My dearest Son. This is the first moment I have had a
most violent storm I have been able to find for sending you
for the Fine Game. it was delicious & the first we have
had & to make use of a German expression. I eat your stuff.
Nothing New has happened since you left this place, excepting
a very fine Breakfast at the Japantown Camp given by Edy Pitt
where she did the Honour in Habit d'Amazon extremely
well. Our Ball went off with great spirit, it began at Nine
& finished a little after four o'clock. Since that we have
visited the Dames, & Mr Brown at Frampton to see
another German Pavement. Edy Pitt was of the first party
& when we meet I tell you what she did to amuse
us, which indeed she is ever ready to do when in her
power. This Wife was intended for Soiling chiefly, but
I believe ⁱⁿ that Amusement will we shall be disengaged
for at present it blows a Hurricane & should the Wind
Folly there must remain a swell in the sea which may

probably last several Days. General Guyon living but
indifferent accounte of the Dutches of York how I pity
Her, for I fear that Her Complaint increases upon Her.
I hope You found little dear Charlotte well. I long
to see at my return to London how she is improved,
but still more to see You & to assure You by word
of Mouth how sensibly I am
