My dear Sir

The Collectors of Rates for  
the Poor, and Highways, at New, are  
extremely urgent to be paid the amount  
of the Apportionments upon His Majesty's  
property in that Parish to Michas  
last, being £211. 12. 0<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>; and there can  
be no doubt of the delay therein  
being a great hardship upon the  
Collectors, who are thence prevented  
from closing their Accounts & retiring  
from their temporary Offices at the  
usual period; at the same time  
that it is irksome to the Parish  
generally to have a debt hanging  
over

over them for the ordinary supplies  
to the Poor, which cannot be discharged  
until these rates are answered.

In the time of the late  
King these rates were very properly  
paid out of the Privy Purse, the  
Premises on which they were assessed  
being His Majesty's own private property;  
but by what I have understood from  
you, and also from Mr. Ricknell, the  
Government claims to have charge  
of all the premises, denying the same  
to be the private property of His Present  
Majesty, or at His disposal. Now,  
under such a difference of circumstances,  
the payment ought not to be thrown  
on the Privy Purse; and I conceive it  
only wants a proper explanation

to get it into a right channel;  
but what steps should be taken  
towards it, unless by some  
communication with the  
Commissioners for the Crown  
Lands, I am unable to suggest.

You will have the kindness to recollect, that it is scarcely a week since you put the note into My hand respecting the New Establishment. I then called upon Mr Gray, who was in possession of the accounts, and would have left with him sufficient to pay the first year; but he thought a Mode of payment through him could not be your intention; and I had not had time since to go to New to pay the money myself; but I will most religiously keep My engagement with you. In his note he mentions to you what I suggested to him as a Mode of getting these people placed upon a permanent Establishment;

and I intended the first opportunity you  
could give me to speak to you upon it, for  
otherwise the debt will keep increasing to  
a great extent.

These unhappy persons take occasion, from another Year's (the sixth) being expired, to renew their claims. Mr. Water signifying to them that the Accounts are all sent hither. I in turn I have referred them to Mr. Brent; who was good enough to call on me last week, & undertook to enquire whether the Treasury would sanction payment of the whole, or a part, in the general House-hold departments; the result of which I have not heard.

If the Charge for the Observatory could be defrayed by the Privy Purse, until some arrangement was made for its Transfer to the Public, or its total abandonment, I think there wd. be no great difficulty in getting the remainder of the New Establishment put under the Lord Steward, to whose department it seems naturally to belong; but without some such division of the expense, I fear the Treasury will take no part in it. Pray, consider this, and the wretched state of parties, some of whom have been driven to seek Parish Relief, and others, who <sup>are</sup> above such a course, are become equally objects of charity.

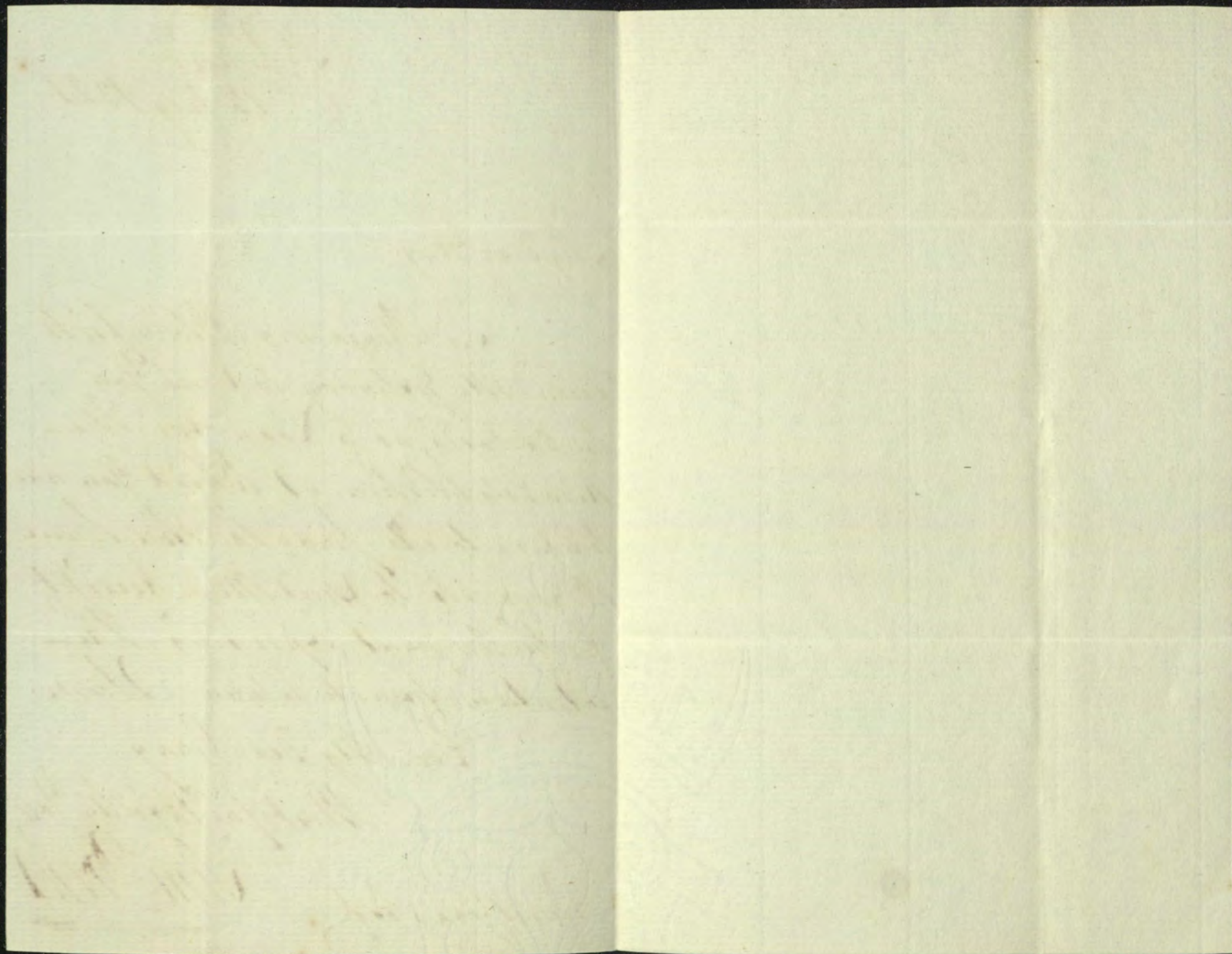

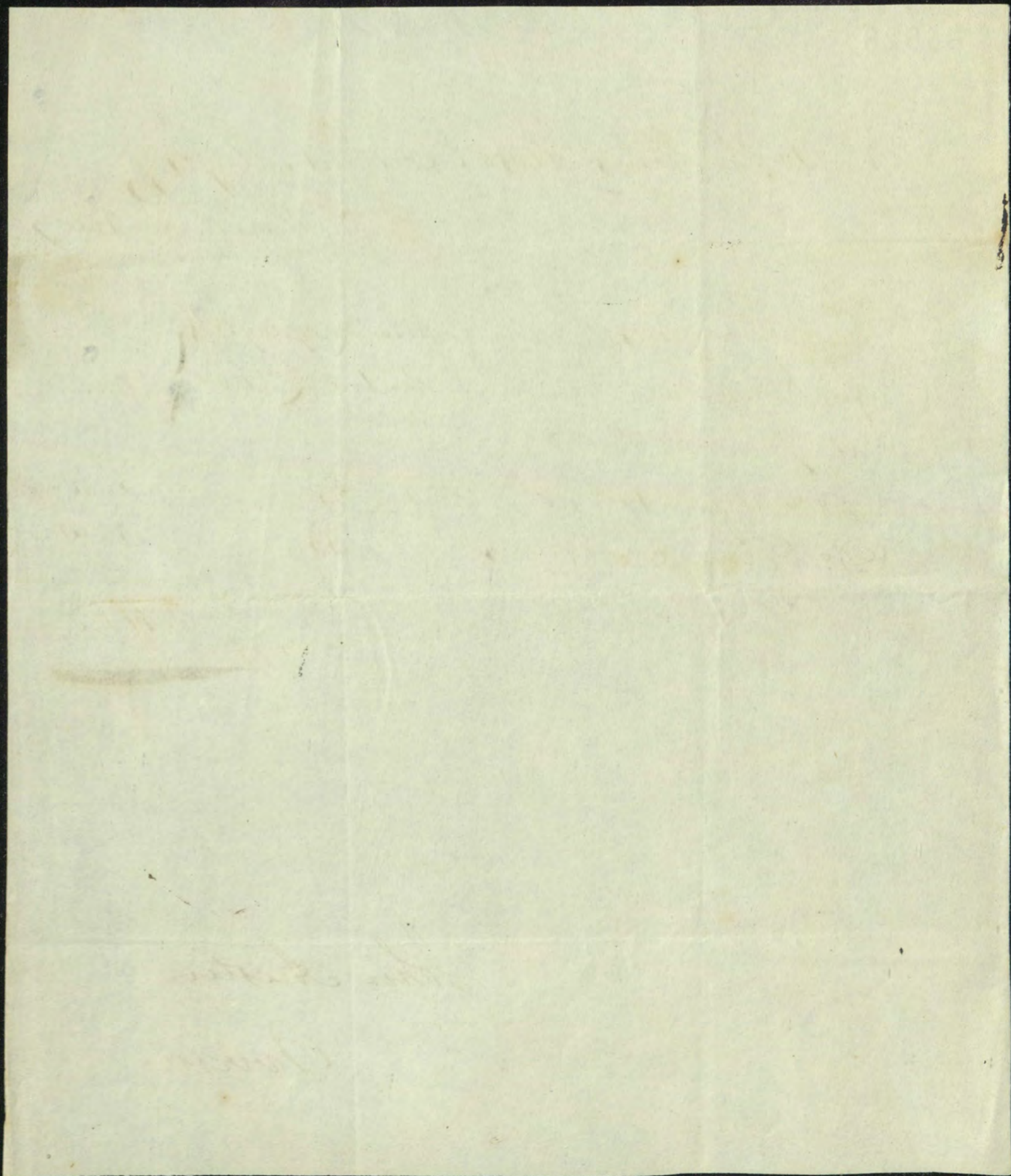
