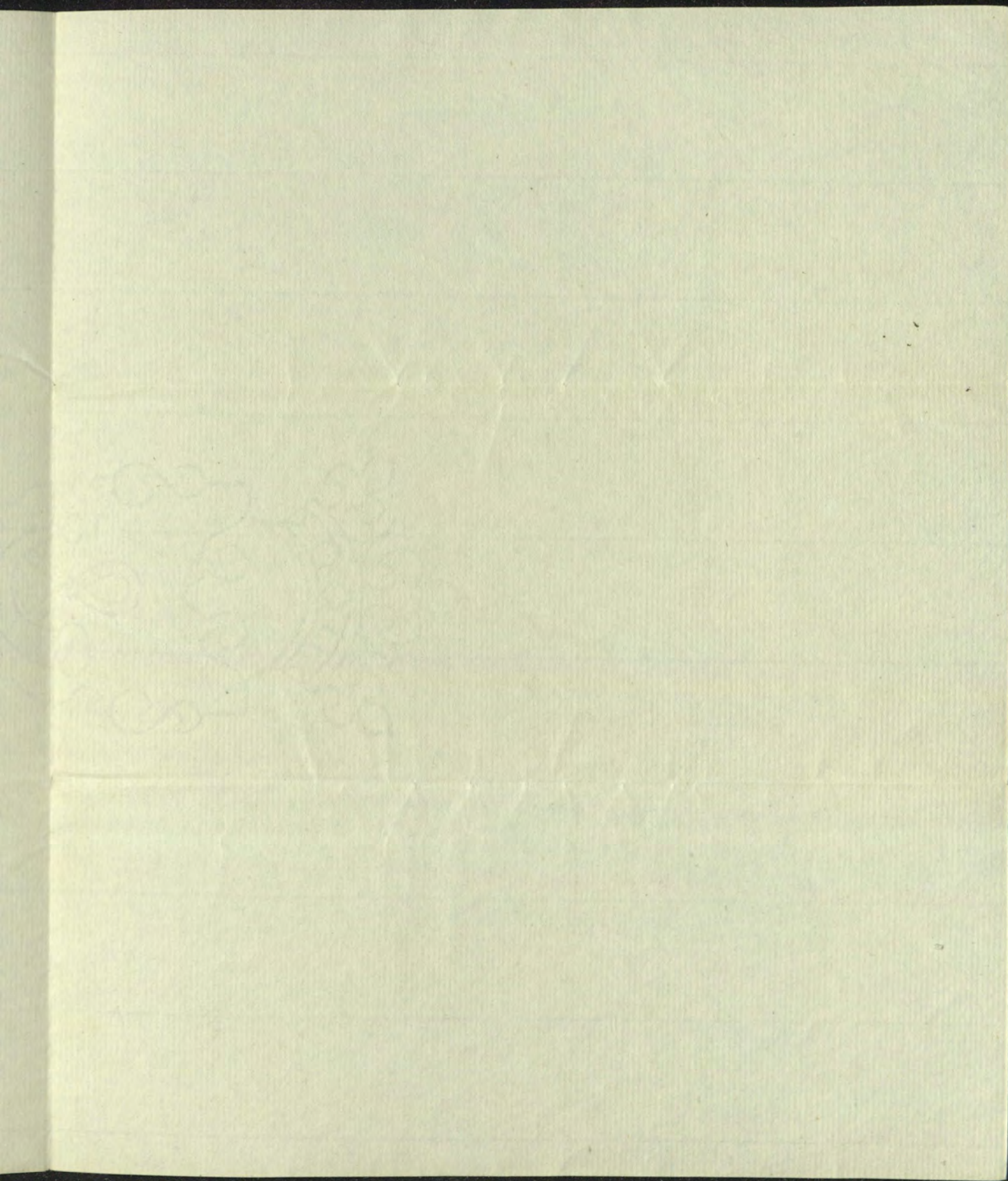

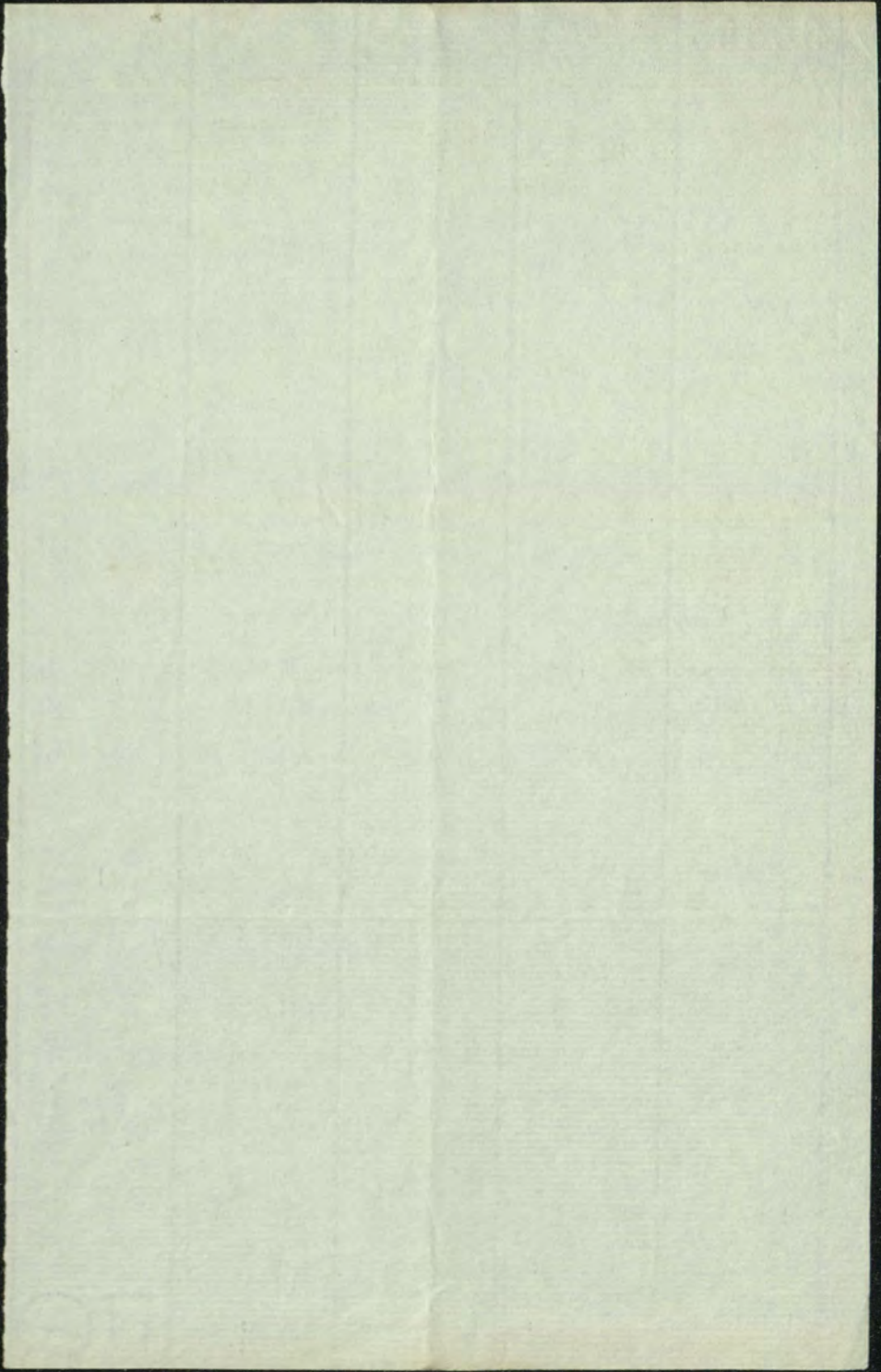

AT a Meeting of the PARISHIONERS of the said Parish, held this Day, at the *Rose and Crown Tavern*, pursuant to public Notice, to take into Consideration the Propriety of petitioning for, or against, the Extinguishing for ever the Rights and Privileges of the said Parishioners to the LAMMAS LANDS thereof, on obtaining a supposititious, or an alleged Compensation for the same.

MR. JOHN SURMAN being called unanimously to the Chair, he begged leave to submit the Matter in question to the numerous Meeting, when he hoped it would be *dispassionately* discussed, and that the Result would be the Adoption of such Resolutions as might tend to the Object they had in View, viz.:—That of promoting *the Advantage of the Parishioners in general, but to that of the most dependant or poorer Class of the said Parishioners in particular*; after the Business was candidly and deliberately proceeded upon, the following Resolutions were proposed and *unanimously* agreed to.

1st. It appears clearly to this Meeting, that a Petition, or Application to the Honourable Commissioners of Woods and Forests, to apply to Parliament to *disfranchise the Parishioners of the Lammas Lands is obviously premature and unauthorised* by them, and only sanctioned by a few *self-interested Individuals, not exceeding Six in number, or thereabouts, some of whom have clandestinely communicated with, and ERRONEOUSLY reported to the said Honourable Commissioners the Circumstances attending the said Lammas Lands, evidently to mislead, as they are unfounded*, more especially when in the said Application, or Memorial, it is *unfairly* asserted that the said Lammas Lands are UNPRODUCTIVE and UNWHOLESOME to the Inhabitants.

2nd. It is with concern we are well informed that Mr. W. T. Aiton, (Head Gardener to His Most Gracious Majesty), has taken the *most active and conspicuous Part to promote the said Memorial*, aided by Mr. Timothy Tyrrell, Solicitor, to *disfranchise the Parishioners of the said Lammas Lands, by which they are fully and unanimously of Opinion, would be a serious, inevitable, and irreparable Loss to them and their Posterity*; and with reluctance they are compelled to declare that, *in their unanimous Opinion, it would AGGRANDIZE PARTICULARLY the Property of the said Mr. W. T. Aiton and a very few Individuals*, and which we fear is their Object, and not that, as it is ours, for the Good of the Parish.

3rd. As a Corroboration of the *second* Resolution, it was candidly and fearlessly declared at the *last Vestry Meeting*, on Saturday last, by a Parishioner, that if the said Lands were taken from the Parish, he would by that Circumstance alone, with his Wife and Family, consisting of TEN Children, become a *pauper*, to support whom would exceed *double* the supposed or *alleged Compensation of £12 10s. per Annum*; and *other similar instances* would no doubt occur, by which the PAUPERS would much increase, as they have lately done, to the *Inconvenience of the Parishioners, many of whom can ill bear their present Burdens*.

4th. It also appears to the said Meeting, that by a *unanimous* Vote of the Parishioners to grant His Most Gracious Majesty an Accommodation of such Common Lands as His Majesty recently required, and for the more Facility of obtaining the Object of the *self-interested Individuals, without consulting, and in direct Opposition to the Interest and almost unanimous Voice of the said Inhabitants, they imbodyed in the said intended Bill, to be presented to the Honourable House of Commons* (to establish the said Accommodation to His Majesty), a *Rider, or Application for the said Lammas Lands to be taken from the Parishioners; and this was CLANDESTINELY carried into Effect, which is attributed to the said Mr. W. T. Aiton, in particular, and to a few other Individuals.*

5th. Notwithstanding, at the *two last VESTRY MEETINGS, one on the 18th Instant, and the other so late as on Saturday last, a MAJORITY appeared against the DISFRANCHISING the Parishioners of the Lammas Lands, being INIMICAL to their Interest; yet in the hope of having the matter DISPASSIONATELY and AMICABLY reconsidered at another Vestry, it is requested unanimously that it may be officially and regularly applied for, and to be held at an early period, on Thursday, the 6th of February, at Twelve o'Clock; when it is hoped a UNANIMOUS Opinion may end this Matter SATISFACTORILY.*

6th. We hereby request that the Rev. Henry White, officiating Clergyman of the said Parish of Kew, may attend the said Vestry, on *Thursday, the 6th instant*, in hopes that he may be able not only to satisfy the Parishioners for opposing their Interest so *conspicuously* in this matter; but that, by his adopting a conciliatory System towards them, a mutual Advantage may be the Result, and cause an *uninterrupted and unexampled unanimity* between that Reverend Gentleman and the said Parishioners to take place; and which it is our ardent Wish to *promote and establish.*

7th. If, however, in vain, We use our endeavours to maintain the Property in question *amicably*; or that the Petition alluded to herein is not *withdrawn, as it is manifestly in Opposition to the Advantage and Interest of the Parishioners in general; and which alone is the Object of this Meeting,* We hereby agree *unanimously*, to enter into a Subscription, *forthwith*, of One Hundred Pounds, in order to employ the Solicitor General, or Mr. Brougham, or such other Counsel and Solicitor as may be deemed expedient: another Hundred Pounds is expected, if necessary, by Land Owners not present, and others who are Non-residents of this Parish; and which will so fully enable the Parishioners to carry into Effect a Memorial to his Majesty, inclosing these our unanimous Resolutions, &c. to the Honourable Commissioners of Woods and Forests, as also to the Honourable House of Commons, if necessary.

8th. In order to make these Resolutions more public, we agree that they shall be forthwith printed and distributed accordingly, and that a Committee of Twelve respectable Householders may be immediately nominated, five of whom to constitute a Quorum, to carry into Effect these our *unanimous* Resolutions.

Mr. JOHN SURMAN, upon leaving the Chair, was unanimously voted the Thanks of the Meeting for his impartial and proper Conduct as Chairman; when it adjourned to Thursday, at *Two o'Clock*, or immediately after the *Vestry Meeting* announced for that Day.

On the East & west sides of the long Walk are Fields belonging to a Mr Round who claims and enjoys a communication between them across the long Walk and as long as those Fields are not possessed by the Crown the longwalks cannot be enclosed so as to become private nor the gates in the middle of the long Walk be moved to the end next the Town where they should be placed and by which the expense of a gate-keeper would be saved - the long walk become part of the Park and cease to be (what in some respects it is) a nuisance - As Commissioner for the Crown under the Windsor Forest enclosure Act all the other communications across the long walk I stipulated to be stopped up & if Mr Round's Fields were bought H. M. may at any time remove the Lodge to the Windsor Entrance without which H. Majesty's purpose of communicating the two Parks by passing under the Windsor Road would be incomplete whilst that part of the long walk between the Town & the present Lodges are as public as they now are

I enclose a sketch of Mr Round's Fields by which H. M. will readily recognize their situation - they are close to the gates and Lodges in the middle of the long walk

all the other Lands on the East side of the long walk already belong to the King & the only person on the west

side whose Lands abutt on the long Walk besides  
those of Mr Throun belong to Mr Sheppel but as he has  
no rights of communication from the long Walk his  
Lands will not affect its privacy

My motive for calling His Majesty's attention  
to this subject at the present moment is, that I  
have reason to believe Mr Throun is about to sell  
those Fields - they contain about 18 Acres and in  
my Opinion are worth from 60 to 70 £ per acre

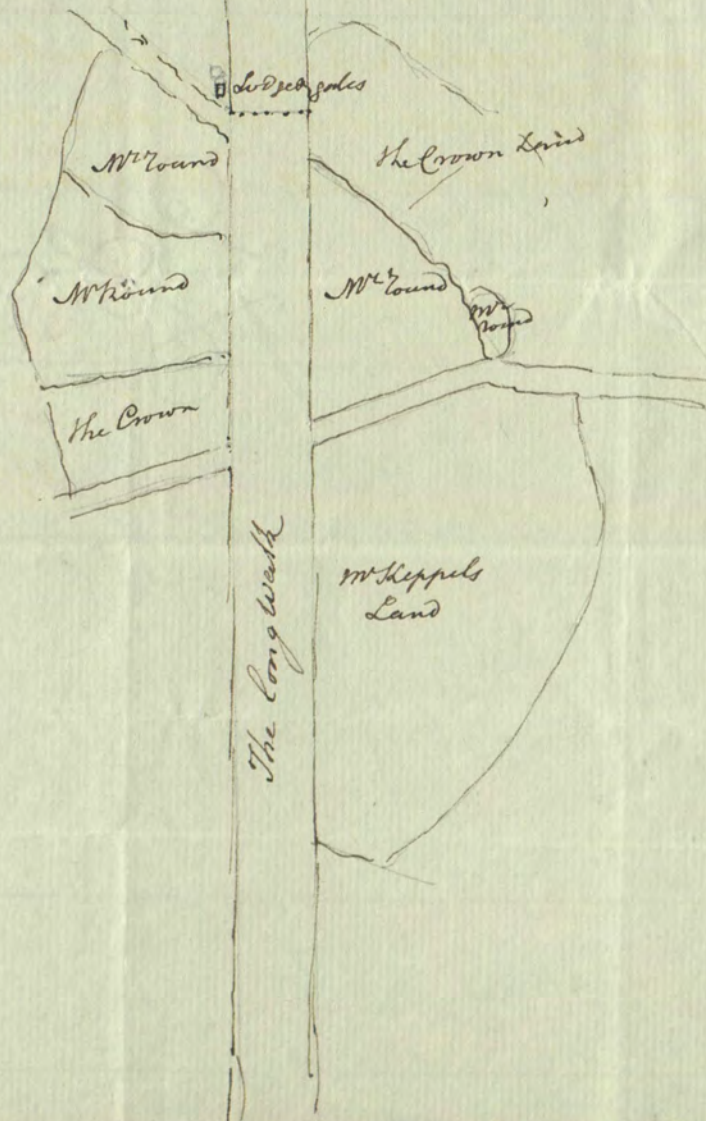
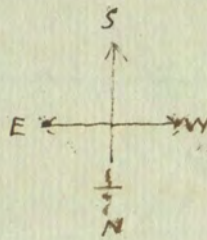

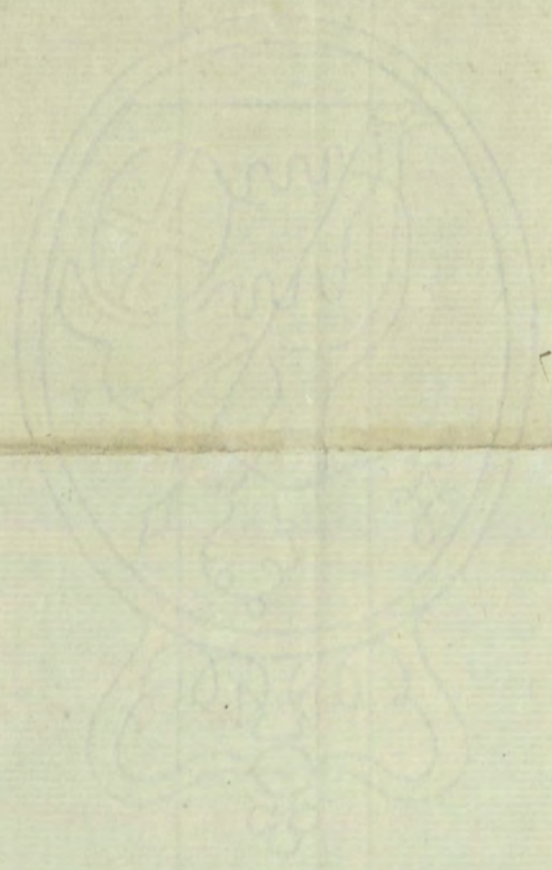
