The humble Memorial of Mess^{rs}
Monkhouse and Rowland, Trustees of the
different Timber Merchants Creditors of the late
Edward Gray Saunders deceased; and also of the
Executors of the said Edward Gray Saunders.

Sheweth

That the said Edward Gray Saunders, who was
engaged as Builder to your Royal Highness at Brighton, died
in the month of December last, in very embarrassed circumstances,
having previous to his death, assigned over to your Memorialists
as Trustees for the different Timber Merchants who had furnished
Materials for carrying on the Works at Brighton, part of the
Debt due from your Royal Highness, on account of such Works,
for securing the payment of the Balance of their Debts; and
that the said Timber Merchants tho' in great Distress for
Money, have not received any payment whatever since the
stipulated advances have been discontinued by M^r Porden
your Royal Highness's Architect, which was sometime
previous to the death of the said Edward Gray Saunders.

And the Executors also shew unto your Royal
Highness, that a very large Body of the Creditors of the
said Edward Gray Saunders (independent of the Timber
Merchants) most of whom reside at Brighton, are daily

pressing upon them for payment of their debts, and that the only Fund from whence any of them can expect ever to obtain payment of their debts, is from the Balance now due from your Royal Highness, and they as well as the Timber Merchants have never received any payments since the death of their Testator.

That your Memorialists have repeatedly solicited Mr. Porden to adjust the Bill of the late Edward Gray Saunders, for the Buildings erected at Brighton, which has been made out and valued in conjunction with the persons employed to direct the execution of the said Works, but by Mr. Porden's departure from the best and most approved practice in settling the prices of Works which are not common and for which there is no precedent, a delay has taken place whereby the Creditors are much injured, and your Memorialists have no expectation of relief except from the benevolence of your Royal Highness.

Your Memorialists feel that they cannot venture to obtrude upon your Royal Highness's attention the various applications which have been made to Mr. Porden to settle the Bill in question, nor can they possibly assign any honorable or fair reason for his conduct in declining to adjust the same, but as it is of the utmost importance to the Creditors interested, many of whom are in indigent circumstances, and who are already suffering severely from the long credit, that decisive means should be taken to bring the matter to some issue, they caused a

Letter to be addressed to M.^r Borden expressing themselves anxious and ready to refer the Account to any Surveyor of Eminence, to ascertain the amount, and judge of the propriety of the Items, but M.^r Borden having declined acceding to the proposal, your Memorialists feel with deep regret that their duty obliges them to press upon your Royal Highness's attention (as the only alternative left them) the following Statement.

That the amount of the Bill for Work done is £17,573.. 17. 4½ and after giving Credit for what has been paid by M.^r Borden there still remains due and owing to your Memorialists the sum of £11,000: or thereabouts.

Your Memorialists are very confident, that unless your Royal Highness will be graciously pleased to make some order, with respect to the payment of the said Debt, through the Medium of your Officers, that they can place no reliance on any other mode of payment; And they trust that when your Royal Highness views the Distress and Inconvenience which the Timber Merchants and Creditors at Brighton, and elsewhere have sustained, the Exertions your Memorialists have made to get the Balance finally ascertained, and the length of time that has elapsed, since any payment has been made to them on account, you will take the hardship of their Case into Consideration and make such order as you may graciously think proper.

And your Memorialists the Executors

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further beg to solicit your Royal Highness' attention, to the Fact that the largest Debts now due from the late Edward Gray Saunders are Bond Debts, and that the whole Effects will be exhausted in paying Interest on the same, they therefore hope that your Royal Highness from motives of benevolence will admit of Interest upon the Ballance from Lady day last, until the whole of it is discharged, or otherwise, the Class of Creditors claiming merely on simple Contracts will be very materially injured, they not being intitled to receive any Dividend on their Debts until all the Bond Creditors have been paid and discharged.

Your Memorialists the Trustees and Executors can not help expressing their sorrow that they should be obliged to have recourse to the present measure, but having tried all other means none of which have proved successful, they trust that they shall find that relief which the known Justice and Humanity of your Royal Highness leads them confidently to expect — Your Memorialists therefore humbly solicit your Royal Highness's attention to the largeness of the Ballance now due (a Ballance unusual in Works of this nature,) they beg to impress upon your Mind the low and indigent state of a numerous set of Creditors, to prevent and allay whose clamors and probably personal applications, they have been compelled to pursue this measure, and above all they entreat a consideration of the peculiar hardship under which the great body of the Creditors labour, by reason of the effects of the Testator being

exhausted in paying Interest on a certain Class of Debts in their prejudice, and they can not but flatter themselves that under circumstances so favorable to their equitable claims, your Memorialists will be deemed intitled to an allowance of Interest on the Ballance of the Debt from Lady day last.

Your Memorialists therefore most humbly Entreat of your Royal Highness to consider the case of the Timber Merchants who have supplied the Timber for the Works at Brighton, and also a large Body of the Creditors of the said Edward Gray Saunders resident at Brighton, and elsewhere who entirely depend upon the Balance now due from your Royal Highness for the payment of their Debts, and that your Royal Highness will be pleased to order the payment of the same, and as your Memorialists are now paying Interest on large Bond Debts to the entire ruin of the other Creditors, that your Royal Highness will be pleased to allow Interest on the Balance from Lady day last and that your Royal Highness will be pleas'd to make such other Order as to your Royal Highness shall seem just and proper to afford your Memorialists relief.

Dear Sir

You will however see the impropriety of delivering any Agreement to him, until I have got the Money and I beg you will let me have them whatever they maybe, before they pass into his hands. I think it very extraordinary that he should attempt to do this in a manner that appears clandestine and I doubt whether the money will be forthcoming if he is let into possession before it be paid. 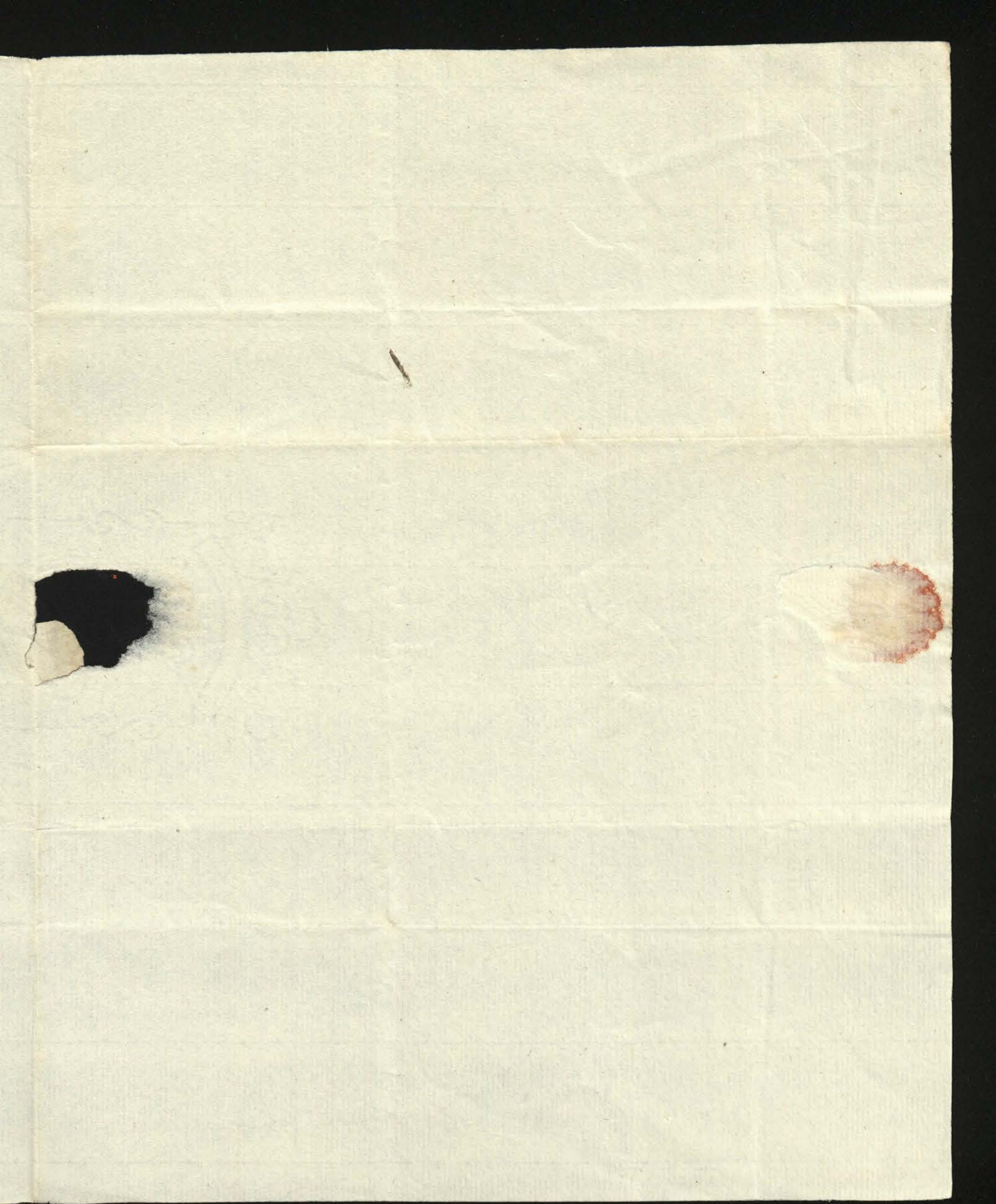

Brighton Dec. 23. 1806.

His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales is respectfully informed by Mr Porden that the delay in the building of the Riding House has arisen solely from the impossibility of procuring timber of sufficient size for a Roof of such width. When the Prussian Ports were blockaded, Timber rose to an enormous price, and the merchants would not part with large timber at any price till the Ports were again opened, and it was not till the 26th of September that Mr Porden was able to procure what he wanted. It is hourly expected in Shoreham Harbour and he still flatters himself that by Christmas the Roof will be compleat though the building will not be cleared out for use.

His Royal Highness is also respectfully informed that Mr Porden was under the necessity of delaying the alteration of the Offices because his Funds were not sufficient to carry them on and the Riding House at the same time. Mr Porden is only allowed 2000 £ a quarter out of which during the summer he is frequently obliged to pay 1500 £ for labour only, leaving a very small balance for materials, which in so large a Building as the Riding House (the largest in England) is much more than double the amount of labour. For these materials Mr Porden is obliged to pay ready money as far as he is able; but the Arrears of course are very considerable, and continuing to encrease become very distressing, and will be more so as Mr

M^r Porden has received intimation from His Royal Highnesses Treasury that He cannot be paid any part of the usual allowance at Christmas because other services will engross the whole of the Funds.

M^r Porden is extremely concerned to be under the necessity of making this Report to His Royal Highness. It would have been his Pleasure and his Pride to have compleated the works he has the Honour to conduct for His Royal Highness at the close of this year; but it could not be done without involving himself and many Tradesmen in ruin and eventually causing much vexation to His Royal Highness. The Applications which have been made to His Royal Highness from the Creditors of M^r Saunders are the consequences of carrying on the circular building more rapidly than the finances would discharge.

With regard to the Rot which has appeared in the Partition M^r Porden respectfully informs His Royal Highness that he has carefully examined it and made particular inquiries of the Servants and finds it only in two places, namely, in the Water closet by the private Staircase and in one of the Windows of the Yellow Anti Room. Both these defects are the consequences of damp from without and not what is usually denominated dry Rot. The first being caused by the mould of the Garden, which has been thrown too high against the Studio, the other by the rain beating under the

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outside Shunting of the French Window. Mr Porden has given directions for repairing the damages which will only be a few days work, and he hopes to be able to prevent the like Injuries in future.

Dear Sir

I am harassed with Letters from the Tradesmen at Brighton who have done work or furnished Materials for His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales under my direction and one of them has commenced an Action whose demand if I cannot prove my acting as an Agent, I shall be obliged to pay. - It was a cruel thing in Government to insist on the repayment of the money, borrowed by the Prince, at Christmas, as a disappointment at that time is more severely felt than at any other season of the Year. The distress of many of these Creditors is I believe very great and the clamour against His Royal Highness will be in proportion. I beg that you will represent this to General Hulse and request that he will have the goodness to do something for me.

I shall also be obliged to you to inform me whether I may rely on receiving any money in April as on that assurance my conduct must be immediately regulated. You will be sensible that a disappointment of the nature

I experience this Christmass must alarm me very much and render it imprudent to proceed any further, without the receipt of money is made more certain. While I depended on receiving £2000 every Quarter, if I pushed beyond that Sum in any one Quarter when the nature of my works rendered a greater exertion necessary, I could recover it in the next Quarter or at the conclusion could calculate when the Arrear would be discharged, but the Money being unexpectedly stopped, all my calculations are rendered futile, and the confidence which subsisted between me and the Tradesmen is destroyed, and I shall hereafter find it difficult to proceed till I have the means of regaining that confidence.

The stoppage of Money at this Quarter had been particularly distressing to me on another account. Had I received the usual allowance at Christmass, I should have been enabled to cover in the Riding House and to have enclosed my works in such a manner that if His Royal Highness had done nothing more there would have been no defect in the Public eye, instead of which the naked timbers of the roof of the Riding House stand exposed to all weathers, a monument of

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disgrace to His Royal Highness and all concerned. -
I once more beg you will have the goodness to represent
the subject of this Letter to General Hulse and
favour me with an Answer as soon as you can.

Dear Sir

I have received the most earnest requests from Colonel Bloomfield to do a number of things at Brighton, which it is impossible for me to comply with under my present uncertainty with regard to receipts from the Prince's Treasury. I have stated this to the Colonel who assures me that General Kulse has promised that I shall have Two thousand Pounds next quarter; but comparing this assurance with what you said when I last had the pleasure of seeing you, I cannot have all the confidence in it which probably it deserves. I shall be much obliged to you for your advice on this point with the same frankness that you have given it on similar Occasions. I have strictly confined my expences since Christmas to what was positively necessary to be done, but the size of my present

buildings unavoidably causes me to expend more than
I would otherwise do. When the Riding House is covered
in I shall be able to restrain the works still more.

My workmen complain heavily, that they are
not paid while the Tradesmen employed at Carleton
House regularly receive their money; a complaint
that I know not how to answer.

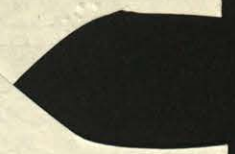

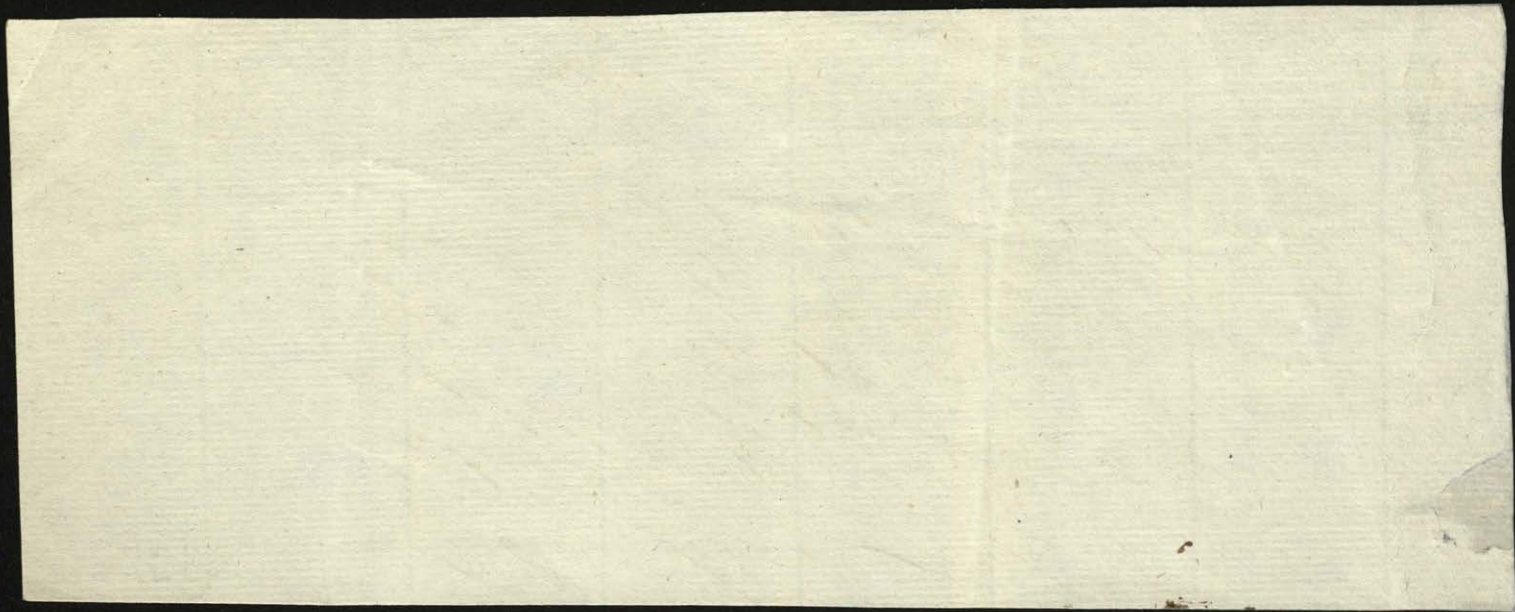

Mr. Porden humbly begs leave to submit the following particulars to the consideration of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, before an answer is given to a Memorial which has been presented by Mr. Cobb, the proprietor of the Brighton Theatre, as Mr. Porden has been informed by Mr. Bicknell, His Royal Highness's Solicitor.

Some time in the Year 1806, Mr. Brunton introduced Mr. Cobb to Mr. Porden to treat for the purchase of a piece of Ground in the New Street at Brighton for the purpose of building a Theatre there, and it was subsequently agreed that he should take One Hundred feet for a Lease of Nine Hundred and ninety nine Years, for which he was to pay the Sum of Twelve Hundred and fifty Pounds, of which a part was to be paid down, and the rest within a limited time which Mr. Porden does not now remember.

After this verbal arrangement, Mr. Cobb took possession of the Ground without the knowledge of Mr. Porden, and without paying any part of the purchase Money, and without any written agreement, and in preparing to build his Theatre, he turned the rubbish on other Ground belonging to His Royal Highness, from which

it cannot be removed without considerable Expence.

Mr. Porden having remonstrated with Mr. Cobb, he tendered an Agreement to Mr. Bicknell for the signature of General Hulse, which did not correspond with the terms verbally settled with Mr. Porden, and did not specify any time for payment of the Purchase Money, or give any security for it.

Mr. Bicknell with that attention which he pays to all matters of business, having shewn this Agreement to Mr. Porden, another was prepared more conformable to the original Terms, at the executing of which, Mr. Cobb paid to Mr. Porden Five Hundred Pounds, part of the Purchase money, and gave bills at three Months date for the remaining Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds, which bills were due December 27. 1806.

Before the bills above mentioned became payable, an Abstract of His Royal Highness's title was delivered to Mr. Cobb, against which he raised a frivolous objection, and on that pretence, the bills were dishonoured, and returned to Mr. Porden, who was obliged to replace their value by money which had been appropriated to works which His Royal Highness was very anxious to have compleated.

This objection being removed by the exertions of Mr. Bicknell, the bills were paid as money to His Royal Highness's

Tradesmen, but payment was still refused.

In the course of the Year 1807, Mr. Cobb completed the building of his Theatre on a much less scale than he had represented it to Mr. Porden, and without any communication with Mr. Porden obtained His Royal Highness's consent to grant him a separate conveyance in fee, which was contrary to his Agreement, and placed him with regard to His Royal Highness in a situation very different from that in which he originally stood.

In the mean while ^{one of} the Tradesman to whom the bills had been paid on account of His Royal Highness, became impatient for his money, and commenced a suit with Mr. Cobb, who after having tried every other means to evade the payment of the money, has had recourse to the Memorial which this Statement of Facts is meant to answer.

Mr. Porden thinks it his duty to request His Royal Highness's attention to the conduct of Mr. Cobb as here represented. He first makes an advantageous bargain. He then without entering into any written contract irregularly takes possession of the Ground, and does other acts which would have subjected him to heavy legal penalties, had he been dealing with a private Person. He then tenders an Agreement

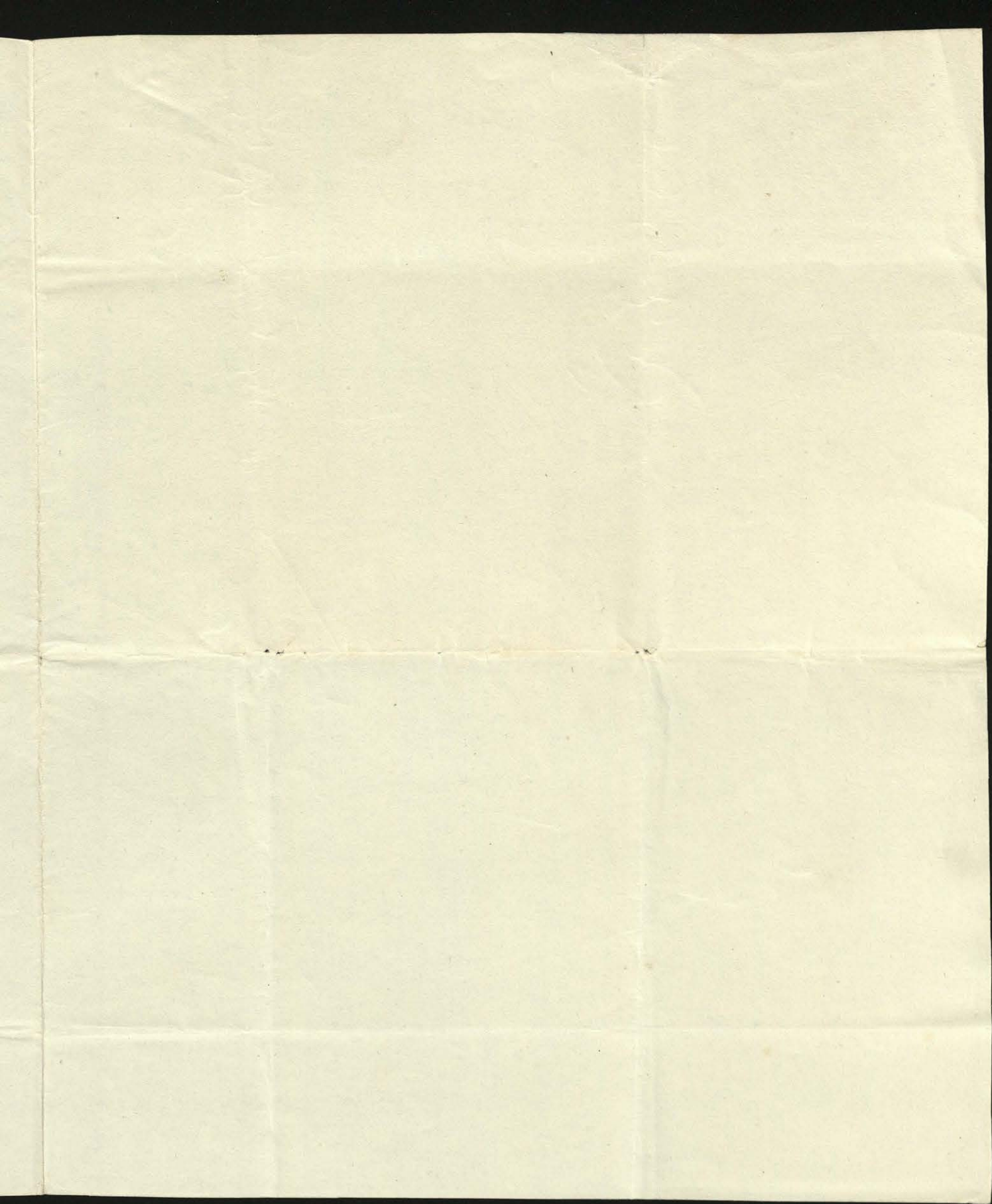
to His Royal Highness's official Servants, which provides no security for the payment of the Purchase money. He then is compelled to execute one nearer to the original stipulations, and gives bills for the payment of a very considerable part of the Money. Before these bills become due, he raises a frivolous objection to the Title, apparently to evade the payment, and on that pretence the bills are dishonoured. The title is afterwards properly completed, yet he still refuses payment. After this he obtains the consent of His Royal Highness, who doubtless was unacquainted with the facts above stated, to a separate conveyance of the Theatre only; and that in fee, though he was only entitled to a long Lease; and after all, petitions His Royal Highness to exonerate him from the remaining part of his contract, to avoid the payment of bills that have been upwards of twelve Months due.

Mr. Porden respectfully requests His Royal Highness's attention to Mr. Cobbs conduct through the whole of his transactions, as that of an artful man, constantly endeavouring to carry a point of very great benefit to himself, by methods which His Royal Highness's Official Servants could not counteract, but by measures which their own characters,

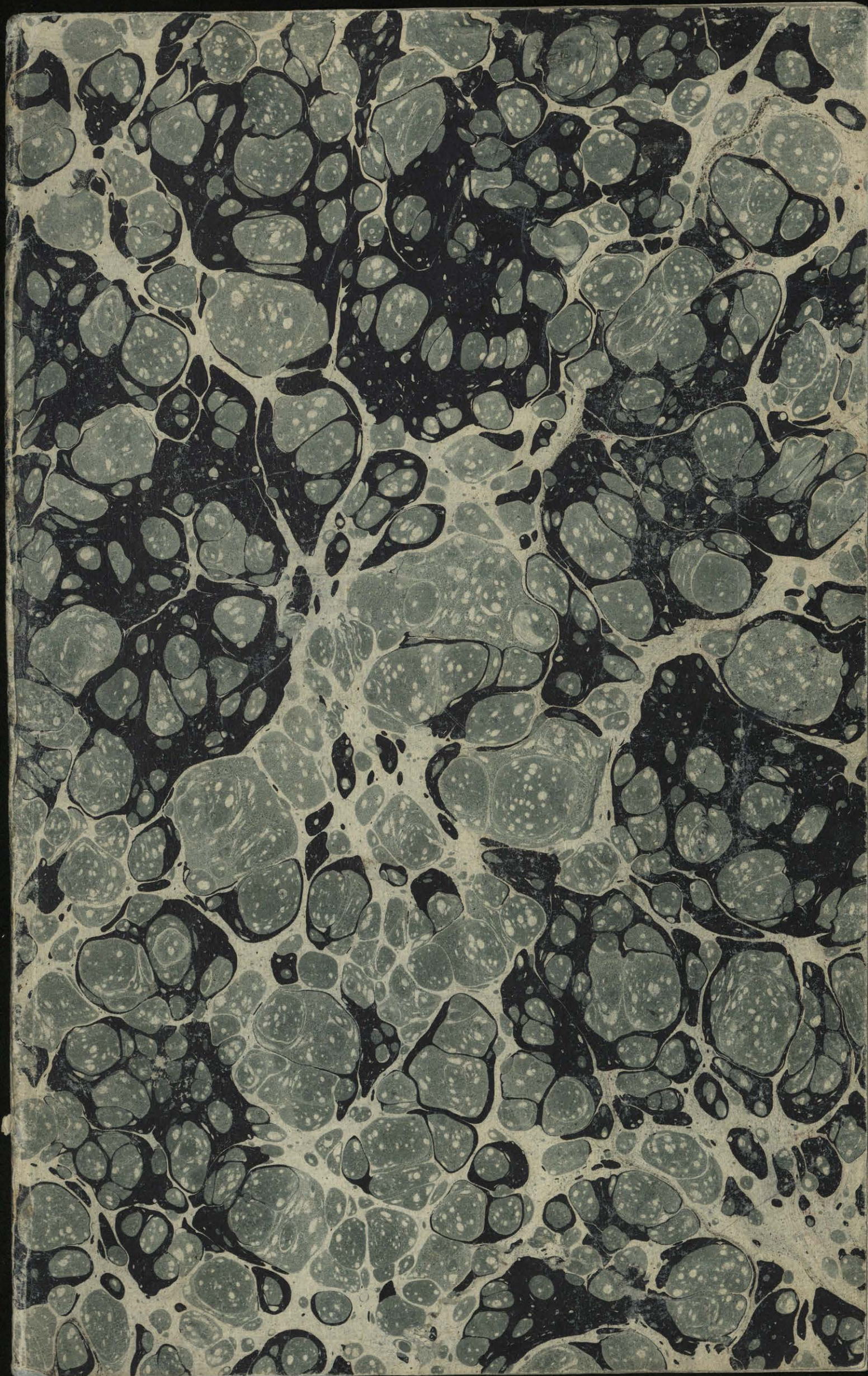

but above all, the high rank of His Royal Highness forbid them to use, and he humbly requests further that His Royal Highness will be pleased to consider the inconvenience which will be the consequence of His Royal Highness's granting the prayer of the Memorial. In the first place, it will render the legal cautions of His Royal Highness's Servants to protect His Royal Highness's rights, of no effect. Secondly, it will cause great distress to a very worthy Tradesman, whose exertions for His Royal Highness has deserved great recommendation, and Thirdly, it may subject Mr. Porden to an Action at Law, as endorser of the bills, if the money is not supplied from His Royal Highness's Treasury.

Dear Sir

In the mean-while the Person who holds the bills will pursue me at law for their Amount, and all the dreaded exposure will take place in a much more public manner than if the present Action is suffered to take its course. With regard to security what can be relied on, that Mr. Cobb says or does?

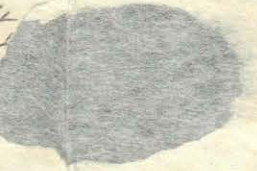
As to interesting His Royal Highness for him

I would not do it if I had the means because it would be unjust to His Royal Highness, for in the whole of the transaction. The Prince has been ill used, and so little reason has Mr. Cobb to complain, that I can make it appear I could have made £500 perhaps £1000 more of the Property if he had not obtained a promise of it, or pretended to have obtained it, from His Royal Highness.

In my opinion The Prince's Friends would do well to resist every thing of this Nature as the best means of preventing similar actions and threats. The Payment of Cooke's bill, who commenced an Action against me, has produced such a number of threats that my House is rendered miserable, and I can only defend myself from ruin by proving openly that the debts are not mine; but the Prince's.

Sir,
 We, the Undersigned, proprietors of some houses situated oppo-
 site to the new buildings, annexed to the Pavilion at Brighton,
 formerly called the Stables, were among those Inhabitants, whose con-
 sent to the alteration of the old Road leading into the Town, His Royal
 Highness of Prince Regent condescended to ask about 15 years ago -
 We beg leave to recall to your recollection that you were the Gentle-
 man who came to ask our consent to the change of Road, and to
 remind you, that we were induced to assent to and approve of the altera-
 tion, in consequence of the great care and anxiety demonstrated by you
 that no person should sustain the slightest injury -

You promised to all of us individually, the amplest remuneration,
 if any loss or injury should be sustained; and declared that no obstruction
 but a slight fence should be carried across the Road, and nothing planted
 which might intercept our view into His Royal Highness' grounds, but
 a few shrubs.

Prevailed on, by these kind & considerate assurances from His Royal
 Highness, you readily obtained our consent - we cheerfully resigned over
 to you, the power of injuring us, and took no security beyond that gora-
 test and best security, the word of His Royal Highness delivered to us
 by Yourself.

We have suffered severely by the alteration, but have not yet desisted
ourselves of the Hope, that we shall find relief from the same quarter,
which gave birth to the expectation.

We shall now state to you in what manner we feel ourselves aggrieved.
The situation of our House was among the best in Brighton - we com-
manded a full view of the Pavilion - to the right we were connected with
the best and busiest part of the Town, and to the left we had an immense
drive outlet to the Downs - All Visitors coming to Brighton, from necessity
passed our Doors, and that advantage, combined with the gaiety of its
situation, its fine Air and easy Access, rendered it most desirable for
lodging Houses, Private Boarding, Shops, Coach Offices &c.

The Alteration of the Road has completely removed all these advantages
- Our Houses are now confined in an obscure and neglected corner:
we cannot let them while any others remain unoccupied, and all specu-
lations on them, for the purposes of Shops, Coach Offices &c. would be useless
in so dull and infrequent a quarter.

It would be difficult for us to estimate precisely our loss, since one of
the Houses, Mrs Shergold's, was never let previous to 1814 a period subsequent
to the alteration: and Mr Hall, finding that no visitor at Brighton
would reside in that neighbourhood, has been obliged to let his Houses at
low prices to periodical Tenants. - Mrs Shergold, not without the justest
ground, places her loss at £100 a year and Mr Hall considers his loss
equally great, the relative size of his Houses being considered.

But this is not all - The repairs which have been carrying on at the Pavilion for some years, have made bad, worse, and rendered our Houses intolerably disagreeable. Millions of bricks have been heaped up in front of our windows - immense quantities of filth, mortar, timber and every noisome material which accompany carpenters and bricklayers have been laid at our doors - The Viscount who resort to Brighton have fled from this noisy neighbourhood with disgust, and a very respectable family lately abandoned Mrs. Mergold's house, because they found how little comfort could be enjoyed in it.

Our object in writing to you is two fold. In the first place we feel convinced that if the Matter were properly represented to His Royal Highness there is that bounty and benevolence in His Royal Highness' bosom, which would prompt him to relieve us from those misfortunes which have arisen out of our anxiety to please and serve him ^{In the second place} - but if the exalted station of His Royal Highness stand place, an insurmountable barrier to our Prayers: if you remain insensible to the injuries and toils which (however innocently) you have brought upon us; we shall then consider ourselves as being called on to resort to other means of obtaining redress, and resort to them with Temperance and Prudence.

From the Reasons herein detailed we hope you will be convinced that we have received great injuries and our property much lessened in value - we cannot help considering you as the cause of them both, nor can we ever forget the promise so often repeated by you that His Royal Highness would most willingly and amply satisfy us for any injuries

which the alteration of the Road might bring upon us.

At that Time we pointed out to you the Evils which might happen
and we now only claim a Remuneration for injuries which we then
apprehended, and ask for nothing more than the performance of direct
and voluntary promises.

If we cannot make out a plain, and meritorious case to any respecta-
ble characters whom we shall appoint conjointly with yourself; if our claims
should be found not just and reasonable, let them be rejected.

We have submitted for 15 years to great privations and difficulties, we
have patiently and quietly borne with our injuries, we have never importuned
you with complaints and we hope that this will serve to demonstrate
our loyalty, and duty and affection to His Royal Highness.

Having waited one Month for a reply to this letter and finding that
that our Injuries are neglected, we shall consider ourselves allowed to proceed
in the Matter as we and our Friends may advise.

Whereas His said Royal Highness did sometime before the death of Louis Welshie Esquire heretofore of Brightelmstone aforesaid contract and agree with him for the absolute purchase of a certain Dwelling house with the Stables and Garden thereunto belonging situate at Brightelmstone aforesaid and also the Ground whereon the same are erected adjoining or near to the Pavilion at Brightelmston aforesaid the Residence of his said Royal Highness and being within and held of such Moiety of the said Manor of Brightelmston of which the said Charles Serase Dickins is now the Lord as aforesaid which said several Premises have not as yet been surrendered to his said Royal Highness but such Surrender is intended to be forthwith made by the proper persons representing and claiming under him the said Louis Welshie. And his said Royal Highness did also sometime since contract and agree with Philip Nichell Esquire of Brightelmston aforesaid for the purchase of a certain piece or parcel of Ground at Brightelmston aforesaid whereon part of the Riding house belonging to his said Royal Highness hath been since erected and built and is now standing and being which hath not as yet been, but is intended to be forthwith surrendered to him.

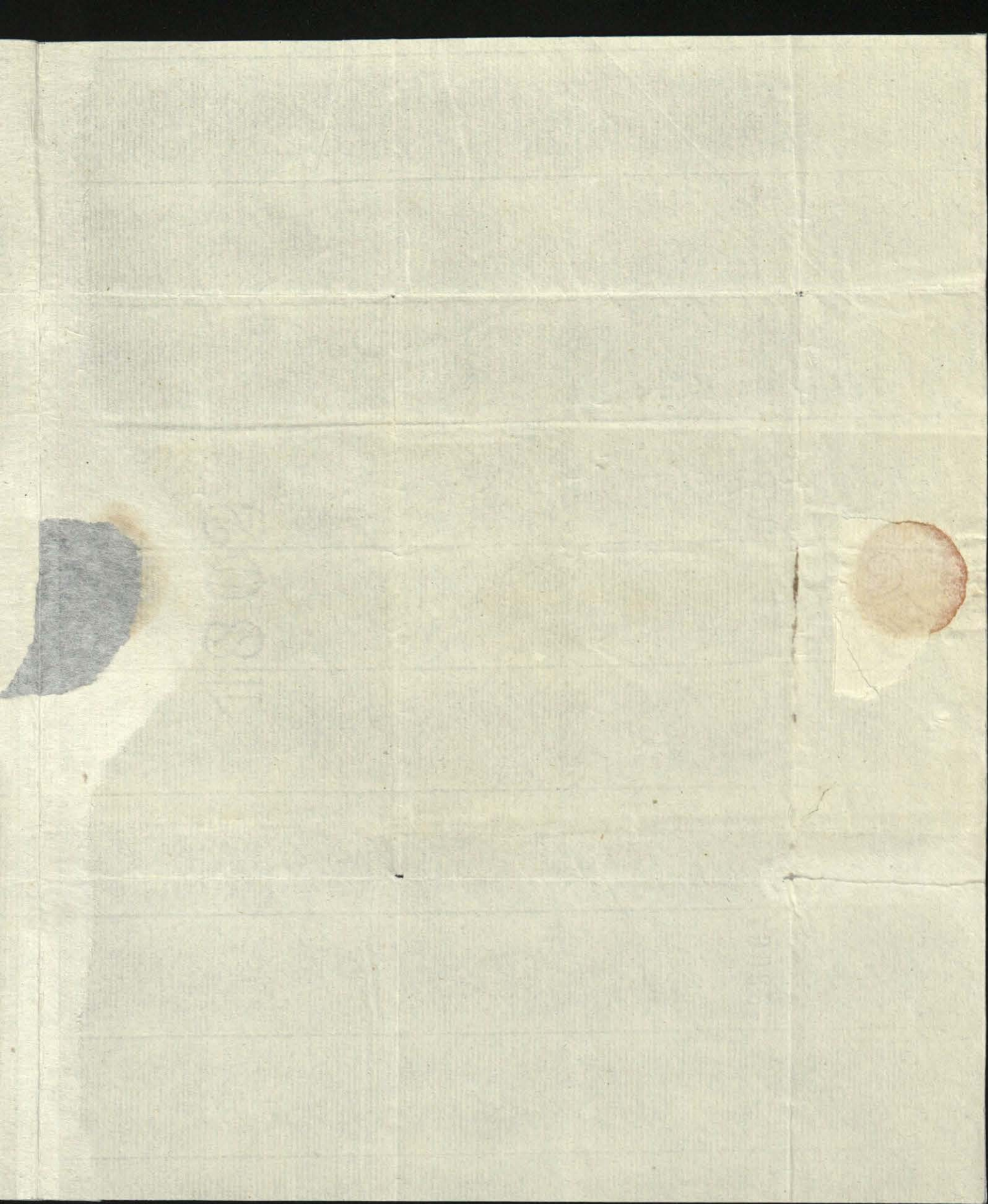

Question 1st

What are the Nature and Condition of Mr Porden's engagements with His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, with respect to the repairs of the Pavilion at Brighton? and what duties has Mr Porden to perform, when the work is done by Contract, in order to justify a Claim for remuneration for the performance thereof.

Answer

Mr Porden was not under any specific Engagement with His Royal Highness respecting the Works in which The Prince was pleased to employ him as Architect and Surveyor. He received and studied the Prince's directions to make Designs for several new Buildings at Brighton and prepared the same accordingly, and he directed and superintended such new buildings as the Prince was pleased to command and with such variations as His Royal Highness required to have made. He also made several Designs for altering enlarging and Embellishing the Pavilion and for converting the old Stables into a Suite of Offices and directed and superintended all such Repairs to the Pavilion and its appurtenances as from

time to time became necessary to be done

He also was employed by the Prince to treat for the purchase of Sundry Buildings and Grounds necessary for carrying His Royal Highness's projected Structures into execution and for the alteration of the Road into the Town of Brighton, of which he made a variety of Surveys and plans and also plans for allotting and reselling such parts of the Grounds purchased as were not wanted for the Princes use and plans to be annexed to the Deeds and conveyances both of Grounds purchased and those that were resold. Mr. Porden also transacted a variety of other business of which it is scarcely possible to give an adequate idea in writing at this distance of time; though it is well known to the Gentlemen in attendance on the Prince and to the people of Brighton.

The Princes works were not done by contract but partly by Master Tradesmen in the usual mode of such business and partly by workmen employed and paid by Mr Porden through the hands of the Clerk of the Works and a considerable part of the materials for carrying on the works were necessarily found by Mr Porden and for the payment of which he was obliged to make himself personally responsible, in all those Cases and in all other Cases his duties as Architect and Surveyor are to make the plans and Designs

to a large amount and for directing and superintending the work executed by daily workmen, and also a Commission of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per Cent on the amount of the Purchases and sale of Houses and Land and of the Rents received and paid by him. And for the several Articles of extraneous business (of which apart has been enumerated above), Mr Porden has made such charges as appeared to him reasonable and proper which are described and Specified in the Accounts he has delivered.

Question 6th

Is Mr Porden to be considered as responsible that the Materials have been good of their kind, and fit for the uses to which they have been applied, and that the workmanship has been properly executed?

Answer 6th.

Mr Porden has already stated that it is the duty of an Architect & Surveyor to see that the Materials are good in their kind and that the workmanship is properly executed; but how far he is responsible - he is not competent to determine. In this respect Mr Porden stands on the same Ground as Mr Holland stood or any other Architect employed by the Prince when Master Tradesmen were employed, Mr Porden conceives they are answerable for the materials they respectively use; which cannot always be seen by the Architect before they are manufactured nor their goodness determined by

Mr. Porden has found among his Papers the copy of the Paper alluded to in the 8th Question, and of an other Paper subsequently delivered the originals of which are in the possession of Mr Gray. These Mr. Porden believes to be the only Estimates that were made and as they will best speak for themselves Mr Porden begs leave to refer Mr Tucker to them.

Question 4th

Where are these Estimates? —

Answer

This question is answered in the above.

Question 5th

Mr. Porden will be pleased to state, generally, the points of Expenditure, or of workmanship, upon which he considers himself entitled to a Commission — the extent of each charge, or commission; respectively — and the ground upon which it is claimed.?

Answer 5th

As Architect Mr Porden considers himself entitled to a Commission of 5 £ per Cent on the Gross Expenditure for all the works executed under his direction, and he has charged a further Commission of 2½ per Cent partly for measuring and valuing the works as surveyor but chiefly for extra trouble in procuring materials and the anxiety attending his personal responsibility

to carry on the works, How the sum of $\text{£}14,555$ was paid to him, and how long the Quarterly payment was continued will be best understood by referring to the accounts. It received some interruptions especially at the Christmas Quarter of 1806 which involved Mr Porden in distress and difficulty. and subsequently he was informed by a letter from Mr Gray that the payments in future must be reduced to $\text{£}1000$ a Quarter; but he believes this last regulation was never acted upon as it does not appear that Mr Porden ever received a payment of $\text{£}1000$. -

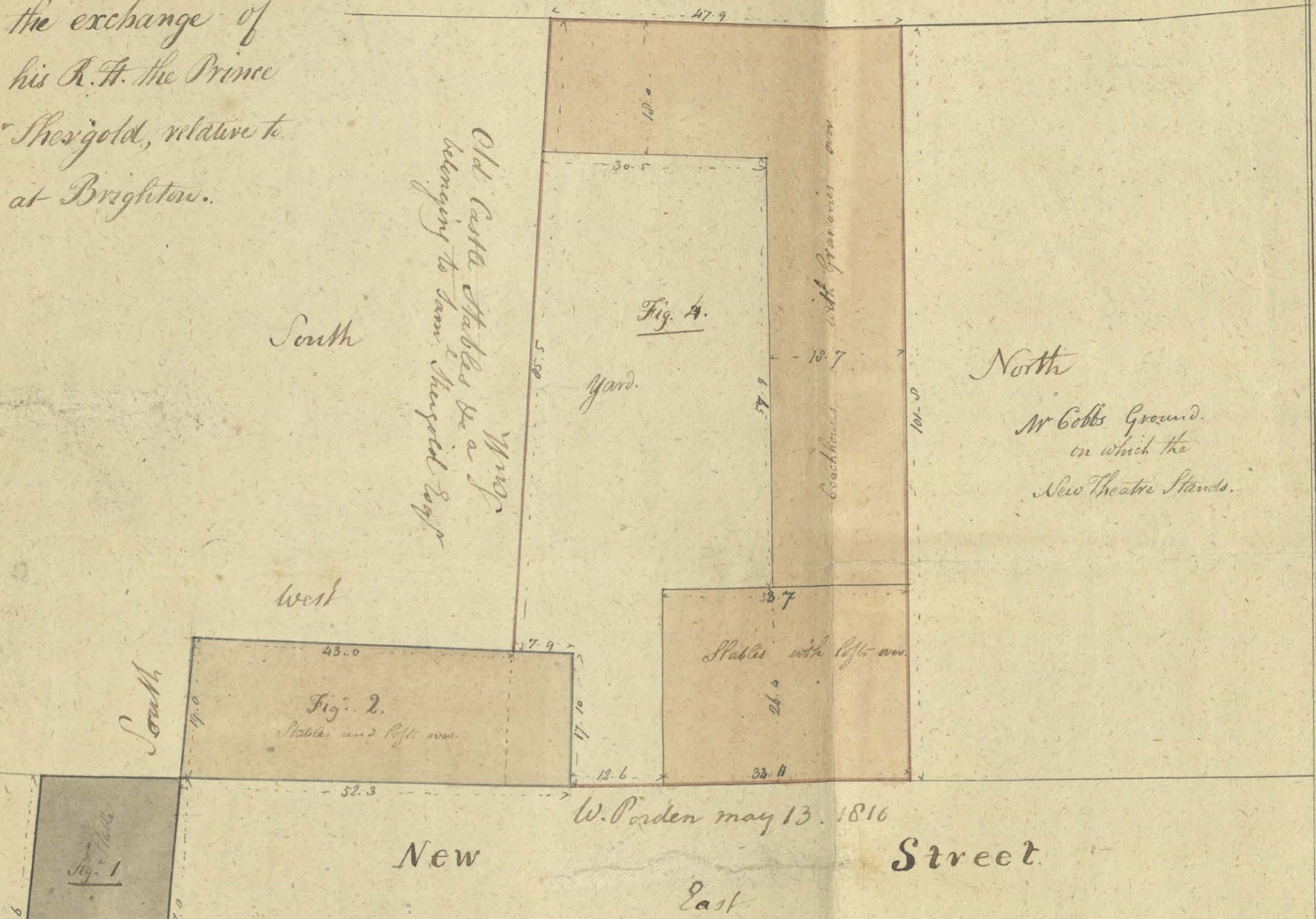

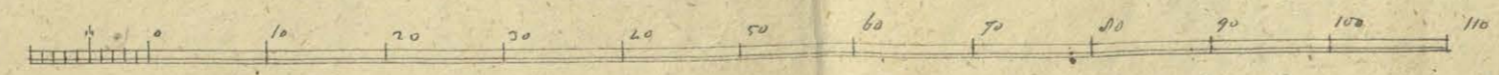

Plan showing the exchange of Property between his R.H. the Prince of Wales. and Mr Sheppard, relative to the Castle Stables at Brighton.



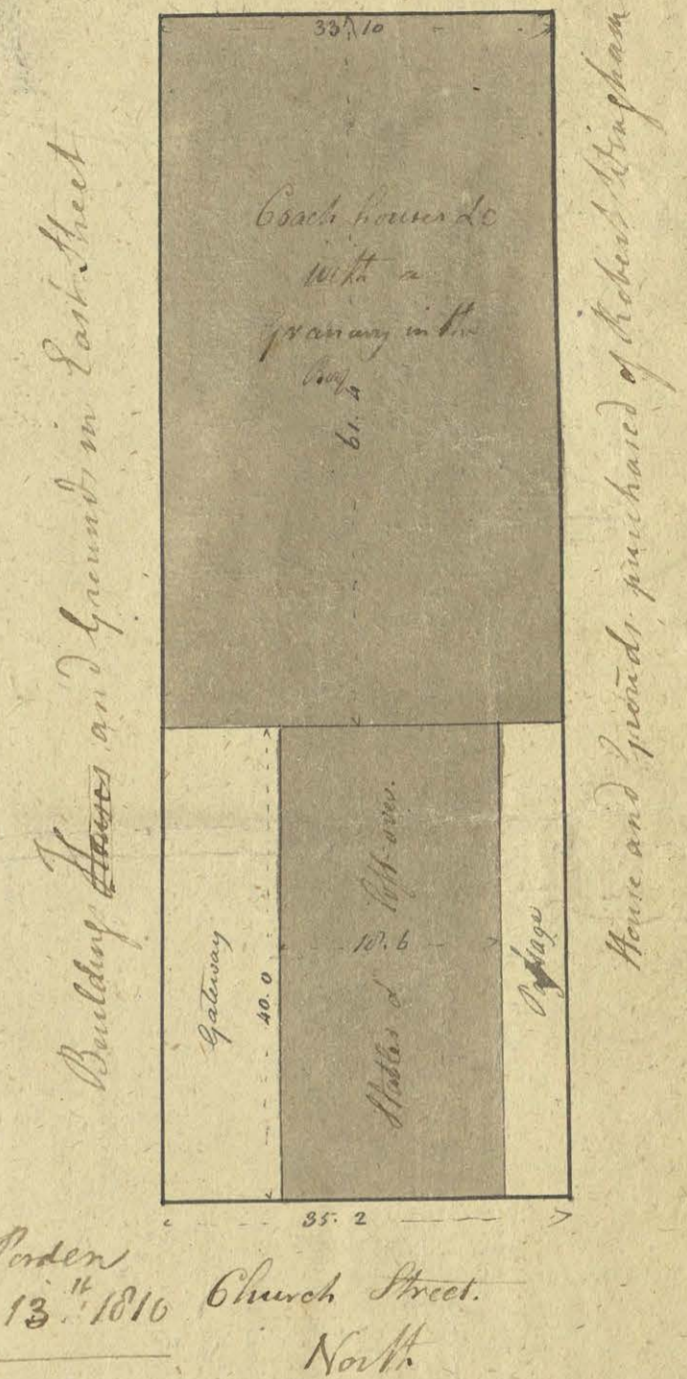
