Dearest

you will herewith receive a state of the last Payments, part of which were deferred till the Last day in August under the expectation of receiving from the Treasury a second Issue of £5000. in part of the arrears; but it was then necessary to close your account by making a small division amongst the old Creditors in the Stables, and small it was, as you see. of the sum carried to the separate account of the Princeps Charlotte there is still a Balance in hand of £509. 14. 9. which was a necessary reserve for defraying the Expenses to South End, or any other unforeseen demand, for which ~~to~~ heretofore I have, with much inconvenience been obliged to make advances out of my own Pocket. I hope that all Her Royal Highness's Bills are delivered to the 5. July last, and if so these will certainly be a surplus after paying all Expenses of the Journey &c.; which may be applied, as far as it will go, to the purchase of Housses Linens, as represented by Lady Elgin to be so much wanted.

I will learn, in the course of a few days, what we are further to expect from the Treasury, and will send you a state of the Payments necessary to be made next October. Unless we can then obtain £10,000 in further part of the arrears, these will, as you justly observe, be great difficulties in our Arrangement; for the small division made amongst the Stable Creditors in August is all nothing, owing to our not getting the second £5000 promised by the Treasury; and this disappointment also prevented the clearing of several Bills in the Privy Purse that were intended to have been discharged, but which remain as a load upon us till the next quarterly Payments, amongst which they

they must be included. I hope His Royal Highness is quite recovered.

I have the pleasure herewith to transmit to you two States of the ensuing Payments; one containing the proposed disposition of the £15000. to be received as usual by Gen. Hulse; and the other containing the account of Payments to be made for the Privy Purse, to which is added a further brief State of the proposed appropriation of an additional sum of £5000. Supposing so much to be issued by the Treasury in part of the arrears. The whole amounts to £22,000. — (Viz.)

That no Misapprehension may arise respecting the Sum proposed by these States to be paid for the services of Her Royal Highness The Princess of Wales, namely, £3704. 0. 2. from the Accounts of Gen. Hulse, and £1000. from the expected issue in part of arrears, together £4704. 0. 2., you will be pleased to observe that the whole will only clear Her Royal Highness's settled allowances to the 5. of July last, still leaving £3000. due for the now current quarter. As Her Royal Highness has readily acquiesced in the plans of Reform suggested by The Duke of Kent, it is of course necessary for us to afford the means of carrying that Plan into execution, by Payment of the regular allowances to as close a period as possible; for Her Royal Highness will have additional Claims upon her at the next Quarter Day, to clear the whole of the Salaries due to the Ladies intended to be discontinued on the Establishment; besides that it is part of The Duke of Kent's Plan to keep a sum in hand wherewith to pay the Household Bills in future with ready Money. The remaining £3000. which will still be due upon Her Royal Highness's allowance to the 10. of October next, may be cleared from time to time at the rate of £1000 or 500^s p^r Quarter.

of Quarters, as the Means shall arise in future, after which it is clearly
understood, that no additional aid is to be given; but I am much
desirous if any such aid will ever be required while the Plan
of His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent shall be steadily pursued.

I shall leave Town on Friday noon for Cornwall, and it would be
a great satisfaction to me if I should happen to receive your
Sentiments on these Matters before my departure, but as the
interval may be too short to admit of your previously considering
them, I have in that Case, to request the favour of your signifying
to Mr. Watt, in my absence, whether he may prepare and forward
to you, for His Royal Highness's Signature, the Warrants for
the Payments included in Gen. Kildis's State, that every thing
may be ready for satisfying the Claimants immediately on
my Return from the West in the latter end of October.

Thus the Payments on account of the Privy Purse in the last seven quarters have been at the rate of £17,324.14.10⁴ p. ann; instead of £10,000 the settled allowance; and even this does not give us the full Extent of the Ex^t, which is to be found only by adding the before stated arrears to the actual Payments, forming a Total of £45,628.16.10. as the Expence incurred under the Head of Privy Purse in Nine Quarters, namely the two quarters left in arrears by Lord Cholmondeley, and the seven quarters since passed, the average whereof is above £5,000 p. Quarter or £10,000 p. ann. being more than double the allowance.

~~of Annum, from the Year 1795 to the 5th January 1803,~~ a Debt appears to have incurred, to the amount of £155,119. 19. 5, not including the first Loan from the Landgrave, nor the Sum due on Bond to Mr. Tattersall, both of which had their commencement prior to 1795. To this there is to be added the Sum of £10,000 received by Advances from the 4th of 0th Duties from the 5th April 1800 to 5th July 1802, in order to shew the extent of the Excess; & whether those advances be now considered by Government as a ^{towards} Loan, or not, they have never the less operated ~~to~~ the reduction of the Debt, which otherwise would have amounted to the Sum of £173,119. 19. 5 at the period before stated. Dividing this total of £173,119. 19. 5 by thirty, for the number of Quarters elapsed from 5th July 1795 to 5th January 1803, it will be found to produce £5770. 13. 3³/₄ *per Quarter*, or £23,082. 13. 3 *per Annum*; which, added to the ordinary Income of £60,000., proves the rate of Expenditure to have amounted on an average to £83,082. 13. 3 *per Annum*.

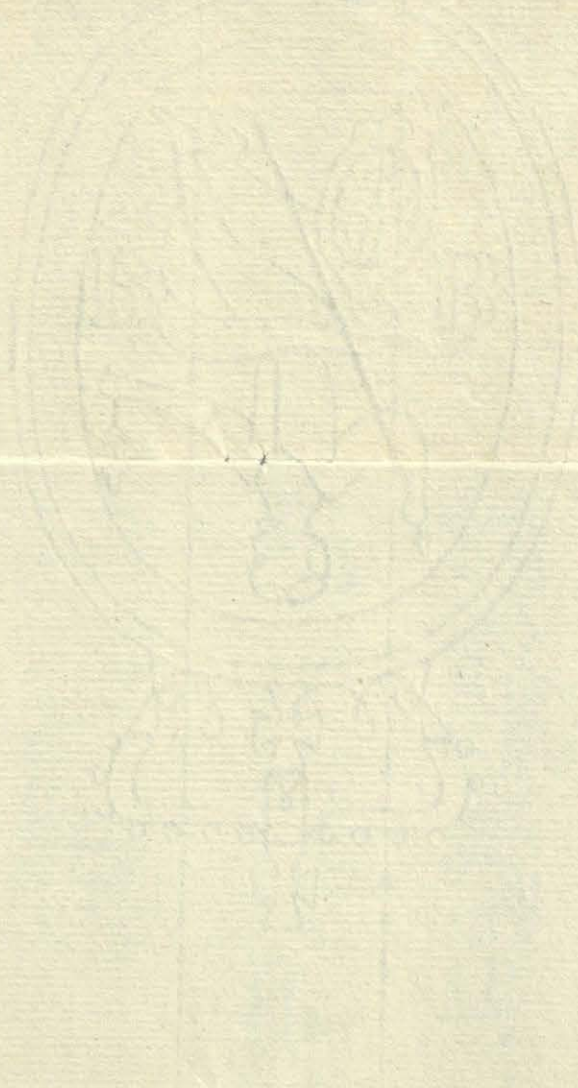

silver Subscriptions and other Items, amounting to about £3000 p Annum, which have heretofore been charged upon the Privy Purse from the inability of otherwise providing for them. These Sums added to the former average Expenditure will make full £80,000. -; and, it therefore appears necessary to appropriate £20,000 p Annum, out of the additional Income, towards the ^{future} current Expenditure, which will leave £45,000 p Annum to be applied in liquidation of the Debt incurred since the Year 1795.

It may be proper to notice that in the Amount of the Debt as before stated, the Sum of £9400. 5. 7 is included for Arrears incurred in Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales's Household, where the Expenditure upon an average exceeds the Sum of £16,000. p Annum.

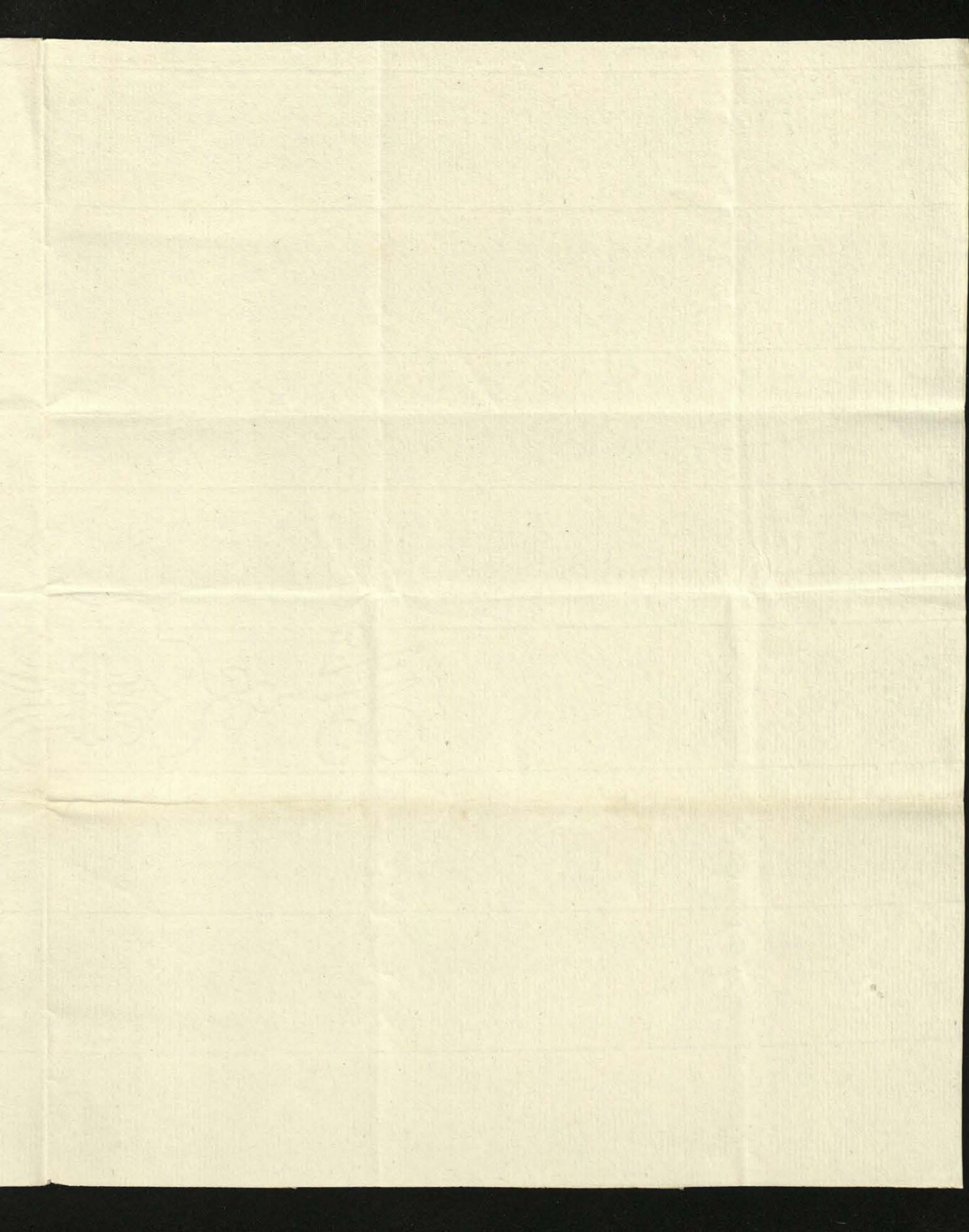

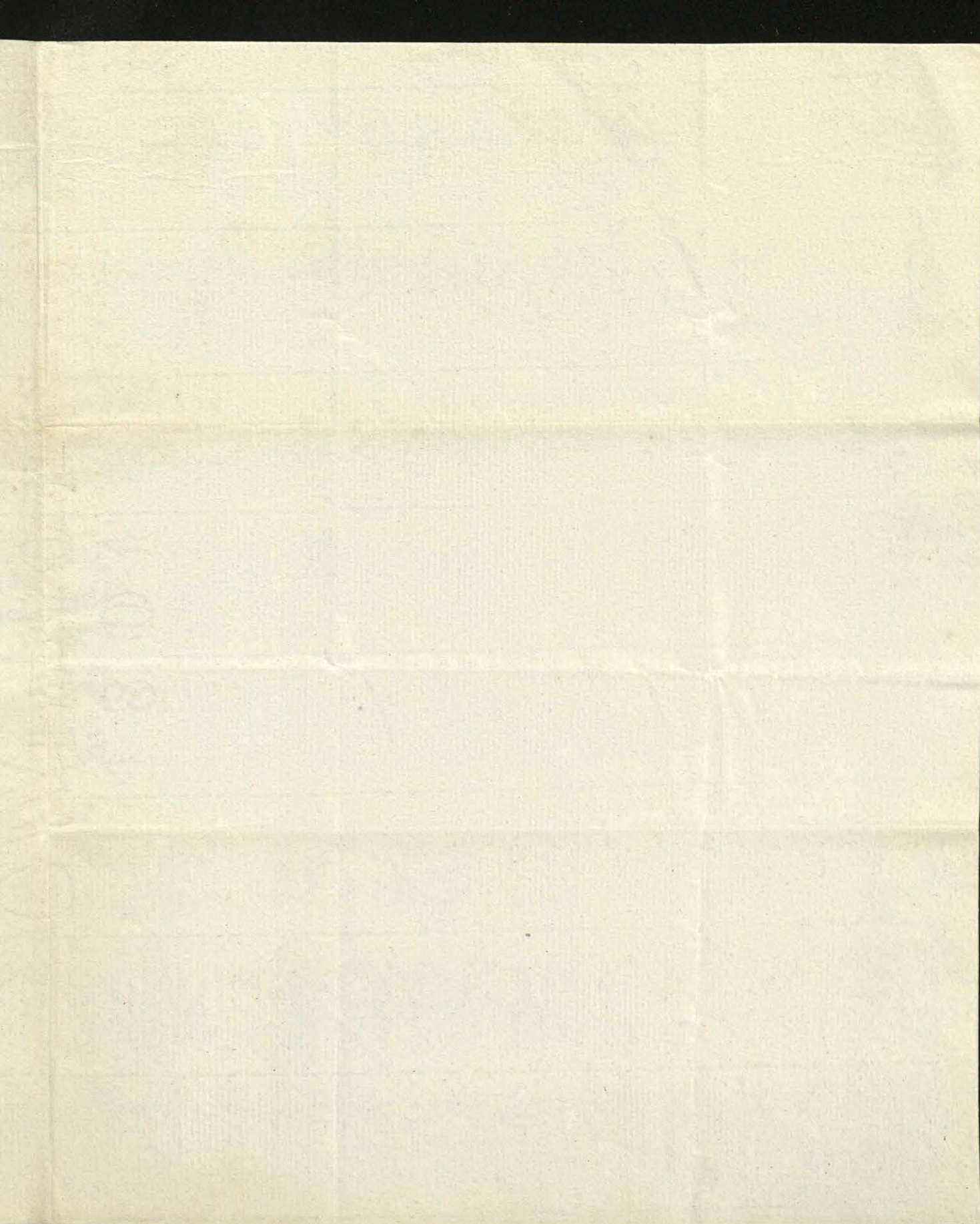

I beg leave to trouble you with the
 Notes & Warrants for the ensuing Payments. In the
 State of General Hulse's Account the Arrangement will,
 I hope, meet with your approbation, as it provides for
 paying two Quarters of Mr. Beck's Household Bills, thereby
 contributing to forward the payment of Brighton Accounts;
 and two Quarters on some of the small Pensions due to
 needy persons who are continually harrasing us with
 importunities; also for liquidating part of the Arrear of
 £3000.- due on the Princess's allowance. The separate
 State of Payments for the Privy Purse is not however,
 I am concerned to say, so satisfactory; for although it
 provides for several urgent Claims, yet no means
 are afforded for satisfying any part of the Debt
 due

due for the Box at Drury Lane Theatre, being £1272. 10. 0, or
any part of Mr. Patterson's Bond which daily increases by
Interest; and we are likewise prevented from
making any distribution this Quarter amongst the old
Claimants in the Stables. By a Mem^o at the bottom

of the Sum of £1500 - now drawn from the Duchy, of
which I am to receive £400 - for advances by me made
on account of the Dartmore Peat Experiment, but which
His Royal Highness will receive back again as the
Peat shall be gradually disposed of.

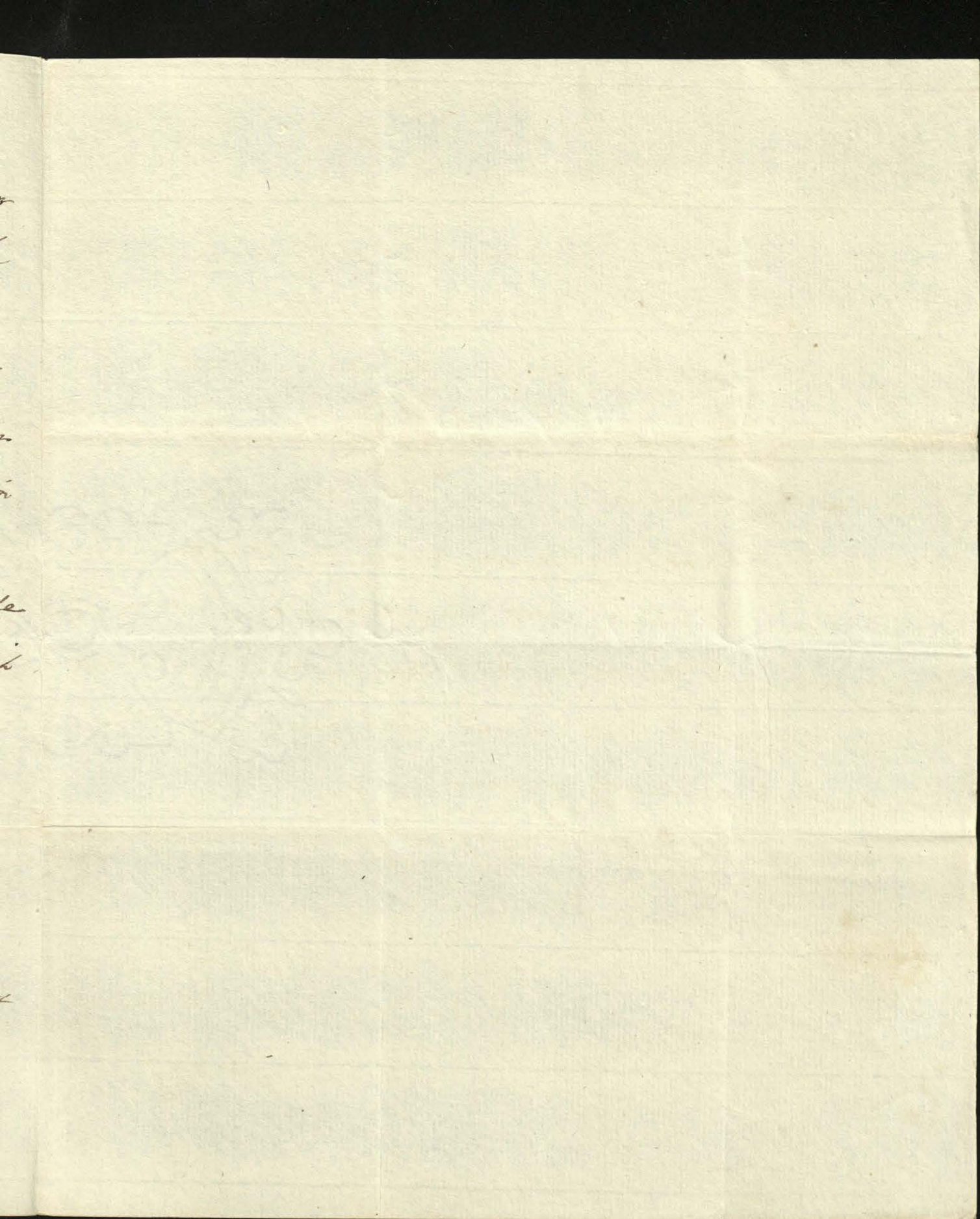
