The Trustees appointed by Act of Parliament for managing the concerns of Berkeley Square, beg leave humbly to represent to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that His Majesty having been graciously pleased in the Year 1766 to present them with a Statue of Himself to be placed in the Centre of the Square, it has been hitherto their most anxious wish, to preserve unimpaired so distinguished a mark of His Majesty's munificence and favor, and that they have accordingly from time to time, expended considerable Sums for that purpose; but, that in consequence probably, of some defect in its Original Construction, the Statue has, in the course of the last twelve Months, fallen so rapidly into decay, that the Trustees, acting under the Opinion of two of the most eminent Artists in London, who concurred in declaring it to be evidently dangerous in its then State, and totally incapable of any repair, have been reduced to the necessity of taking it down

Under these Circumstances, and having no funds of their own at all adequate to such an Object, they have been reduced to throw themselves on the liberality of His Royal Highness, expressing their hopes, that by His Royal bounty and favor, they may be enabled to replace the Statue, and thus to perpetuate to posterity the gratefull Remembrance of His most gracious condescension and kindness

I take the liberty of writing to you as I think their must have been a mistake, for the Prince told me he would give me 50 £ p^r. Year as long as I lived & that I should be welcome to go into any other place or do as I pleased, since I have been in this place my Pension has been stop'd, now five Quarters, having not receiv'd it since to the 5th of July 1812, Sir I was better off when I receiv'd my 50 £ p^r. Year & shifted for myself than I am now as huntsman to His Majesty, as I only receive 112 £ p^r. Year & am at a great expence with so many people frequently coming hear on buisness that I cannot do less than give them some refreshment, it's not like liveing with a Gentleman where I could send them to the Cook & Butler to give them something to eat & drink, am likewise oblig'd to finde the Stable men Bed Blankets Sheets &c, or they would have none, as the Clerk of the Stables told me that the Treasury dont allow it, & I am not allow'd one farthing for it all, it has been a verry unfortunate place for me to come too as my Wife has been verry ill ever since here we have been &

Sir I hope you will excuse ~~my~~ freedom in address-
ing a few lines to you but as I am an un-
fortunate young Man and in need of assistance
I beg to lay the state of my present case before
you - I was formerly in the service of His Royal
Highness the Prince Regent and had the misfor-
tune to lose my sight by a kick from a horse
while in His Royal Highness's service sixteen years
ago - in consequence of which His Royal Highness
was pleas'd in his great goodness to allow me
an annuity of 25 £. P^{er} Annum for which I should
consider myself very wanting in my duty was
I not to acknowledge my sincere gratitude -
both the blessing of God I have been able with
the assistance of my Labour to get myself a
comfortable living - till within this four years
my friends who used to employ me in turning
a mangle I have not had it in my Power to
earn but a trifle occasionally - the remainder
of my dependance resting on my Mother
who now being in the 61st year of her age
worn down by infirmity having brought
up a family of 13 Children and nothing to de-
pend on but her Labour is now unable
sufficiently to provide for herself - my afflic-
tion being so great as to require a person to

take care of me I should be under the ne-
cessity of having some one to take care of me
had I not my mother for that purpose so
that I have two people to keep out of my
allowance with the exception of the trifle my
poor Mother brings in by her Industry.
I feel myself unable to support myself with-
out some further assistance from some quar-
ter and am persuaded by many persons that
if His Royal Highness was made acquainted
with my present situation he would be
graciously pleas'd to render me still more
relief: not knowing who to apply to ^{to} make
my case known I wrote a few lines to General
Hulse who was pleas'd to express his approbation
of my conduct and sent me an answer in
writing which I have inclos'd. I was next
advis'd to make application to you and I do
most humbly and respectfully beg that if you
think it proper and decorous in me to require
it of His Royal Highness but by no means other-
wise you will be pleas'd to lay my present
case before His Royal Highness and make your
kind intercession for me. I do not mean by
this Sir. to express myself dissatisfied with what
His Royal Highness has been pleas'd in his good

ness to allow me ^{on} the contrary I feel
 all the gratitude a generous heart can
 feel. I only mention my case to you and by

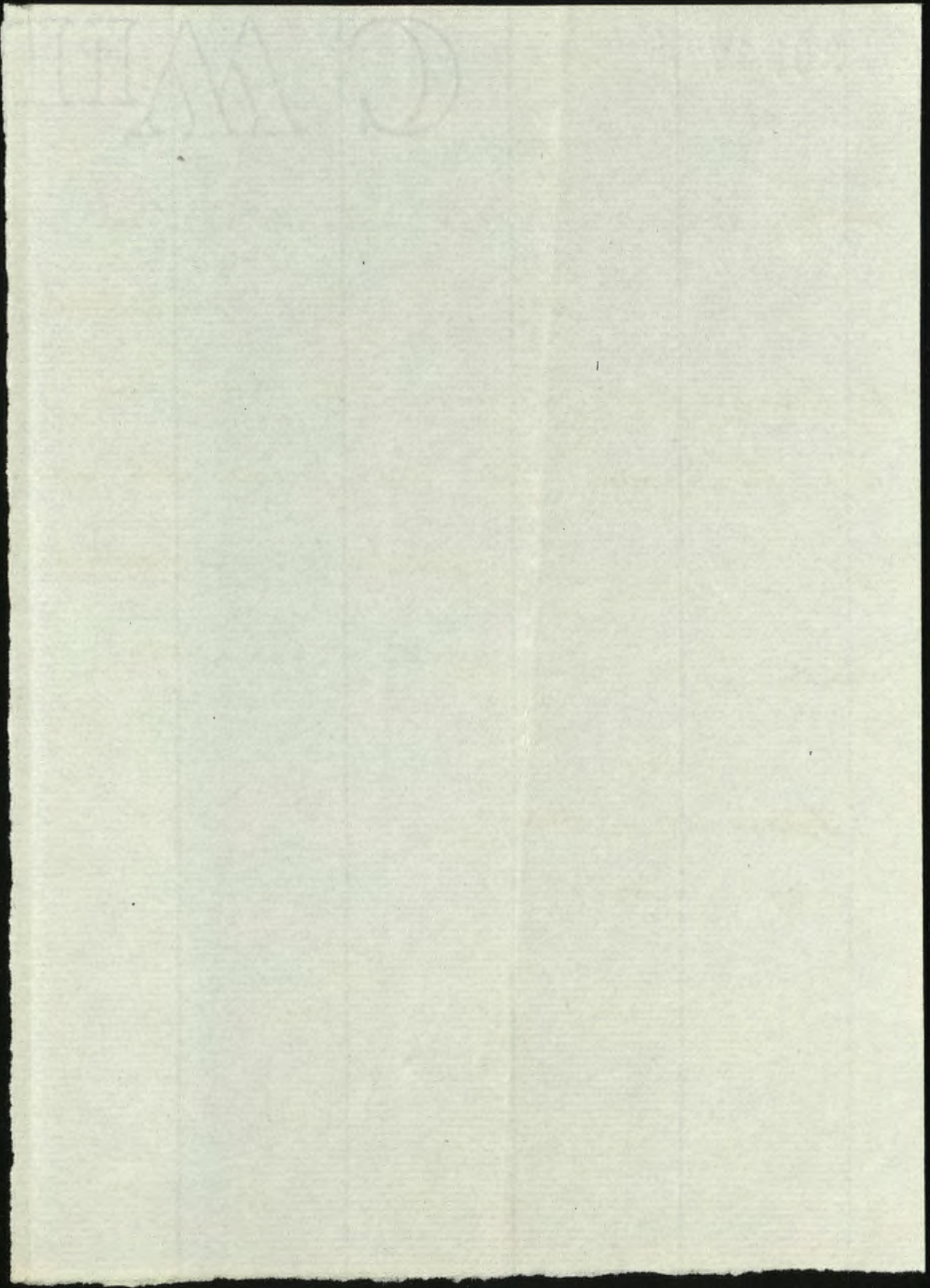

Observations

Besides the Notes attached to the List, I venture most humbly to solicit His Majesty's gracious attention more particularly to the case of Mr. Smart, whose claim to a Public Pension has not been admitted, in spite of repeated applications to the Treasury urged in the strongest manner. He has no other provision and is under all circumstances an object of His Majesty's Bounty.

The Servants at New (with the exception of Weaver) are all old and helpless. I could not obtain any Pensions for them, as they were considered parts of an Establishment transferred with the Property to His Majesty, but unless kept up they would most of them starve. Weaver as before stated, is an excellent man and would prove most useful in any station.

The applications for Pensions for the Observatory & Library Establishments were equally rejected, but I should imagine that, if the late King's property is to be considered Crown Property; those Establishments might with great propriety be transferred to the Lord Chamberlain, and possibly the same arrangement might be made for the transfer of the whole or a part of the Establishment at New to the Lord Chamberlain's & the Lord Steward's Department.

The Applications for Pensions to the Weymouth Servants were equally rejected.

Not one of the Individuals in this List has been paid beyond the date of the late King's Demise, but all the Servants and Attendants at the Library &c. have continued on duty ever since.
