My dearest Son. I hope You have received Mary's little Note to acknowledge the receipt of Your Letter, & as my Eyes are still very much relaxed, I am desirous to answer Yours as Our motions depend so much upon Weather & therefore never know from one day to another what Time I can command to do any thing. — I have the pleasure to inform You that dear little Charlotte is as well as it can possibly be expected, after so severe an attack of the Disease She had in Town, & that by the uncommon Wet & Stormy Season, She as well as every Body else is prevented to the recap that benefit from Bathing She otherwise would do it were the Weather more favorable. Her attacks are only symptoms of the Complaint, when the Comprese is very great, not otherwise, & then She must not Bathe but Her Sleep Appetite & Spirits are very good.

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moreover I have seen Keate this Morning & He assured me that She was going on very well. Dr Elgin has also desired D<sup>r</sup> Wayne to write to Dr Tuxton how She goes on, the answer to which She will not fail to communicate to You. She does so distinctly follow the Proscription She received in London about the Child, that You may make Your mind easy that no care nor attention will be spared, nor can it be done with more zeal nor affection. As to what relates to Her staying at Weymouth till October, that will be better decided by the Physical People who are upon the spot as they of course must understand the efficacy of Bathing at that season. & when You come to Weymouth as You talk of doing You will Yourself be a better judge of what is to be done, & hear their opinion.

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As to Our motion I am unable to give You  
any account, When we left Windsor the 1<sup>st</sup> of July  
of staying eight weeks, but since our arrival He  
has been silent upon the Subject, but I think  
Your making a Visit to the Child so Natural  
that the Time You have chosen to come appears to  
me very proper & we shall all be happy to see  
You & I trust There the 1<sup>st</sup> come the Subject I  
shall not fail to inform You of it.

Of The Duke of Cumberland's intention to  
come here I am ignorant, but as He talked of taking  
a House here, before we set Out for this Place, & did  
not do it, perhaps this proposed Visit may also  
vanish in Smoken. I am truly sorry to hear that  
He has again proved so unkind to You in His  
Conduct, & feel particularly happy to know that  
You have given him no occasion for doing so

You may depend upon my not believing those reports  
as I know but too well how apt the malicious  
World is to view things in a wrong light.

I will do every thing that lies in my  
power for poor Daniels, when ~~the~~ His situation  
is fairly represented to the V.I. They then say  
more in His favour than Leedes do now, but believe  
me He shall not lose any thing on my account.

I must now finish this Letter on account  
of my eyes & will only add here of your Sister  
& nephew You are great pleasure to me & concern
