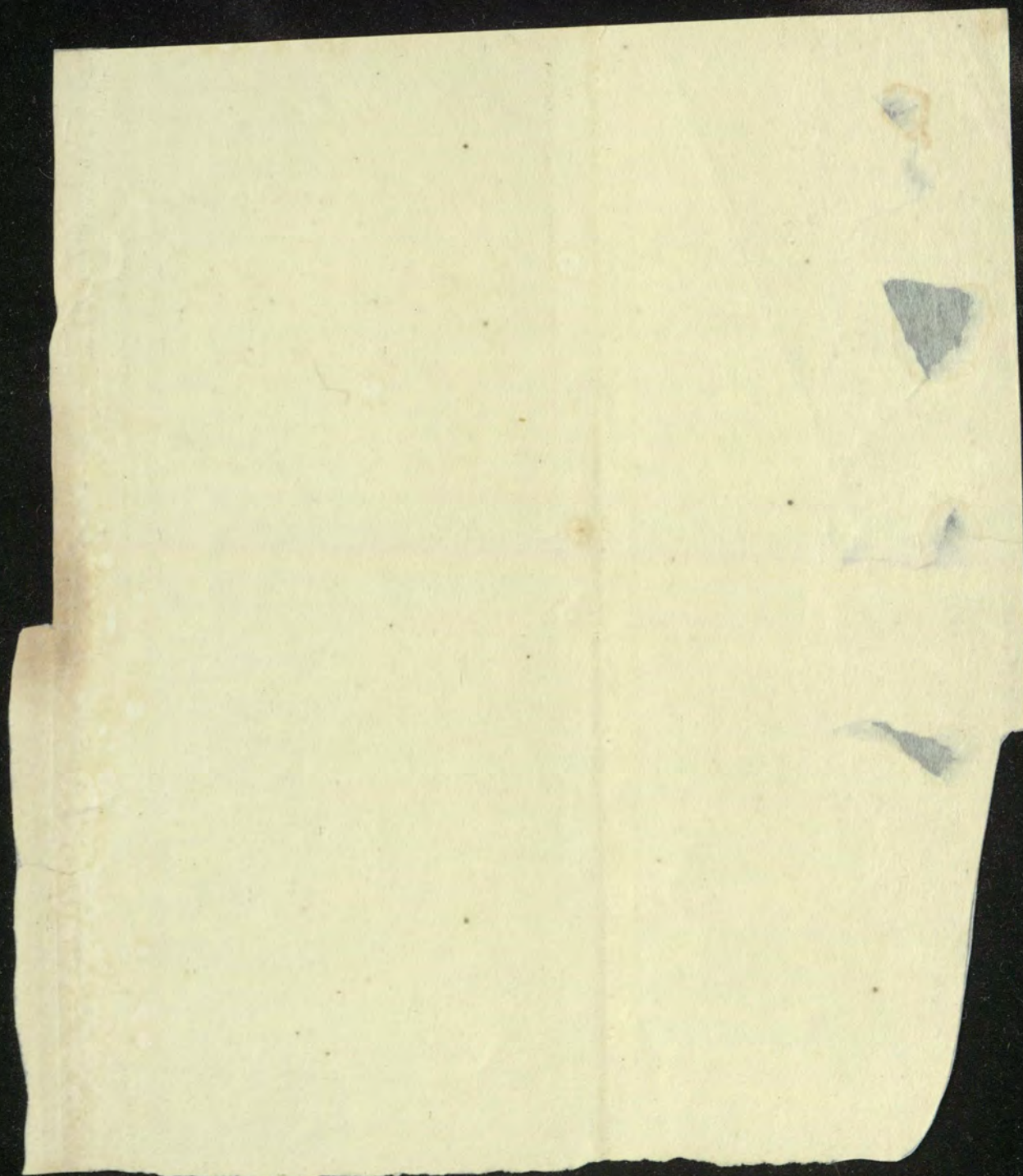

Animals & Birds, are no longer paid.

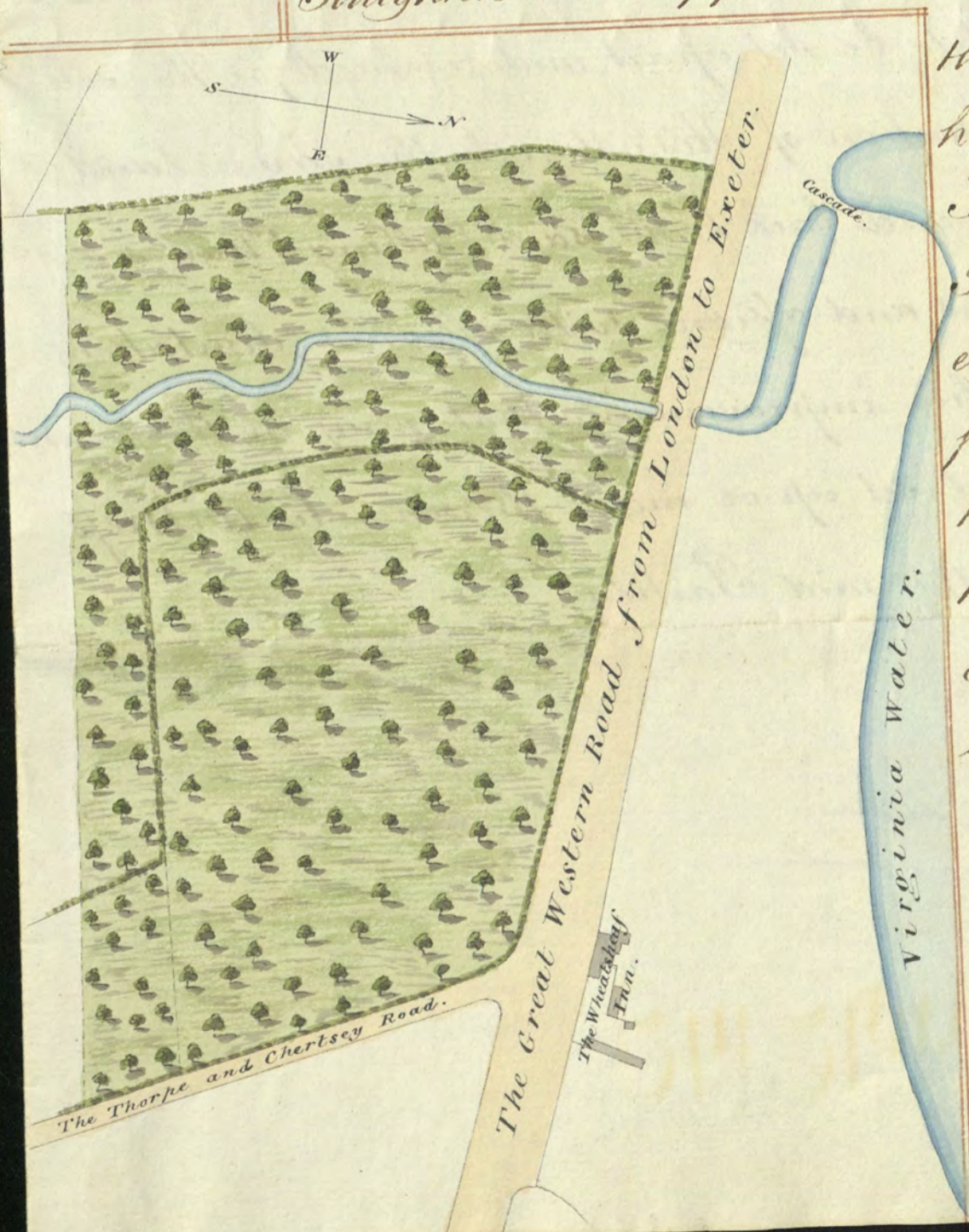
After the death of Thomas Dalton,

 An Agreement made this thirty first rd day of May One thousand eight hundred and twenty six Between Sir William Knighton Baronet and George Harrison Esquire on behalf of the King's Most Excellent Majesty on the one part and Culling Charles Smith of Wentworths in the County of Surrey Esquire for himself his heirs and assigns of the other part.

In consideration of Seven hundred and eighty seven pounds ten shillings by the said Sir William Knighton this day paid to the said Culling Charles Smith,



the receipt of which sum is hereby by him acknowledged. The said Culling Charles Smith doth by these presents engage and agree that the piece of Land delineated in the margin, being a portion of the Estate of Wentworths and containing about Twenty or seven acres shall henceforth during the life of his Majesty be set apart and reserved for the sole use and occupation of His Majesty with full

permission that the said piece of Land may be fenced off
 from the rest of the Estate - that the Underwood may be
 cut once during the said period and the produce thereof
 received and applied for his Majesty's use and that such
 Timber trees may be cut or felled as may be required for
 the purposes of His Majesty's drives or for other his
 Majesty's pleasure, the said Culling Charles Smith being
 previously paid for such Timber trees and the price
 thereof to be ascertained by valuation in the customary
 manner. And it is further agreed that upon the
 cessation of the period during which the said Land is so
 hereby agreed to be set apart and reserved for the sole
 use and occupation of His Majesty, the same Land
 shall be delivered back to the said Culling Charles
 Smith his heirs and assigns with all trees plantations
 fences and other improvements that may in the mean
 time be planted set up or made thereon. As witness

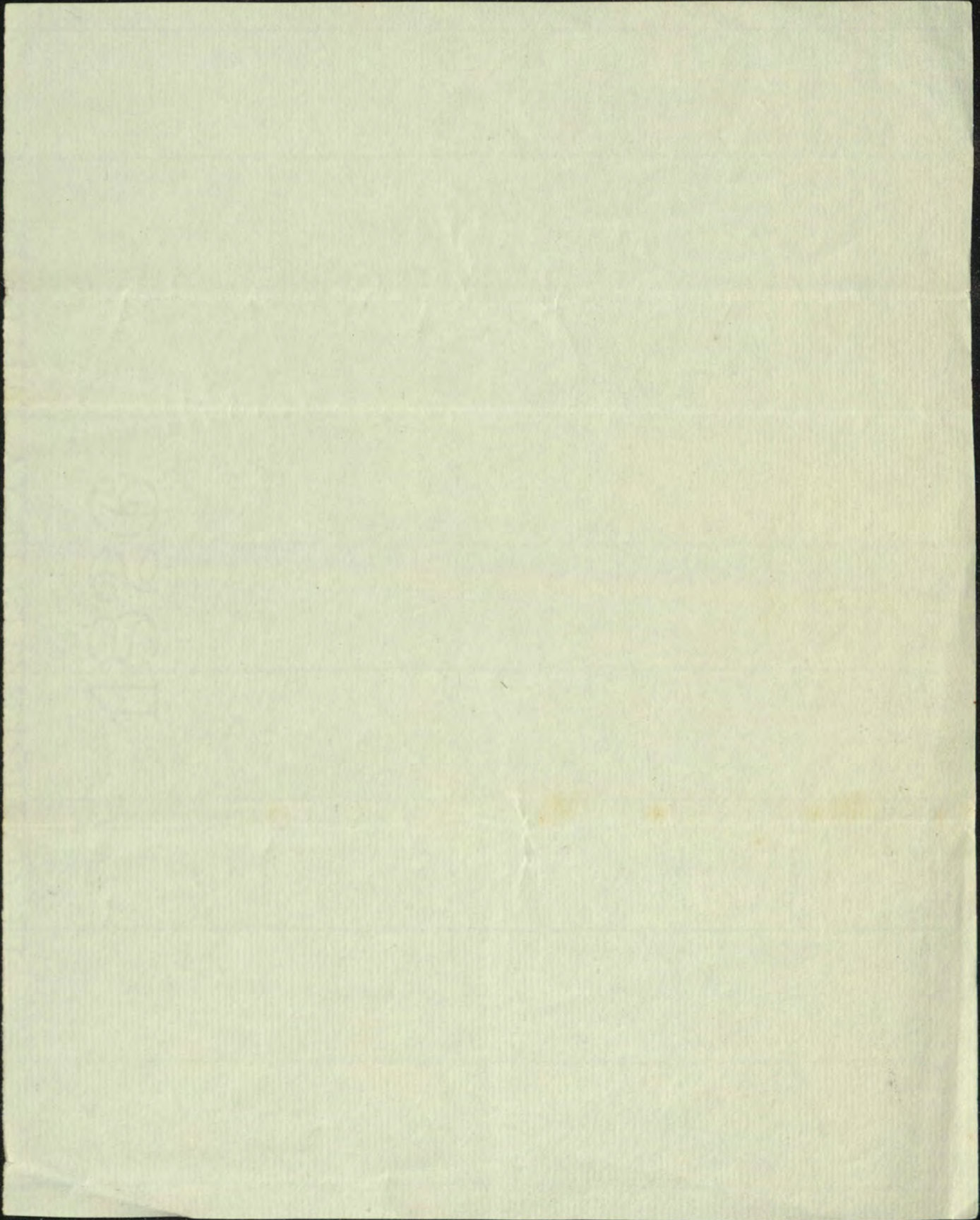

I am not in possession of any Account of Losses. - The only Papers I have are Letters from you to Sir William Loughton upon which I have already communicated to you that they were not sufficiently explicit to enable me as H. M's Auditor to act upon them.

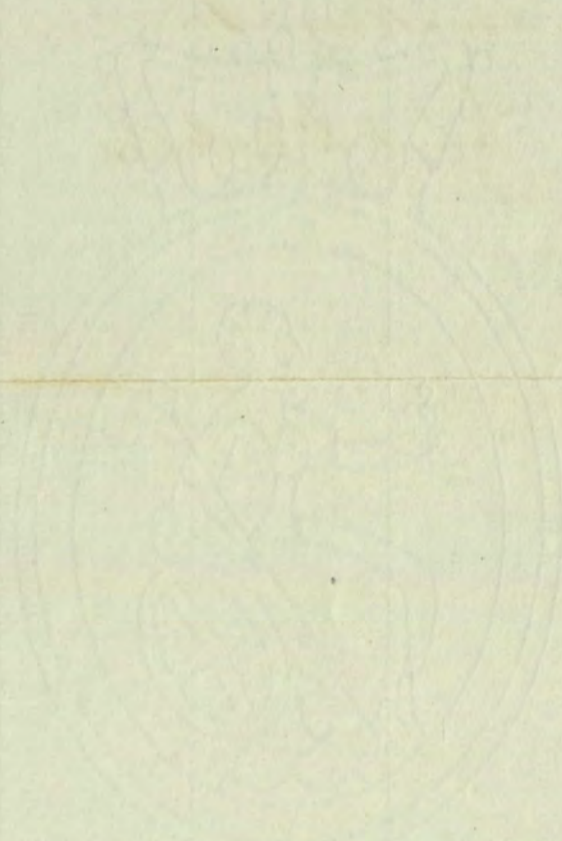
