Lord Temple has the honor to present his humble duty to the Prince of Wales. He had no time in obeying His Royal Highness's Commands to make immediate enquiry after the copy of the Pamphlet in Mr Stuart's possession, and whether any means existed of gaining so valuable a piece of evidence out of his hands. The person whom Lord Temple employed is this morning returned from Mr Stuart, and Lord Temple feels very much ashamed to be under the necessity of laying before His Royal Highness the insolent and extravagant proposal which Mr Stuart deputed

and of which the enclosed is a Copy. Lord Temple
 begs to be permitted to make the humble offer
 of his Services in case His Royal Highness
 may conceive they can be of any further use
 to the attainment of this object. Lord Tem-
 -ple proposes, unless he shall receive the Prince
 of Wales' Commands to the contrary, to leave
 London tomorrow at twelve o'clock for Buck-
 -inghamshire, upon the business of his election.
 The person however whom Lord Temple em-
 -ployed shall have directions to communicate
 with Mr Taylor upon the business, in case
 Mr Taylor shall receive His Royal High-
 -ness' Commands to that effect. Lord Temple

however humbly intreats His Royal Highness will
 be pleased to give credit to his perfect readi-
 -ness and anxiety to remain in Town, if His
 Royal Highness should be of opinion that
 by so doing he can be of the smallest use.
