My dearest Son. One letter more before we leave Weymouthth without any entertainment I fear. News such as we had while in possession of Your agreeable Company, continue the same, Unsettled what is right to be done about recalling the Cavalry from abroad, & ~~troups~~ remaining hopes that when Our Neighbours grow to Unreasonable, that those who are in Power here will think it Necessary to leave the Troops Where they are, in order to save the Electorate. Perhaps the Duke of York's arrival, may bring something more determinate upon this Subject, which would not be Amiss. He is expected about Dinner Time to Day, but as He hath put it off so frequently I shall not give Credit to His coming Until my Eyes behold Him.

Since Y^r departure I have been in a very suffering state with the Toothach. & as I had kept it tolerably quiet by laudanum during Y^r presence, I trusted likewise

to the Promise of Mr Spence, that this was the only remedy
 to ~~ease~~ quiet it, I felt quite happy, but when it rebegan
 I sent for Durning who drew it at once & since that time
 I am easy. Our Sea excursions have answered incom-
 parably well, to prove it I have only to say, that we
 go on Board by 10 in the Morning & do not return till
 11 at Night. Mr Osbourns Company makes it very plea-
 sant, & the Coy invites all those who can well bear Sailing
 which gives a very agreeable variety.

Our return to Windsor stands fixed for Saturday
 next. the 4th we go to New, & the 8th we are to go
 to Court & thus rebegin Our Old ways anew. When
 I have the Pleasure of seeing You, I hope to tell
 You what the Coy thinks about the Governours, as
 yet I have not had a proper opportunity to say.
 It shall however be done before we leave this Place.
