Sir

It being represented to His Majesty that the further suspension of the proposed alterations in the Lord Steward's apartments at the Pavilion may occasion much inconvenience, I have to signify the King's Commands for the work before begun there being again entered upon and despatched without delay; and I have to desire that you will forthwith inform Mr. Tupper thereof, that no time may be lost on his part in completing what he had undertaken.

If I rightly comprehend the nature of the proposed alterations, the chief object is to enlarge the Lord Steward's apartments by throwing into them a small adjoining House or Building, or a piece of adjoining ground, part of Mr. John Hall's Premises lately agreed to be purchased by His Majesty, the completion of which purchase in some sort depends on effecting another purchase, also in treaty, as to Property of the late Mr. Benj<sup>n</sup> Hall; and it is partly owing to this circumstance that the alterations were ordered to be suspended; but His Majesty's Solicitor, Mr. Bicknell, has written

to

to Mr. John Hall for his consent to the revival  
of the Work, that no advantage may be taken thereof  
in case of the purchase not being completed from  
any defect of title or otherwise, which, tho' by no  
means likely, it is proper to provide against.

It is necessary to observe that when  
these Alterations were first put in hand, it was  
estimated that the Expense thereof would not  
altogether exceed £430. I presume that Estimate  
was made by you.

I understood Mr. Nash, when I saw  
him some time back, that you had drawn  
upon him for your Salary to April last. You  
may draw upon me for what was due at  
Windsor; but, if not inconvenient to you, I could  
wish it to be deferred for some Weeks, as I am  
going to Cheltenham. Any letter however you  
may have occasion to address to me will be  
immediately forwarded to that place, or wherever  
else I may be; and tho' it be your desire to receive  
the Windsor's Quarter before my return, I will  
take care to arrange for its being paid in my

I would not willingly be thought troublesome but more than nine months have now elapsed since I was led fully to expect the settlement of my account delivered for the Fittings up for the Gas Lights at His Majesty's Pavilion, Brighton and which account I was clearly given to understand was to be paid from the Privy Purse as soon as the Job was completed, I had the order for the execution of the same from J. Nash Esq<sup>r</sup> under the signature of Sir Benjamin Bloomfield of which I am in possession, I have written Sir Benjamin on the subject some time since but have received no reply, a copy of which on the other side, I have also an account on His Majesty, up to the first of January last amounting to £608.8.2½ which I delivered to J. Nash Esq<sup>r</sup> who informs me the same was to be presented at your Office, a Remittance of which or any part thereof would be particularly useful to me the beginning of next month having some heavy payments then becoming due, Your attention will very much oblige, Sir Your most Obedient Servant

Sir

The Account of Works executed at Brighton under the direction of Mr. Nash was closed at Michaelmas 1821, when some few Bills remained unpaid to different Tradesmen, amongst which I find one, amounting to £76.2.9, for Sheet Iron Linseed Oil &c. in the name of "J. Palmer". If this applies to yourself, I shall be ready to discharge it upon your transmitting a Receipt for the amount. It appears by Mr. Nash's Account that he had discharged all previous bills in your name up to Christmas 1820, amounting to £8462.16.10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>.

Your letter of 22<sup>nd</sup> instant mentions an Account of £608.8.2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> to 5<sup>th</sup> January 1822 still due; but I have never before received information of such an Account, and whatever it may relate to, I must beg you to observe that the payments from the Privy Purse were meant to be confined to Building Accounts. On this ground, & having no instructions to the contrary from the late Keeper of the Privy Purse, I declined taking cognizance of the Bill you sent hither for a Chandelier, dated 14<sup>th</sup> Janry 1822, amounting to £735-, together with another Bill for Gas Burners & the attendance of a man to clean the glasses from 5<sup>th</sup> Janry to 20<sup>th</sup> Sept. 1822 amounting to £62.1.9; and I have only further to observe that either you or I must be under a great error if Accounts of such nature are to be deemed chargeable against His Majesty's private & personal Income.

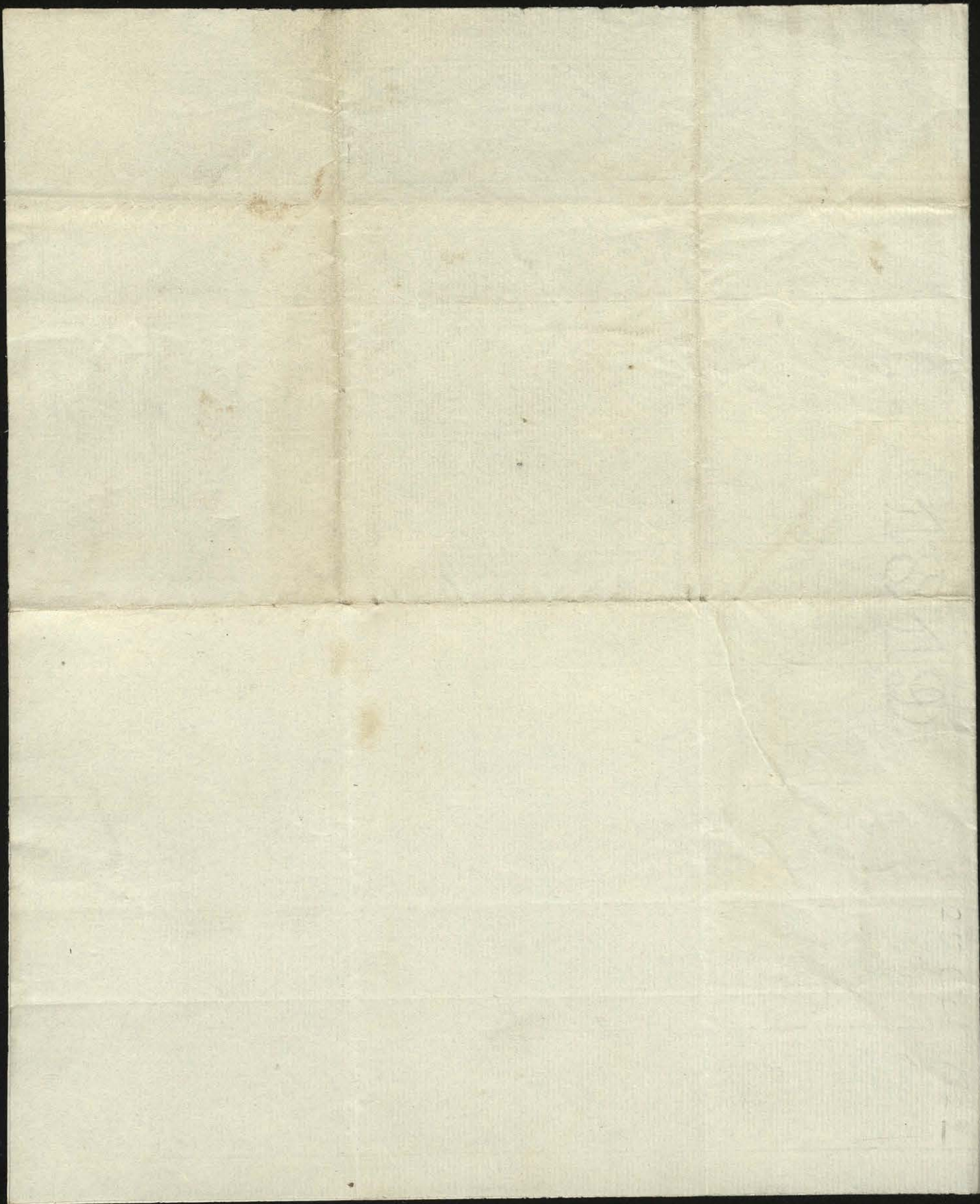

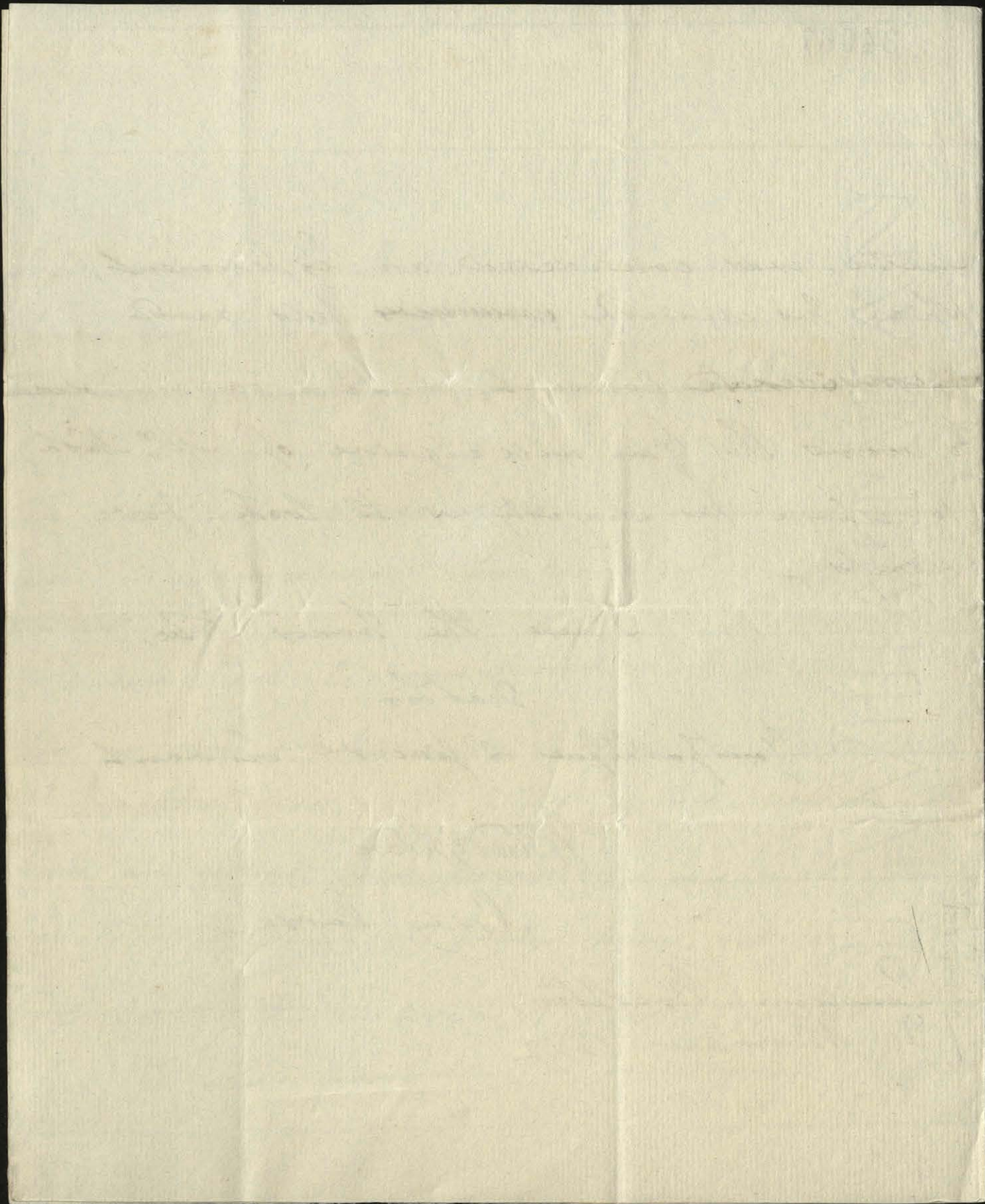

The sheet Iron Nails & Nailing to be provid-  
 ed by Mr P Hamilton & charged in proportion to  
 the cost price of the same scaffolding to be provid-  
 ed by Mr Nash but to be raised & struck by  
 Mr Hamilton all other materials lab<sup>r</sup> & carriage  
 to be found by Mr Hamilton The mastic to be  
 laid on sheet iron nails on boards the sheet  
 Iron having been previously covered at the back  
 and edges of it by Mr Hamilton. Mastic paint  
 to prevent the Iron rusting - The face of the iron  
 whereon the Roofs and flats are to be covered with  
 Sibel Mastic to be at least one quarter of an Inch  
 thick and the surface floated & Frowled to a fair  
 even & smooth surface the Mouldings on the  
 Roof to be embossed in the mastic & run true  
 clean & smooth at the same price & measured in  
 the same ~~any~~ manner as are usually done of  
 the same were done in Parkers Cement to be  
 paid by Mr Bernasconi at that rate -

In order to induce Mr Nash to use the Best  
Mastic Mr Hamilton proposes it shall have a  
Trial of one Year from its completion and if it  
should appear at the end of one Year without defect  
the amount of the work shall be paid to Mr Hamilton  
on his undertaking for its stability and its impene-  
trability to water the undertaking to expire if at the  
end of seven Years - it shall appear to be durable &  
impenetrable to water -

Sir

I beg to acknowledge your letter of the 23<sup>rd</sup> Inst. and to ask if there will be any objections to my examining personally the defects you allude to - I shall then be able to pronounce decidedly (& I hope satisfactorily) on the subject of the mastic - It would seem a matter of course that I should go to the Pavilion in the first instance, but reflecting on the terms on which I have been received there and ignorant of A. M. present disposition towards me I am fearful of giving offence by appearing there without A. M. permission - in the mean time I beg to state that I know the mastic in a perfect state to be impervious to wet, and can shew it to be so in a hundred instances and therefore I have not the slightest doubt of being able to remove the defects and secure the Eating Room and Drawing Room ceilings from damage.

The



The Mastic like every other Material is liable to defects and if such roofs could have been formed in lead the defects would have been still more numerous - nor do I know of any Material in which they could be executed without the same liability.

I adopted the Mastic because I knew & know of no other Material in which such ornamented roofs could be executed, but I did not do so until I had personally examined all the Instances where it had been successfully used, nor then until they had been examined by the most experienced Plasterers & every other precaution taken usual on such occasions. I have since had very great experience in it myself and my opinion is confirmed as to its being a Material impervious to water & hence arises my confidence that the defects at the Pavilion may be remedied.

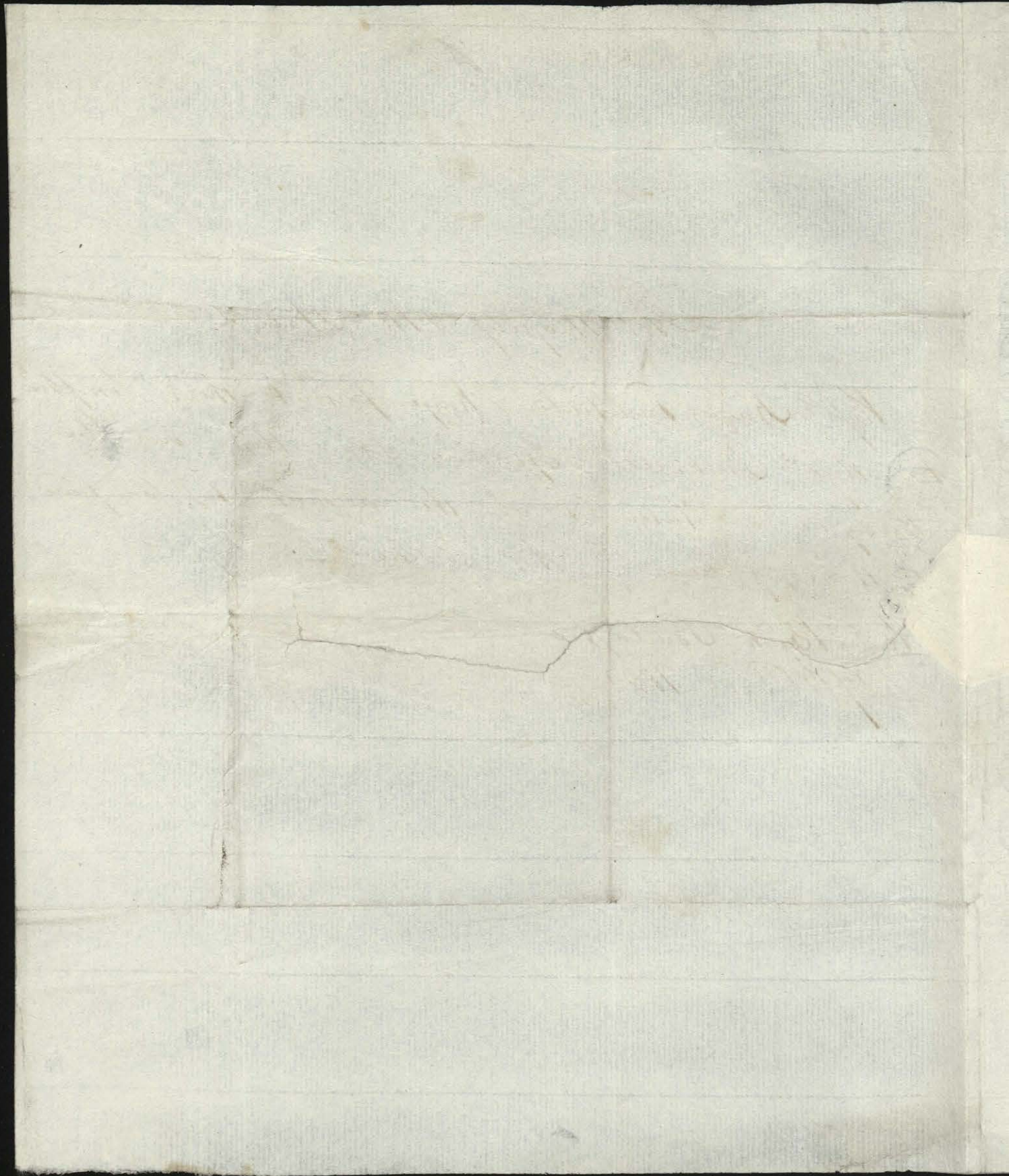
