To Her, & also which is very Natural
seems to feel very strongly any apparent
Neglect: She is already well informed of
the History of Her own Country in parti-
cular, & indeed not less so of that of other
Country's & seems notwithstanding Her
Liveliness & Spirit very desirous of impro-
ving Herself, She is blessed with a very
retentive memory which is of great
assistance to Her, & Her pursuits when seen
not at Her Lessons are of that kind: In
to convey information of all kinds are
necessary to know in Her Situation.

There are some Subjects upon which of
Prudence would not allow us to converse
with Her, but I am sure that Her affec-

for You is such, that by the smallest
kindness on Your Side You may secure
