My dearest Son. I was very agreeably surpris'd
this Morning by Y^r very happy Letter
which I do assure You influences the
whole Family, for there is not one of
the whole Female Government belong-
ing to me who does not sincerely share
in it. I am glad knows singularly
happy in this event, as it will be
a means of connecting the whole of
the Family more together. & I trust the
Union will be such, that not even
the Power of an Alexander shall be
able to destroy it. What makes me feel
it if possible more strongly is, that I
am pretty sure that it must have been

granted at once & therefore is a proof
of the King's readiness of making You happy
when it was in His power. He has not
mentioned it to me, but seems so ^{full} content
about all He does & is doing at Present
that I am sure He is pleased himself.

I have not been able to speak
to him, as Monsieur Spörren was
at our Breakfast, & from thence the
King went to the Stables, but I believe
12 a Clock will be the best Time for
You to come, but do not come later
as I know He ordered many People to
Yesterday to be with Him after
that Time. & now I give You joy
