My Dearest Son. According to my promise I sit
down to inform You that all my Fellow Travellers
are in perfect good Health & Spirits, & that ever
since The King has been here His Spirits & good
humour have continued. He enjoys His Bathing more
than any body & assures Us that He never felt
better after it than this Year. The Place itself
is very full but few people that we know, except
the Orolows, Grandisons, Pitts, & Deaneers, & My Susan
^{the Harringtons} Sydes, & since last Night Cowages ^{the} Lytton. The
Number is very small as You see but we have Notwith-
standing ~~xxx~~ contrived to have Party every Night. We
have been once at the Play & were tolerably Amuse
but Our Sea Excursions have not begun as the other
Frigates were not come into Harbour, This Morning
however one is arrived & if the Weather permits
we are to Sail to Marrone in the Day only.

I have tried to find out which would be the best Time
for You to come & both Y^r Sisters & myself are of
opinion that Y^r own Time will be very agreeable here
for the Y^d has without any particular meaning frequently
declared that at Weymouth, He can not keep any ^{Day} ~~Day~~
but is perfectly ready to partake & to enjoy any thing
others think proper to invite Him to. You know
how glad I ~~am~~ am always to see You, & need not
therefore add que Vous serez le bien veau. chaque jour
& minute sont le même avec moi sur ce Sujet.

We have had good accounts from Stuttgart
every Word of Her Letters speak inexpressible Bliss &
happiness, & private Letters tell Us that She is
really very much adored & loved by the Family.

I hope to hear soon from You, God grant that
You may enjoy as much happiness & Bliss as is the wish
of Y^r
