I have the pleasure to inform You my dearest Son of the safe arrival of dear little Charlotte. This I meant to have done Yesterday, but a Sailing Day admits of nothing but idleness, & the Wind proving favourable for such an excursion I was obliged to submit. The dear little Angel slept well until past 1 o'clock I made her my visit & she walked between the bed & me to the ledge where she attended our breakfast, then saw us prepare to go on board the "Friend" & when we went away I left her with Sophia & Amelia who were to take her to Elgin on Friday on the sands, but she slept till before eleven & slept till past two o'clock which was by far more refreshing for her little spirits, at my return she was seen her walk, & to day she is preparing for her bathing & consequently not to go out, I shall pray Her

Visit by & by 2 pm sure She will be very interesting.
The P^r met Sir Elgin last Night & when we went to the
Play He told me, He had desired Her to act entirely
to the Directions Dr Tuxton had given Her, & He added
none but those who know the Child can be judges of what
ought to be done. I think this will make You easy, & I
am certain will be great Comfort to the Countess's
Mind, as ~~she has not slept well~~. She now is quite certain
that Dr Tuxton's Name will take Her out of all
Difficulties if any Should arise.

We have gone on here very quietly & comfortably
the Weather is like an intermitting Fever every other
Day Storms & Rain, but with the Royal Guards,
& Plays, the P^r passes His Time very Pleasantly.
The only little Diff we met with, was is the arrival
of the Messenger from Augustus, of which He had an

intimation on Tuesday by His Dispatches, He named it
not to me till the Evening, & said it had made Him
very Delirious & Sic, & on Thursday at two a Clock he
brought me all the Letters, in the Conversation upon
the Subject He told me He was Satisfied with yr
Conduct, but Would not Himself ~~think~~ determine upon
any thing. I took the liberty of saying before I had read
y^e Letter, That in my opinion Augustus's return
to England, & one Conversation between him & the R^d
might do more than Millions of Letters, & in this
y^e Letter afterwards confirmed me, but at Present H^r
M^r is so averse to this Step, that I could not with any
propriety press it any further. The Chancellors Letter
did you ample Justice & I must say to y^e Compt^r
that the R^d fell it much. tout cei est entre nous.
So Morrow is y^e Goldsworthy's Devine, & we are

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to have after it a Dejeuné Dinatoire, & a Ball till six,
then go home & dress for the Play, where Beaumaris
entertains us much. We have from both Taylor &
His pretty Wife, & two girls who singe tolerable & two
or three tolerable Actors belonging to Mr. August.

I am a going this Morning to see Charlotte &
Charlotte Durhams, where we shall have excellent
Music. I hope. Our Company is increased by the Judge
& the Duke of Newcastle & the Chavillon are expec-
ted the 1st Sep^r.
End Speares arrived here on Wednes-
day from Ter bay & staid till this Morning, he said
with us yesterday & was very good Company. This is
all Poor Weymouth can afford by way of Amusement
Every body here is well now. I hope to hear the same
from you which is the sincere wish of
