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It is with inexpressible Concern that Mr Robinson
submits to your Majesty's perusal the private
Letters received by him containing so very
disagreeable Accounts of the State of Ireland, but
as his Duty to your Majesty is ever the first
Principle of his Heart, and his Sentiments lead
him to think that your Majesty should have
every Information relative to that Country, to attain
a Knowledge of the true State of it, and to enable
your Majesty to meet the Difficulties with that
Wisdom and Firmness which ever so remarkably
attends your Majesty; He presumes to transmit
such

such Letters to your Majesty, and hopes that
he shall not do wrong, which ever is his anxious
Study to avoid to the utmost of his Abilities;

Mr Robinson therefore sends a Letter which
he received by yesterday's post from the Attorney
General of Ireland for your Majesty's
perusal, and he begs leave also to add two
Irish News papers as they tend to develope
the principles of the times, and Mr Robinson
shall continue regularly to send them as receive
if not disagreeable.
