thus becomes broken, and the inherent and natural pride of an honest, though unfortunate man, receives a shock from which it never recovers.

The objects contemplated by this association (should it, for the ultimate benefit of literary men of every grade in society, fortunately be brought to maturity) would be to provide a Fund to be apportioned for the relief of its sick and distressed members; such relief to be extended to their widows and children; but no persons except members, their widows, and children, to participate in its benefits.

The numberless evils, of a pecuniary nature, to which literary men (in a greater proportion than members of any other class or profession) are subject, would, in a great measure, by the establishment of such an institution, be effectually removed; the remedy for those evils being in the hands of those who (although now living in comparative affluence) may one day, perhaps, be in a situation to require the aid of pecuniary assistance from those funds which they are now called upon to use their best exertions to create for the benefit of their fellow-labourers in the same vineyard—the whole Literary Community of the united kingdom.

PROSPECTUS OF AN INSTITUTION

FOR

THE CURE OF CATARACT,

AND OTHER DISEASES OF THE EYE;

UNDER THE

AND

SUPPORTED BY VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS.

So important and engrossing is the class of Ocular Diseases, to which the lower and industrious orders of the community are unfortunately most exposed, from the constant application of their eyes in various mechanical employments; such nice attention and skill are required in their operations; and so apt are they, when neglected or improperly treated, to prove permanently detrimental, or wholly destructive, to sight; that it has been deemed expedient to appropriate distinct public charities for their exclusive management: and the incalculable benefits which the afflicted poor have derived from them, fully attest the propriety and utility of their establishment.

Notwithstanding the existence of three large Eye Infirmaries in this metropolis, the overwhelming crowd and pressure of importunate applicants urgently call for further accommodation of a similar description. In proof of the inadequate means at present provided for our distressed fellow-creatures, who seek for and stand in need of assistance, for the various diseases of the organ of vision, it is sufficient to state, that upwards of five thousand cases were admitted to one only of these Establishments in the course of the last year! And to this number, in estimating the amount of ophthalmic suffering, may probably be added several hundreds more, who, from the multitude of patients, and from the comparatively short period necessarily allotted to the consideration of the cases, are constrained to withdraw, without participating in the benefits of the Charity! Another confirmation, if indeed any were required, of the necessity for supplying an additional source of relief, may be derived from the assemblage of pitiable objects who solicit Mr.

Stevenson's gratuitous advice, although obliged to procure the remedies prescribed at their own expense, which they cannot purchase without submitting to the severest privations.

With the view to relieve the sister establishments from the most burthensome and oppressive class of patients, and the conviction that the treatment of Cataract demanded a closer investigation than it had previously obtained, and was susceptible of great improvement, Mr. Stevenson was induced, under the sanction and encouragement of Royal Patronage, to organise, in 1815, a private charity, designated, "Institution for the Cure of Cataract." Such was the extended and increasing reputation which in a few years it had acquired, and so great the number of indigent patients from various parts of the country, that Mr. Stevenson was occasionally obliged to operate upon several of them in a day, when continued indisposition compelled the founder most reluctantly to close the door of the Institution; not however until, by the extensive opportunities for observation afforded by the Charity, and his private practice, he had been enabled to obviate many of the defects of, and to introduce important alterations into, the prevailing modes of treatment.*

By the suspension of his public professional duties as connected with the Institution, the simultaneous discontinuance of his "Lectures on the Eye and Ear," and the adoption of proper remedial measures, having at length completely regained his health, Mr. Stevenson is again willing, should the proposal meet with due support, to second the efforts of the conductors of the several Eye Infirmaries, by devoting a portion of his time and experience to the gratuitous relief of the poor. This object he proposes to accomplish, by the revival of his former private Institution, in a public form, and on a more comprehensive scale, for which the present period seems peculiarly auspicious, such a Charity being much wanted, and very convenient premises in every respect adapted for the purpose being attainable on highly advantageous terms.

The plan in contemplation includes under its arrangements the medical and surgical treatment of every Disease of the Eye; but it is at present intended to receive, as in-door Patients,

those only who are afflicted with Cataract. In making this public tender of his services, Mr. Stevenson's leading object is, to give the indigent who labour under Cataract the opportunity to avail themselves of his highly successful method of removing the disease, in its first stage, viz. so soon as an inconvenient dimness in the sight is found to exist, instead of causing the patient to wait months or years for the ripening of the Cataract, a preparation requisite under the old modes of treatment; during the greater part of which period, the unhappy patient remains a heavy burthen to his family, or parish, from his daily decreasing ability to gain the means of his humble subsistence. It is not, however, meant to circumscribe the treatment to this primary stage of Cataract; for, when the disease has been allowed to proceed until fully formed, and the patient has become blind, recourse will be had to one or other of the common operations of Couching, or Extraction.

The Charity being designed for the relief of a helpless and highly interesting class of Patients, the benevolent are respectfully but earnestly entreated to co-operate in its establishment and support. And as a further inducement, may be stated the intention of Mr. Stevenson to extend the benefits of the Charity over a wider surface, by making the Institution subservient to the instruction of the Junior Branches of the Profession, in the scientific treatment of the various Diseases of the Eye.

To facilitate the admission of patients, it will only be required of them to produce a recommendation from a Subscriber, or from the Minister, Churchwarden, or Overseer of the parish where they reside.

Annual subscribers of one guinea, or contributors of 10 guineas or upwards, will have the privilege of keeping in succession one patient at a time under the care of the Institution.







- 2. Since that period, 16895 persons have been cured and relieved; of these 550 were restored to sight by the operation for Cataract and Closed Pupil; and the eyes of many infants saved by timely application for advice.
- 3. This Institution is supported by Life and Annual Subscriptions. A contribution of Fifty Guineas, or an Annual Subscription of Five Guineas, entitles the Donor to be balloted for as a Vice-President. A Subscriber of Ten or Twenty Guineas paid at once, or within the year, is a Life Governor. A Subscriber of One or Two Guineas annually, is an Annual Governor. Each Governor has the right of keeping constantly under the care of the Charity, Out-Patients, and of recommending In-Patients.
- 4. All Sailors and Soldiers, their Wives and Children, Pensioners, or otherwise discharged the King's Service, will be permitted to claim the benefit of the Institution, on their own application; and all Poor Persons in imminent danger of loss of sight, will be received on their presenting themselves, and will be supplied with Letters of Recommendation, belonging to several of the Governors who are absent from London, and humanely appropriate them in this manner.

REPORT of the COMMITTEE of MANAGEMENT for the Year ending 31st MAY, 1830.

DURING the last year 1624 persons, of all ages, have been admitted to the benefits of the Charity, making a total of 16895 since its institution. Of these 550 have been restored to sight by the different operations for Catalact, some who have been born blind, and some at a very advanced period of life, and after many years of blindness. Several of these old soldiers and sailors discharged from the public service, after having wandered through the streets in a state of destitution, have been rendered comfortable and comparatively happy through this Charity, which from the nature of its foundation is always open for their reception.

Your Committee have reason to believe that, under the improved methods of treatment introduced at this Hospital within the last three years, those terrible diseases, which have often afflicted our fleets and armies, and distressed the poor in workhouses and infant asylums, will be suppressed as soon as they may appear.

The Committee, in the report of last year, gave the names and addresses of sixteen children, blind from a disease acquired in their birth, which is always curable if immediate application is made for assistance, or if the nature of it be generally understood. The present Committee regret to add a list of twenty more irrecoverably blind of one or both eyes, for want of a little assistance, which, if extended through the medium of this Hospital during the first weeks of their existence, would have secured them against the greatest of misfortunes.

The sum of £5000 is considered sufficient to effect all the objects in contemplation. Of this £2500 bave been subscribed, and the Committee rely on the humanity and charity of the Public for the remainder, and for the future support of the Hospital.


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


