I received your Majesty's Note just
as I was going to the House of Commons,
where I had a Motion to make that
would not admit of Delay; I thought
best therefore to go, that I might not
occasion suspicions.

I cannot help feeling
in the strongest manner the very dis-
agreeable Libelation in which Lord North
puts your Majesty almost every Day;
I begin almost to doubt whether he
does not mean to retire, though I can-
not say I am clear. I saw Lord Mans-
field this morning, he came to me
very early; he told me that Mr. Cha-
cellous & Lord Stormont were particu-
larly well together, & though he
said

said nothing positive, he conveyed
 enough to make me conceive that he
 was disposed to have had North out,
 & had Shelburne in; & this corresponds
 so exactly with a part of Mr North's
 Note, that I am now the more con-
 vinced of the truth of that Suspicion.
 I saw Mr Foxes yesterday & he was
 furious against Lord North, & I have
 no doubt, that the Ministers of Lord
 Shelburne & Lord O'Connell have the
 Connexion, which Mr North suspects.
 I agree with your Majesty, that
 Mr North's Liberty (if it is to happen)
 should be decided on by himself; he
 has obtain'd by some very near to that
 Decision. I therefore submit to your
 Majesty whether it will not be
