Sir

Mr. Lobbett, having shewn me your Letter to him of the 6th Ins.^{ts} respecting the charge of the Dowd for the Gate entrance to the Bachelors acre, which you state was resisted by Mr Agnew in 1821. on the ground that the Corporation had let the whole Field to a Tenant who admitted no right of way from the Gate in question. — I beg to inform you that the ground is (it has been ever since it was allotted wholly under the enclosure Act to the Corporation) been let "under certain restrictions in which the said Gate entrance is included" so long as the rent heretofore paid to Mr Keppel continues to be paid, Mr Keppel having received an equivalent under the said Act for his part of the Land on which the Gate opens. The Corporation conceive that they justly stand in the same situation as Mr K did before the enclosure; & untill they receive due notice that the right of way is no longer required

& the Gateway tricked up. They have a right to expect the annual acknowledgement for the same.

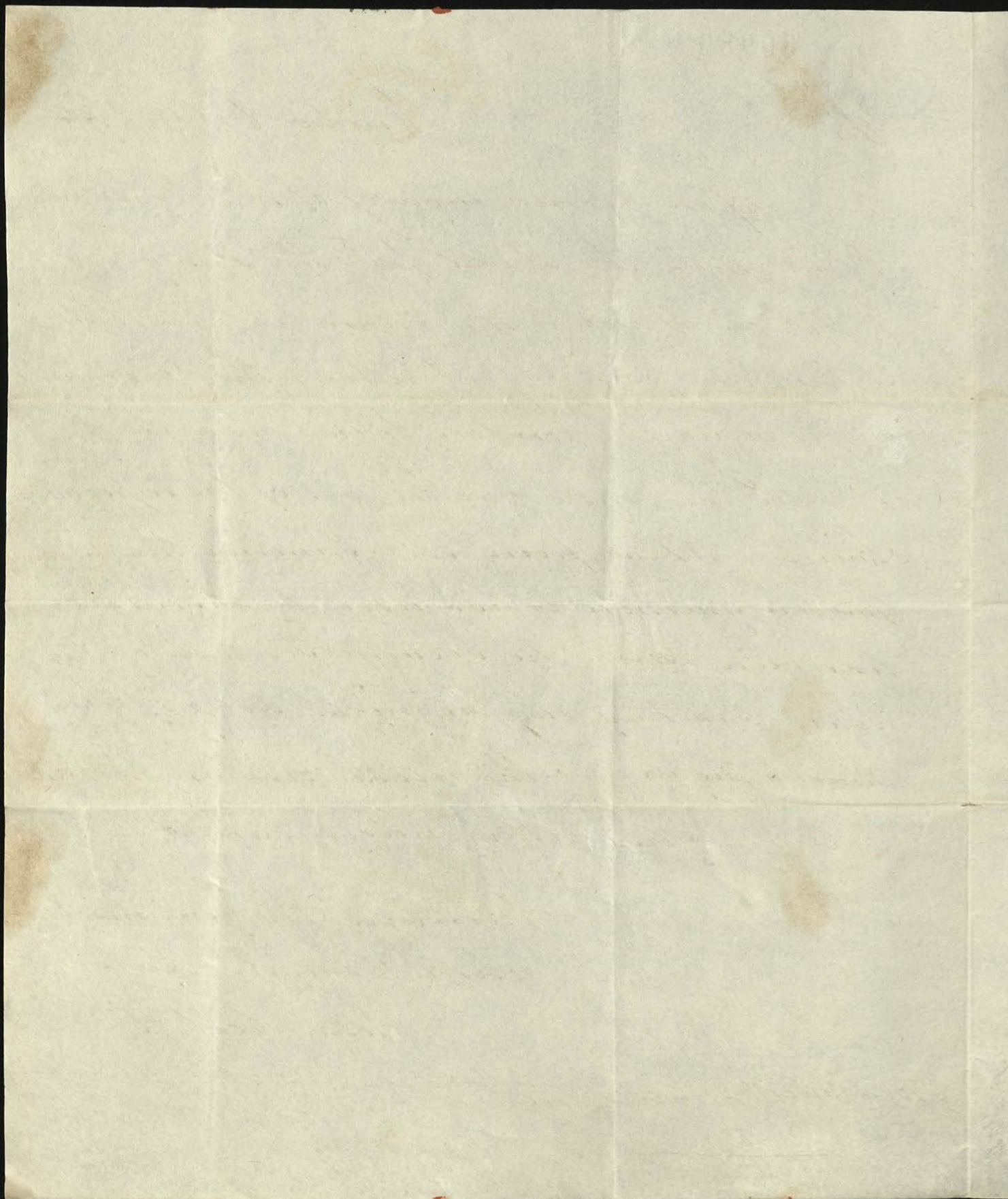

Sir

The enclosed is an Account of Poor Rates stated to be due from His Majesty to the Parish of New Windsor, and I am directed to forward it to you that you may see the Collectors upon the subject.

With respect to the first charge for the Tower Lodge, a communication was long since made to Mr Agnew: that the parochial Rates thereon ought to be defrayed by the respective occupiers, regard being had to the beneficial occupation of the premises. - the Collectors must therefore be referred to them, and is matter of surprise that these and other Rates respecting which decided instructions have been given, should so long have remained unpaid.

The Tower News & the Carriers Shop, if legally subject to Taxes, would appear to come under the department of the Master of the Horse, but if (on enquiry which you will make) these Premises prove to be in His Majesty's occupation it is in such case conceived that they cannot be liable to any assessments of Taxes & Parochial Rates. Of the House late Brawns, stated by the late Mr Agnew to be occupied by the families of Messrs Miller, Hinnaid & Clerk, it was long since understood that the Rates &c were to be paid by these parties respectively.

Mr. Bost it has been lately intimated, has the custody of some

private papers belonging to His Majesty - Viewing his house therefore as a depository of this description it has been deemed reasonable that the Rates & Taxes thereon should for the present be paid for him, and I have therefore to desire that you will make up an account of the same to Michaelmas last that they may be put in a course of payment - and you will henceforth include them in your half-yearly Accounts -

With regard to Mr Egerton's the Collectors must be referred to that Lady herself for payment.

P.S. I shall be glad to see Mr Fetter on the subject of the Bachelor Acre whenever it may suit him to call, as you mentioned that such was his intention.

It is proper to state that the Account herewith forwarded is far from corresponding with the late Mr Agnew's Accounts, by which the last rate paid on the Lower Lodge was that of the 21st August 1823

The present claim of 3 Rates to 26th August 1824 must consequently be incorrect - Mrs Egerton's Poor Rates as well as those on the Lower Stews - and the Fabrics Shop were paid up to 20th March 1823 inclusive, and those of Mr Bott to 25th April 1822 inclusive -

Since writing the foregoing I have seen Mr Secker Jun^r who
has satisfactorily explained the nature of the claim of £1. p Annum
rent for bachelors Clove. Have the goodness therefore to add the
same to your Account of Mr Bots Taxes (that is the Amount of
Rents due to Michas last) that Mr Secker may be reimburs'd,
and the whole settled with the Corporation to the above period.

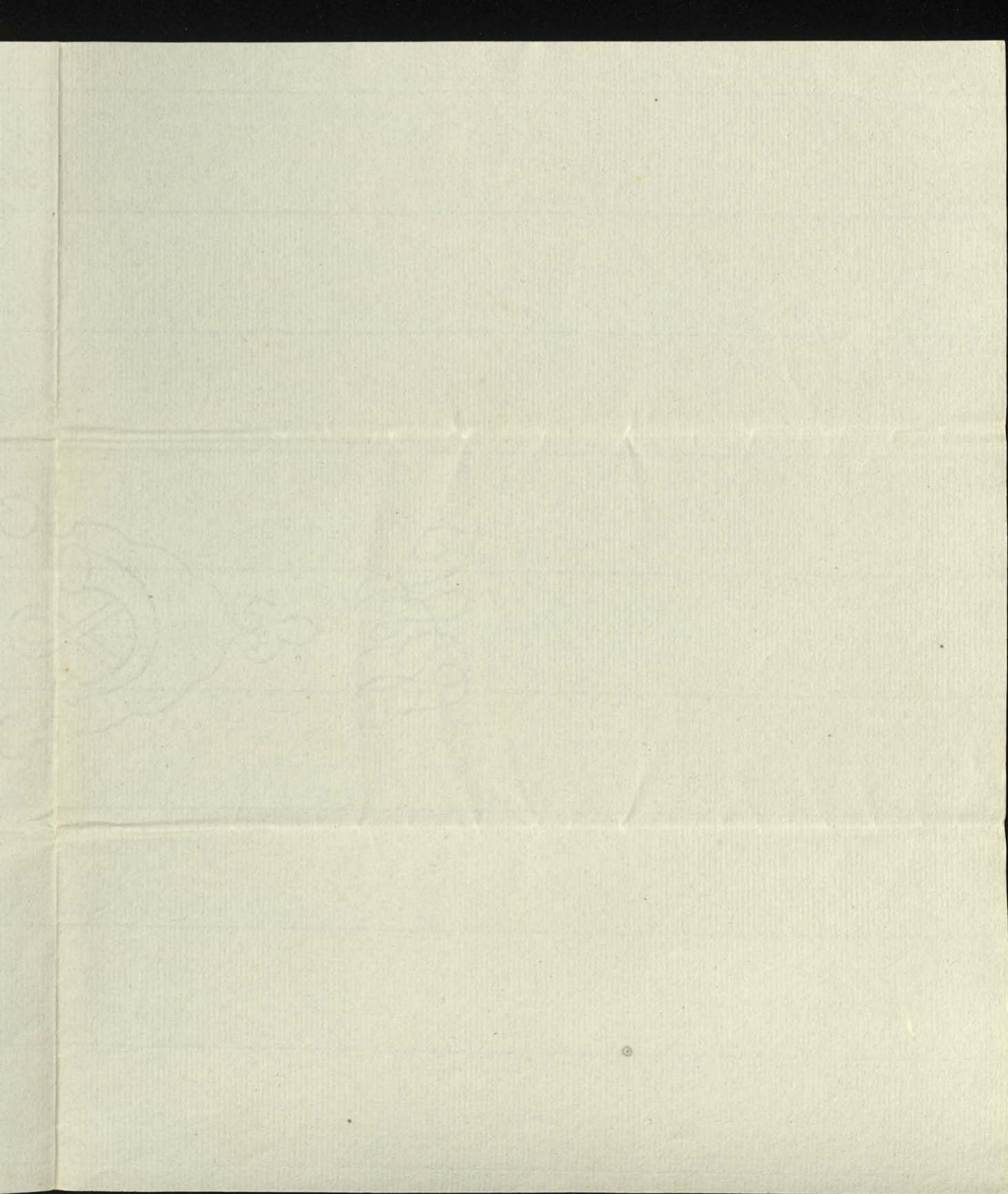

Mr. T. D. has the honor to inform Mr. Egerton, in answer to his enquiry by letter of yesterday as to the mode to be adopted in applying for the money which His Majesty is pleased to grant from His Privy Purse for the payment of Mr. Egerton's Taxes at Windsor, - that Mr. John Collett of that place is supplied half-yearly, namely, at Lady-Day and Michaelmas, with the means of paying such Rates and Taxes as are defrayed by His Majesty, and it will therefore be necessary that the several Receipts & Vouchers be handed over to him (Mr. Collett) previously to such days of payment, for the purpose of enabling him to make up his half-yearly Accounts - At the expiration of each half-year, therefore, Mr. Egerton will be pleased to look to Mr. Collett for the re-imbursment of the Rates & Taxes she may have paid for her House at Windsor -

Mr. Dawson will give Mr. Collett every necessary instruction on this head, and will also desire him to wait upon Mr. Egerton before next Lady-Day, that Mr. Egerton may be spared all unnecessary trouble.

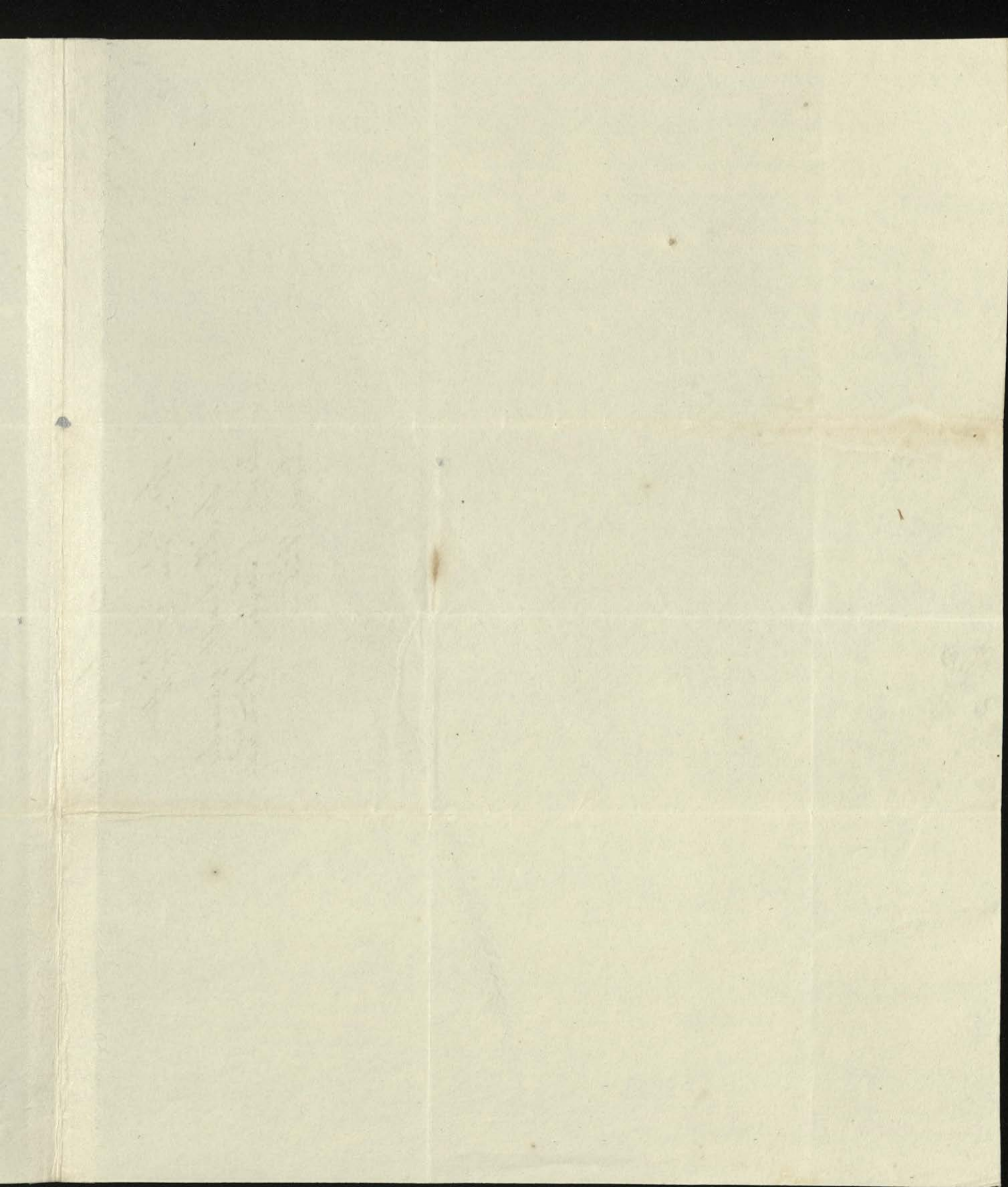
