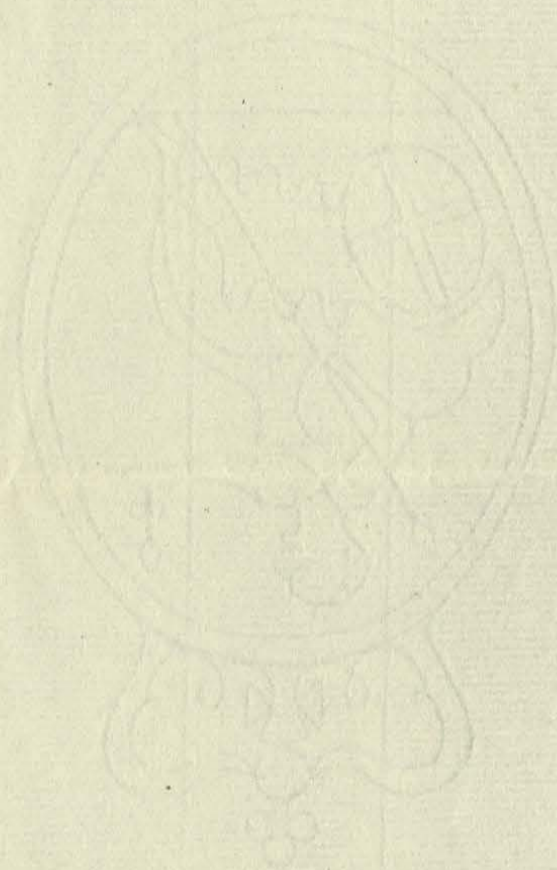

I would have sent the Schedule of the Rates & Taxes &c due at Michaelmas sooner but wishing to include the Cost of Ringing the Parish Church Bells &c which are not due till the 8 of November. And now after much hesitation must confess I have nothing pleasing to communicate. For in calculating the amount of the different articles I found the Lower Mews Rated as formerly when fully occupied at the Ann. Rent of £200 when there is only a very small part now Occupied by Six family of His Late Majesty's Servants amounting to about £40. This I had a promise was to be reduced ^{to} a proportionate rating

On which Account I applied to those concerned, who informed me that the rate was made in public Vestry and in proportion to the part Occupied but has since been altered and the whole range of the Building included which they confess to be illegal but that they could not help it. It will now rest with His Majesty's advisers as to what must be done in such Case. If agreed to it will be a dangerous and vexatious precedent. I also find that the hints I had from you respecting the different charge upon individuals of paying their own rates is objected to they say His Majesty does not mean so, The Ord^r Mr Sumner only Excepted, but whom His Majesty perhaps did not mean to pay

As the assessed tax of his house alone amounts to £ 35.19.2. It may perhaps be found necessary for you Sir to determine finally as to Miss Egerton Mr Bott and The Revd Mr Sumner if we are to procure in making them pay their own Taxes &c. The following Schedule if not allowed by the consent of parties will be nearly £ 32. too much. But if agreed to as now set. It ought to stipulated, understood, & agreed that in future the Magistres property should be rated in the same proportion as property in General is. There cannot be two rules for rating and both right if Varying.

Sir It is unnecessary to remind you of the circumstances which have induced H. M. hitherto to discharge the Rates & Taxes assessed upon the late King's private property at Windsor, altho' on the part of Government it has been decided to be no longer private property, but to belong to His Majesty only in right of the Crown; a distinction implying that it is now held for the benefit of the Public like all other property coming under the denomination of Crown Lands &c. - Such a decision might reasonably be expected to be followed by some arrangement in the Land Revenue Office for protecting The King against the charge of these rates & taxes; but as that department declines interference upon the principle that the charge ought to fall on the occupiers, it becomes the duty of those who have the honor to act for H. M. to be cautious in proposing that this charge should be borne by the Privy Purse, except in such cases as may be requisite with reference to the situation or circumstances of the parties; since to others it may be a sufficient accommodation to live rent free, paying their own rates & taxes; and in this class it is to be presumed that Mr. Bott & Miss Egerton wd. properly stand, as well as Mr. Sumner; perhaps Mr. Douglas also. The amount of Mr. Kennedy's assessed taxes creates a doubt whether they apply only to the House & Windsor; for if they extend to other items, the amt. in that respect ought to be reduced. My want of local & personal knowledge precludes me from discussing this principle further; but any intelligence thereon for future guidance will be acceptable. I conclude that the present Assesmt. on the Lower Meadows, or on other parts of the property now over-rated, cannot be altered; but I must desire you to signify to the Assessor or other proper Officers, that unless the property of the Crown be in future rated in exactly the same proportion as the property of others, the payment of the Rates will be recited on the part of His M^{ty}. If no deduct^{ns} are to be made for the Acc^t. furnished by yr. Letter of 1st insto, except for Miss Egerton & Mr. Bott, in consequence of the foregoing observations, I observe that the Sum now to be p^d. by H. M. will be £214.1.11¹/₂; w^{ch} I shall be ready at any time to issue to your Order. I am Sir, &c.

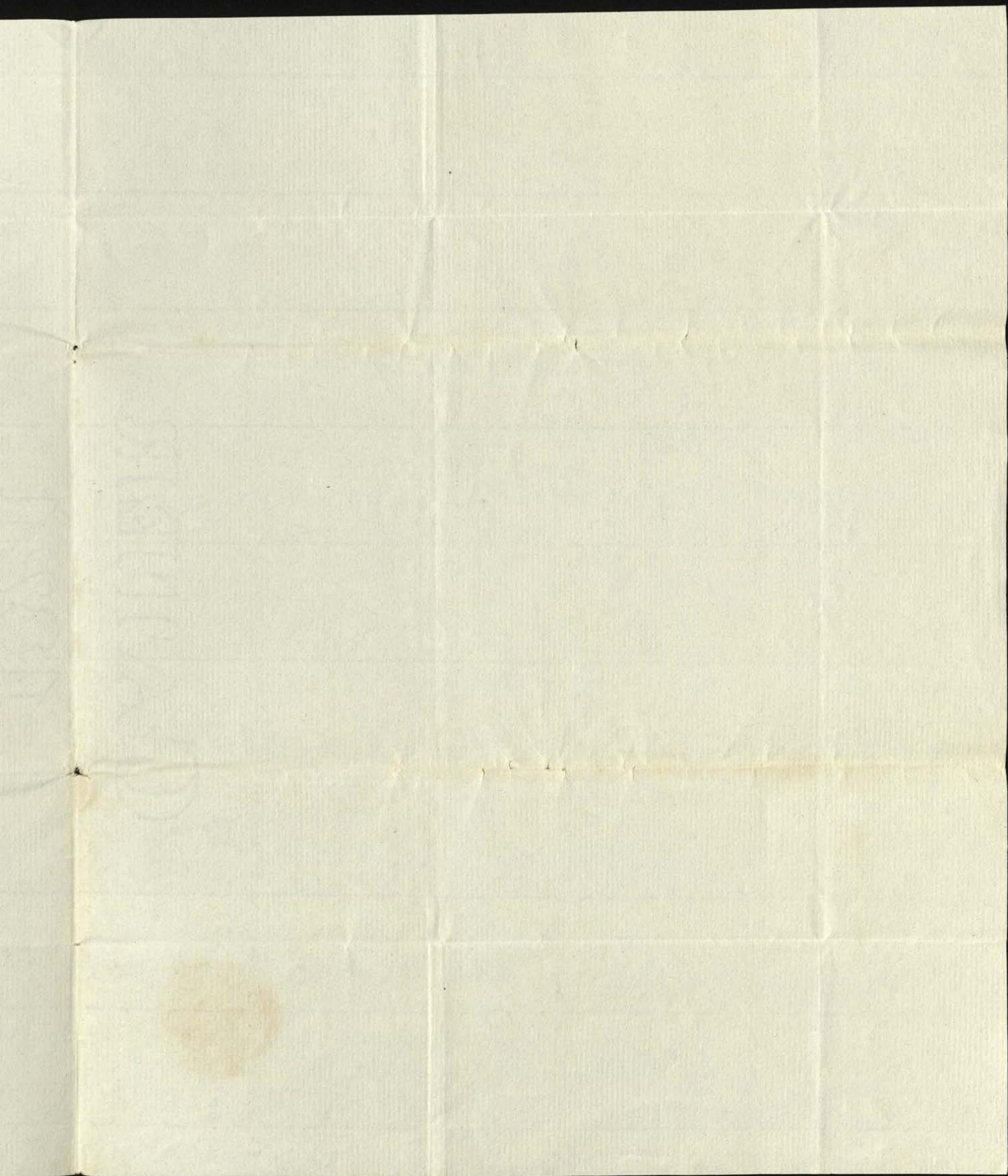

The account transmitted with your letter of 27th inst^l, and the Vouchers or Receipts which accompany it, are found to correspond, making up the total of £214. 1. 11/2 for Rates Taxes &c. paid at Windsor to Michas last. I observe that the Poor-rates of 25. April included Mr. Sumner, Miss Egerton & Mr. Bott, which I did not understand from your previous Letter of 1st Dec^r; but I have no doubt of your having good reason for not making the regulation apply to that particular Apartment.

I see no way of executing the unpleasant trust reposed in me of putting the Rates & Taxes upon a proper footing, other than by desiring that all the Occupiers of Houses & Premises, the private property of His late Majesty, should pay whatever is or ought to be assessed upon them respectively; and ^{without discharge of persons: therefore} I request you to give them early ^{through the proper} notice, mentioning the reasons already signified in my former Letters, that it may be understood in a clear light as matter of necessity & general arrangement. As you have, however, intimated that some of the Individuals residing in Augusta Cottage & the Lower

News

News might suffer inconvenience from the measure, I desire you will in strict confidence assure the parties so circumstanced, that they may rely on your being regularly supplied with the means of reimbursing all charges thus nominally brought upon them, and which I will take care to provide.

Mr^s Douglass must of course pay her own Rates &c. in like manner as already begun by Mr. Sumner, Miss Egerton (Mr^s Mead), and Mr. Bott; but Mr^s Kennedy's is a peculiar case, having a house rented for her in lieu of previous Apartments not liable to rates; and she ~~must~~ ^{ought} therefore ~~be reimbursed as to all Apartments,~~ ^{to be at no charge in this respect, unless} her Apartment Taxes include Servants, Carriage &c., for which part she ~~except whatever may be of a personal nature, not applying to the~~ ^{should be herself accountable as not applying to the intended provision of} House, such as Servants, Dogs &c.; ~~respecting which the exception is made~~ ^{merely from consistency in principle, and as such it is desirable} ~~that Mr^s Kennedy should understand it.~~

In your future Statements you will be pleased ^{to distinguish} the Rates &c. actually charged against The King, from those charged against Individuals proposed to be reimbursed.

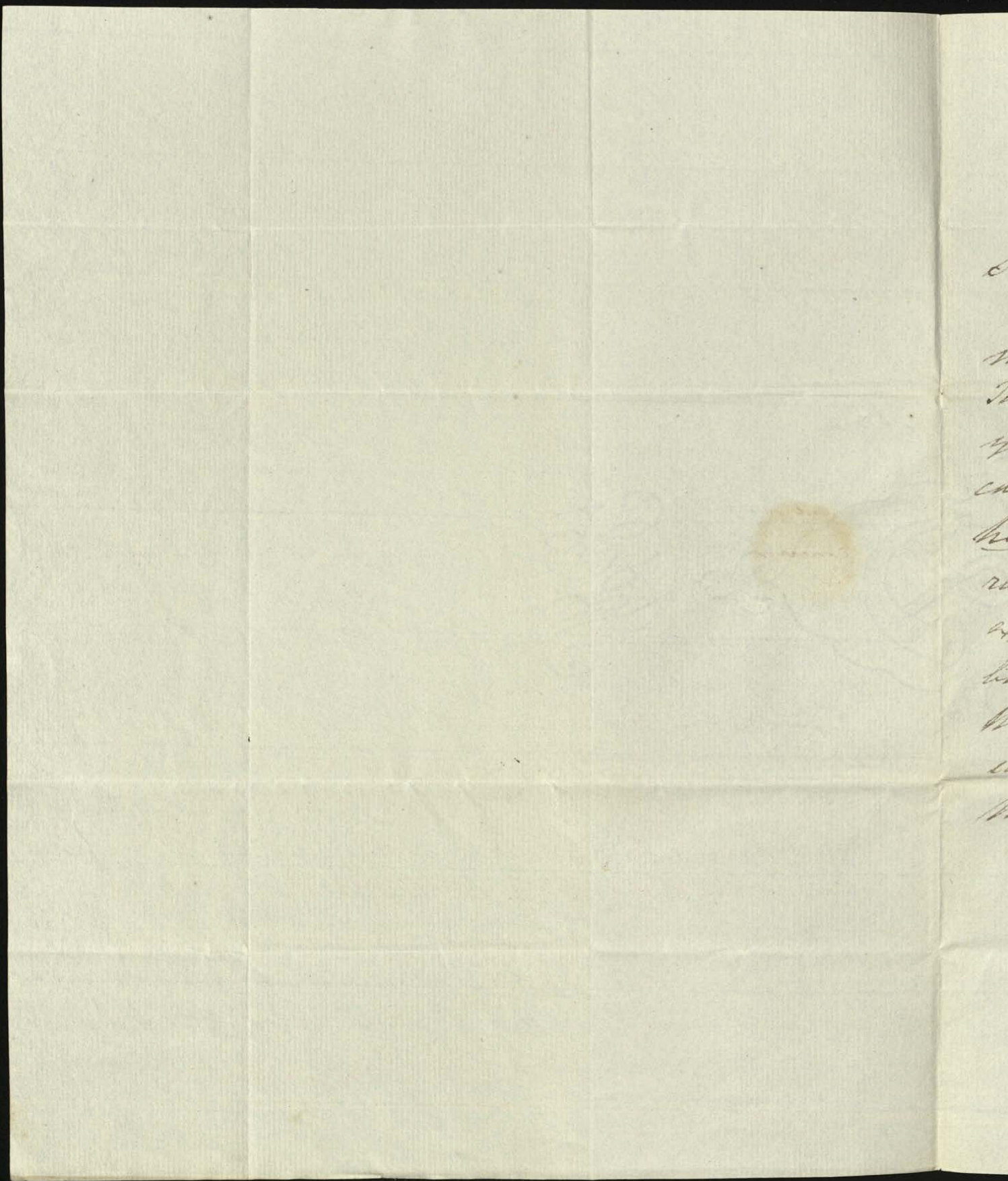

As it is intended to Make a poor rate soon I wish to observe to you that Mrs. Kennedy's Carriage & Servants &c have not been included in her assessed tax but that she will be still be an exception to the general rule. I beg also to offer to your notice Mrs. Egerton who I am informed is leaving her house at St James on acc^t of the proposed Improvements, and is coming to Windsor to occupy her house here. It was my wish to have sent you the Enclosure long ago but was prevented so doing by the Collector of the Assessed Tax - informing me that there was to be a new assessment soon made on that branch. But as it does not appear to be certain when, I have sent the account complete up to Michaelmas last past Except Mr^s Kennedy's Mr^s Seart's Assessed Tax. 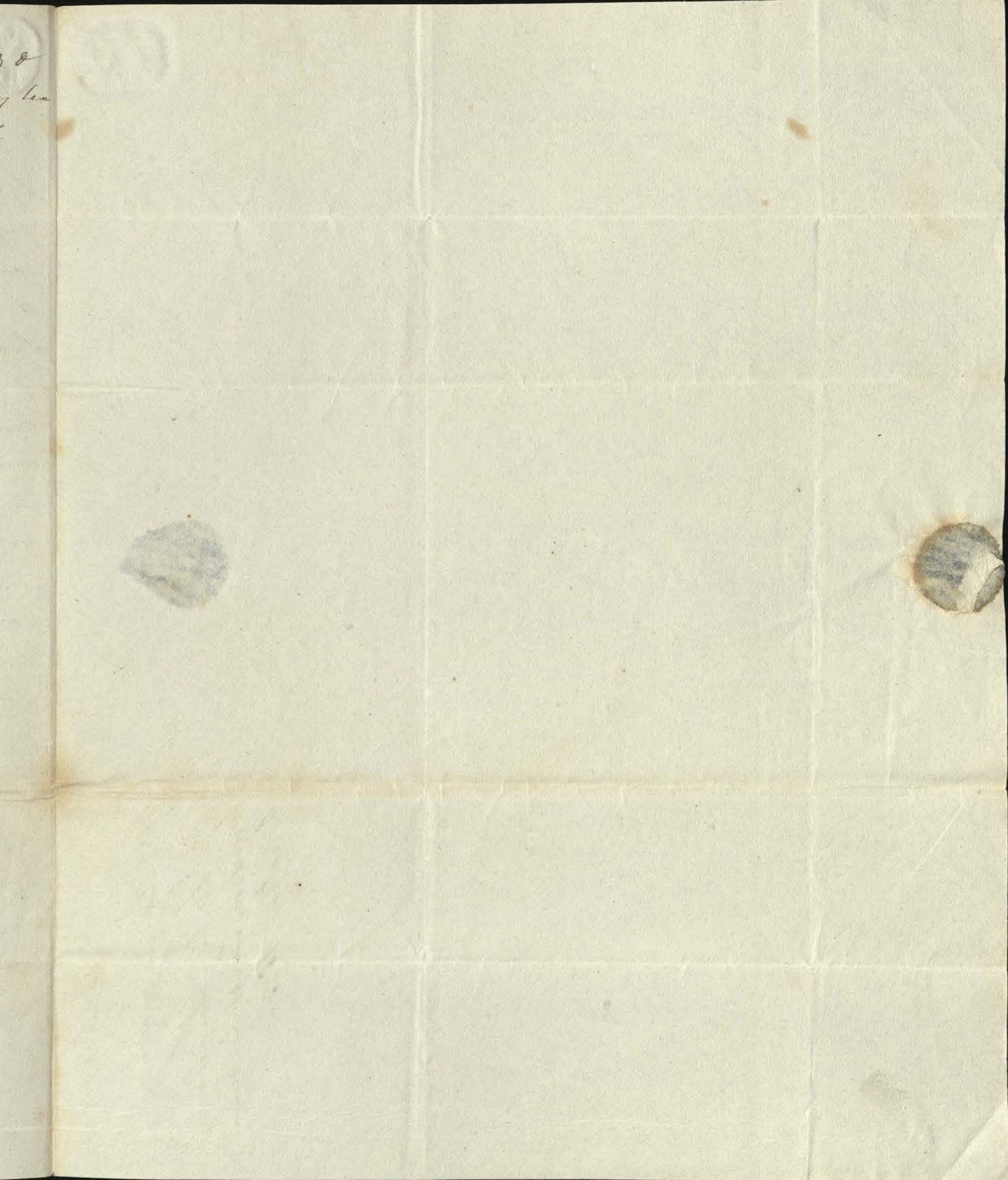
