

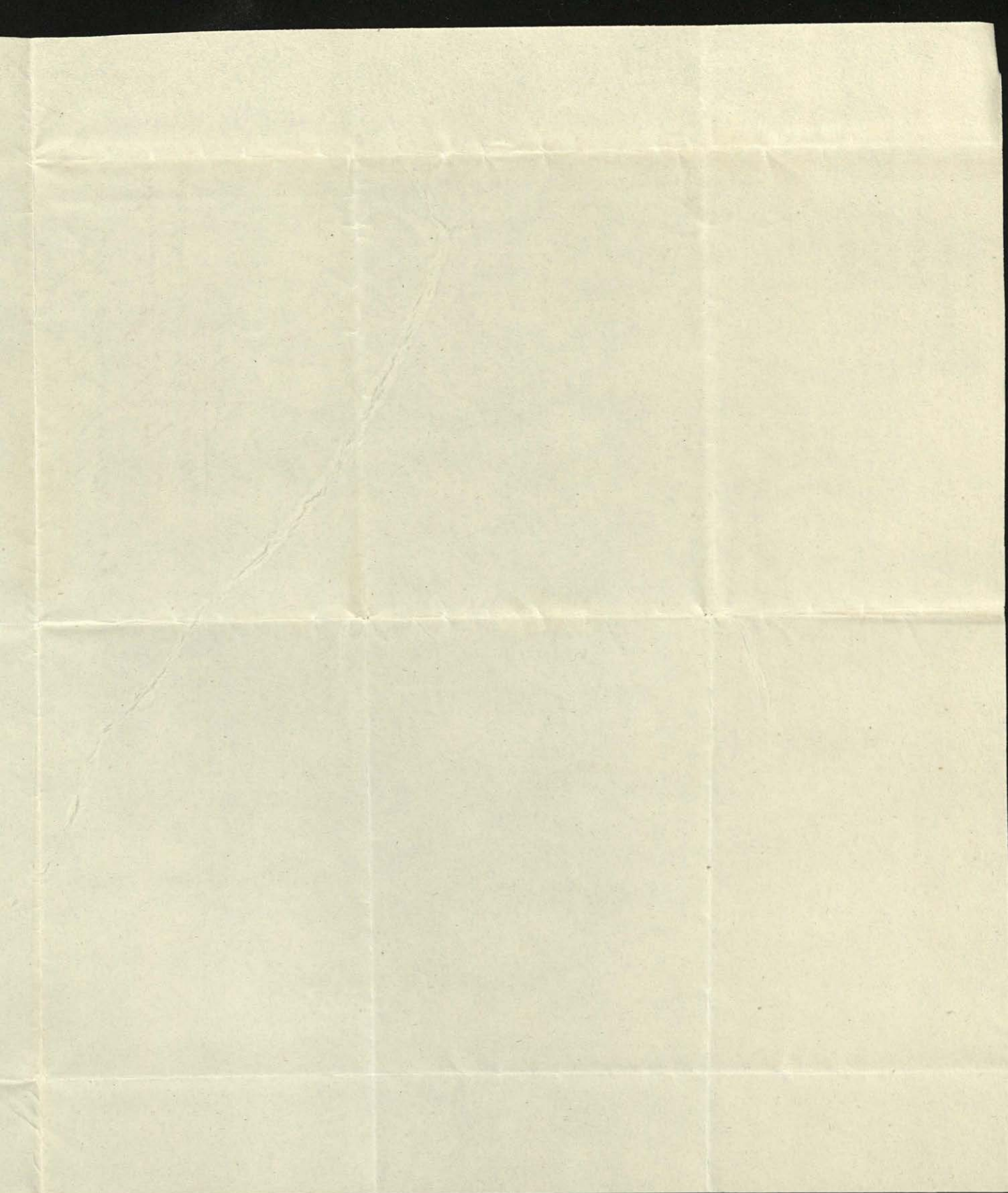

My Lord.

Having compared the Debentures which your Lordship was pleased to leave here on Wednesday, with the List of Warrants during His Royal Highness's Minority, which I had the honour to transmit to you on the 25th April last; I find we are now in possession of the whole excepting those drawn under the following Warrants, (viz.)

And also excepting a Debenture for £ 1478. 11. 2, part of the sum of £ 16,478. 11. 2. paid to the Earl of Albemarle under a Warrant dated 21st July 1766; for it appears that this sum was issued by two Debentures for £ 15,000. and £ 1478. 11. 2., the first of which is included amongst those with which your Lordship has now favoured us.

Your Lordship having been pleased further to deliver to me the original warrant directing the last mentioned Payment of £ 16,478. 11. 2. to Lord Albemarle, the whole of His Majesty's Warrants upon which the Debentures were drawn will now be in the Auditor's Custody, this alone being before wanting to complete the set; and I cannot sufficiently express my regret that your Lordship should have had so much trouble in searching for these papers.

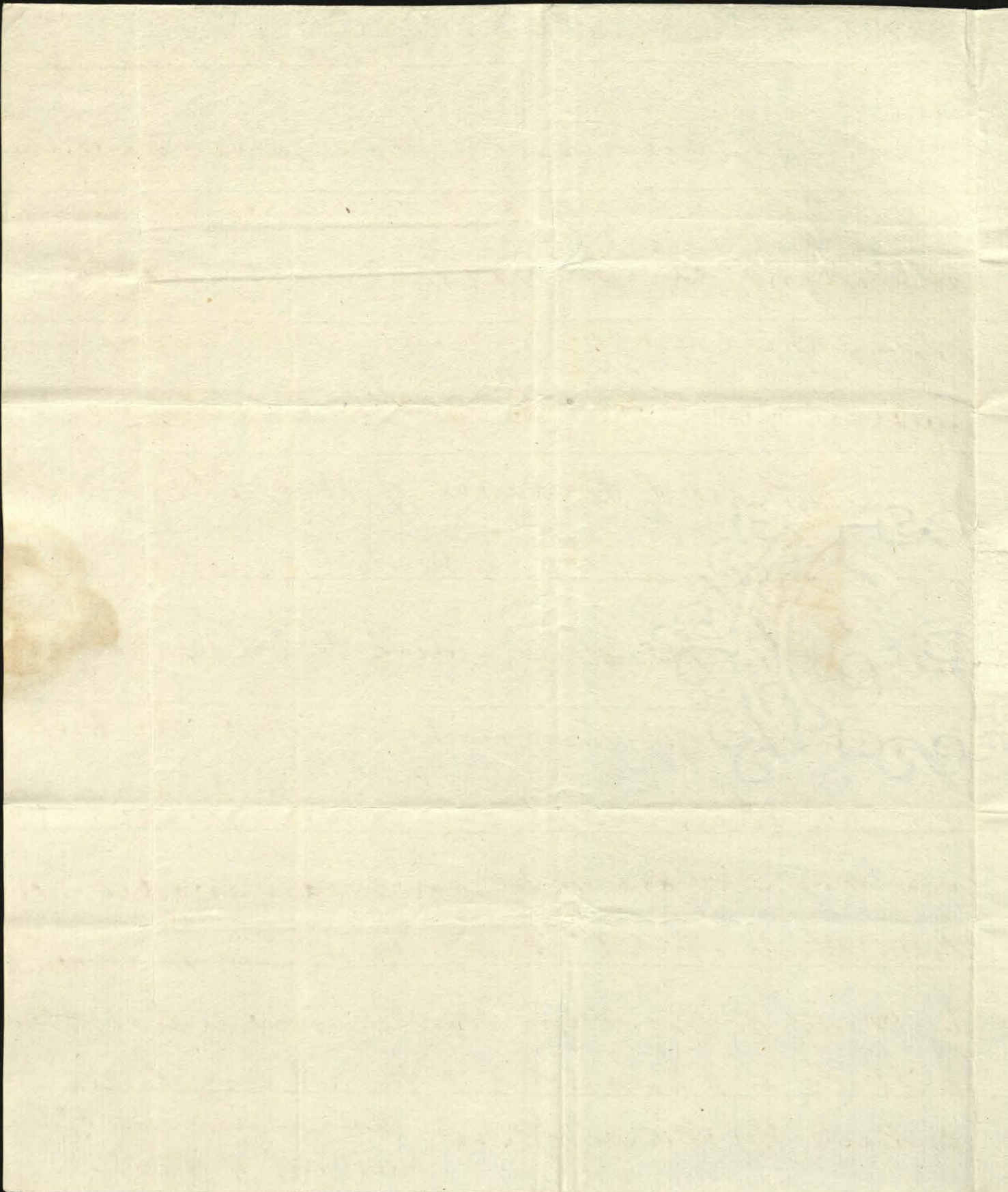

Burke, were this day delivered by the Right Hon^{ble} Lord Choc, Receiver General of the Duchy, into the Office of the Duchy of Cornwall, together with a subsequent Debenture & the Receipt thereof of Colonel Hotham for the Sum of £8000. 12. 6 paid out of these Revenues in pursuance of a Warrant dated 21. Feby 1784 signed by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, being the first Payment made after His Royal Highness came of Age.
