

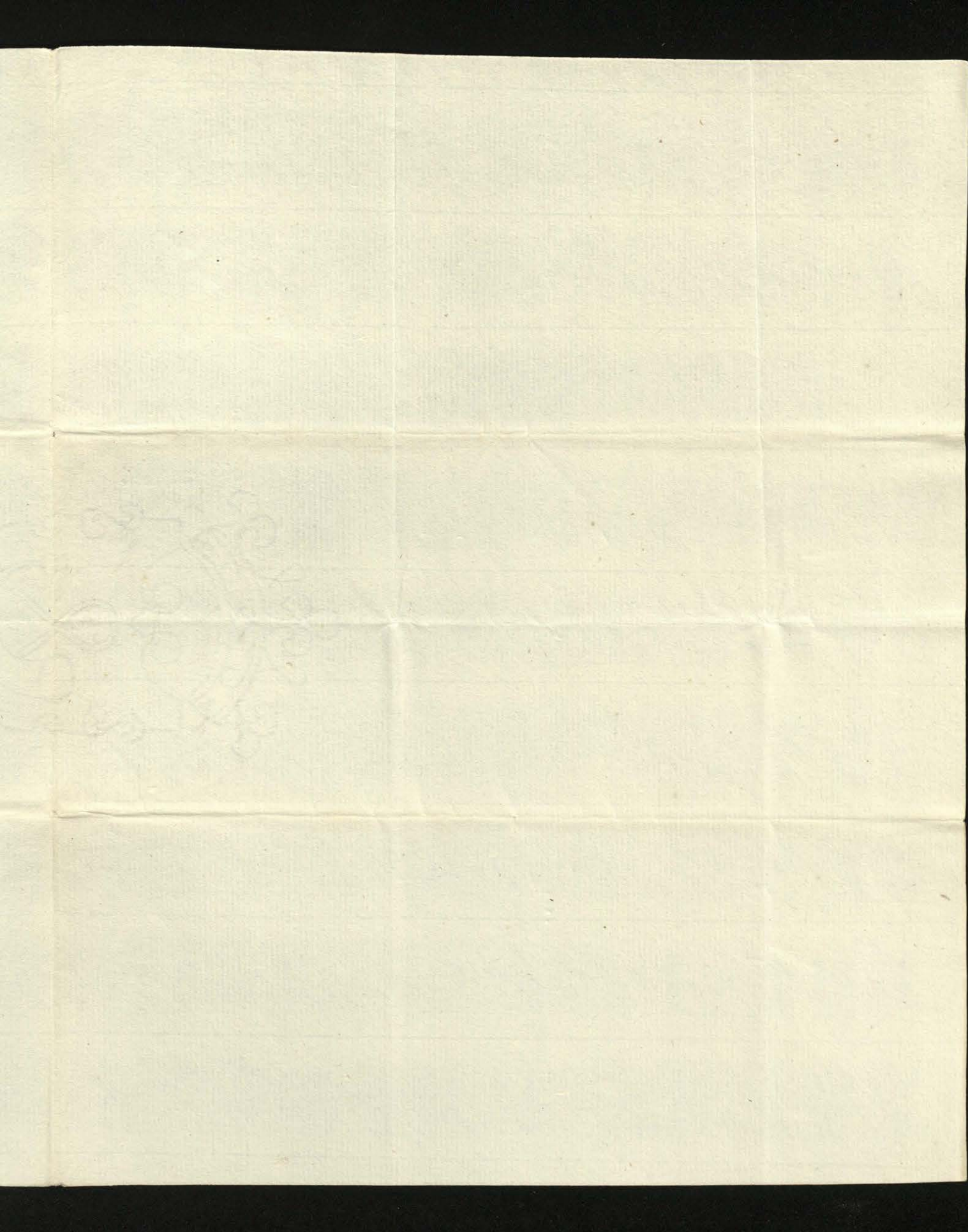
Dear Sir,

By the Act it is specified that the first Payment from the Duchy to the Commissioners on their Order is fixed for 5th Jan^y next 1796. — £6500. for the Half year. — The Commissioners can have no claim for more than their Annual 13000 £. but as in case of defalcation in your future receipts, you may find a present surplus of Arrear. useful to make that sum up. — I would only suggest that without an Order for that purpose why do you seem disposed to Pay to Mess^{rs} Parille more than the customary 6000. — excusing my freedom by this hint which is meant to go no farther than yourself. — but of course your Brother & yourself are amply competent to judge for the best. — There appears to be time enough for you to make application to Gen^l Duke. respect^{ly} the present surplus in your hands who will be very ready to give such directions or instructions as you may desire. with best respects & good wishes to your Bro^r believe me always Dear Sir

Sir,

I received this morning a letter from
General St. Leger acquainting me that
Mr. Holland had gone down to Bakhampton
with the copy of the last Poll taken at
that place, & professedly with a view
to canvass, & strongly recommending
me to take some step as quick as
possible to counteract Mr. H.'s object.
Your Royal Highness being

absent, I have with the advice of
Mr. Bicknell, sent a note to Mr. Perbit
requesting him to meet me to morrow,
& if possible bring the purchase of
the estate to a conclusion. Mr. P. by this
means will have an opportunity to
consult the Treasury, & if, as it is strongly
believed, Government is adverse to Mr.
Holland in every point of view, there is
no doubt but that the negotiation

may be made very advantageous
to Mr. Perbit. I shall take the liberty
of conveying to your Royal Highness the
result of my interview with Mr. P.

In the course of conversation this
morning with L.^d Thurlow, (who is
proceeding very fast in the business
of the Sateby) he seemed very forcibly
struck with my telling him that Mr.
Pitt would not consent yesterday
upon the representation of L.^d
Cholmondeley to admit J. R. A. A. A. A. A.

and Mr. Graham to act as Commissioners
under the new Bill. He suggested, that
Your Royal Highness might with great
propriety address His Majesty upon
the subject, if it was only to state in
general terms the concern your Royal
Highness must feel to have your whole
concerns submitted to the inquisitorial
command of persons, who certainly
may be termed your Royal Highness's
enemies; and that your Royal Highness
hoped His Majesty would take the

came into his mature deliberation;
 but that if His Majesty found himself
 at all embarrassed or committed with
 his Ministers upon the question, it was
 the farthest from your Royal Highness's
 wishes to add to such embarrassment,
 but that your Royal ^{Highness} was induced by
 your feelings at least to state your
 situation to His Majesty.

Mr. P. thought that some such
 representation as the above would induce
 the King to nominate two others

Commissioners, His Majesty being so
authorized by the Bill. The Duke of Leeds
has given L^d. J. his proxy for Monday.
I must detain your Royal Highness
just to say that the Duke of Norfolk
seems a most staunch friend, in so much
so as to ask me what was wished
to be said upon the Bill on Monday.
L^d. J. seemed to think the less was
said the better, as no good could be effected.
Should your Royal Highness have any

commands for Monday, I will execute
them to the best of my power, at least
I can say they shall be faithfully attempted

The prince did not arrive in England until December 1720 his Establishment
of a Council was not placed in 1729 -

The King (Geo 2.) came to the Throne in Jan 1727, and it
appears from the accounts you looked over this morning
that he only received the Duty Arrears to Lady Day 1727 -
We may ^{therefore} consequently presume he was not thought entitled
to them further, altho the prince was not of full age
till near 10 months following, ~~but~~ he might otherwise

This Prince had an allowance of £100,000 p^a annum, but at what period settled does not appear in the office of the Duchy of Cornwall. It was reduced in a case in favour of the present Prince of Wales in 1787 and 1795 in Parliament, as it had been previously in 1736 in favour of Prince Frederick.

Frederick Prince of Wales.

1728. In December 1728. Prince Frederick arrived in England from Hanover, where he had hitherto resided, & was now about 22 y^r of age.

See office of Aud^r of Receipts of Duchy 1728. His Royal Highness had an allowance of £24,000 p^a annum to 1735. payable at the Exchequer, independent of the Revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall.

Debate - Treaty - 1737

1736. Upon His Royal Highness's Marriage the above allowance was increased to £50,000 p^a annum. M^r Pulteney moved for an address to the King to settle £100,000 a year upon the Prince, which was opposed by the then Minister Sir Robert Walpole.

Vide Notes, the office of Aud^r of Rec^t of Duchy & the Treas^r Acct^s of Prince Frederick, in the Duchy office, clearly prove the Receipt of £100,000 p^a ann^o.

1742. Prince Frederick's allowance increased to £100,000 p^a ann^o independent, as before, of the Duchy Revenues. This increase probably had its rise from a reconciliation with the King, which took place in the preceding year.

His Present Majesty, when Prince of Wales

There is nothing in the office of the Duchy of Cornwall to show what allowance was made to His Majesty when Prince of Wales.

The Present Prince of Wales

Vide Rec^t of Exchequer 1779. An allowance of £8932. p^a annum was paid at the Exchequer from the 5th January 1779. to the 5th January 1781.

inclusive for the Joint Support of The Prince of Wales & The Duke of York, together with further additional sums issued quarterly under His Majesty's Warrants, for making good the deficiency of that allowance. The whole of this allowance with the several additional sums issued in nine quarters to 5th January 1781 amounted to £ 37500. 1. 9th. being on the average about £ 16,666. 17. 6 p. annum for the Joint Support of both the Princes.

From April 1781 to July 1783 inclusive His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales received a separate allowance at the Exchequer of £ 20,204. 12 p. ann together with further quarterly aids to make good the deficiency of that allowance. The whole of the annual allowance with the several additional aids issued in Ten quarters to 5th July 1783. amounted to £ 95317. 16. 10. being at the rate of £ 38127. 2. 8 p. annum.

1783. June 23^d

Vide Votes

An allowance of £ 50,000. p. annum settled upon His Royal Highness payable out of the civil List, also a sum of £ 60,000. Voted at the same time as a present aid for His Royal Highness's Equipment on His entering upon a new Establishment. His Royal Highness upon coming of age in August following, also took possession of the Revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall, which had previously been applied in aid of the civil List

1787. April 20th

The Prince's affairs brought forward in Parliament by M^r. Alderman Newman

May 4th

A Message from The King for an addition of £ 10,000 p. annum to the former allowance, which was thus increased to £ 60,000 p. annum

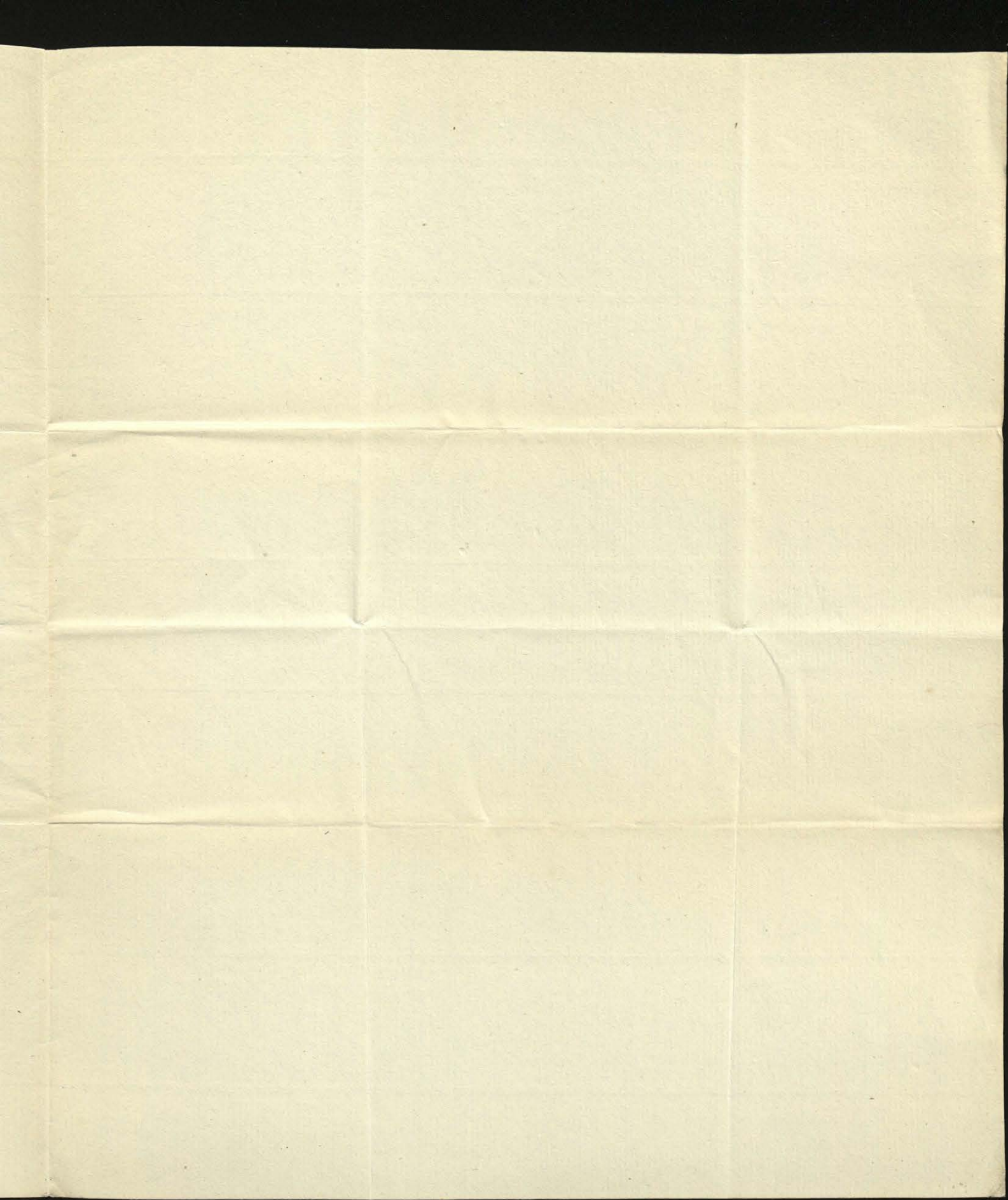
