My Lord

I Willis having communicated to me the wish expressed to him by You yesterday, that he should take my pleasure in regard to some arrangement which might relieve him in some measure from the most fatiguing part of his attendance, I have after due consideration determined upon that which will I trust appear to You and the other Members of the Council unobjectionable as it is to me.

I conceive that the Object in view is to secure Dr W. during the Night from that continual interruption of his rest, from which his health has already suffered, and which it is impossible that any human frame can support in the long run, and I am convinced that the Council will feel with me that it would be most unreasonable to suffer the undominion's Red Zed of any individual to operate to his prejudice when the Executive Operation of it is not a matter of absolute Necessity. On the other hand the Council cannot feel more anxious than I am that the King should in this present melancholy situation have the Benefit of the immediate Assistance of the Physician in attendance when required. I have therefore directed that Dr W. shall occupy a Room in His Majesty's Apartment. and on the same Floor, where he will be sufficiently removed from the King's bed room to be able to enjoy his Rest, and where he will nevertheless be within immediate reach of a Summons if the two Men who sit up with the King, should find it Necessary to call for his Assistance. You are I conclude aware that one of the Pages is in attendance every Night in the outer Room, and that such has been the invariable practice during this and former Illnesses

while in no former illness have the Physician or Physicians in attendance
been called upon to occupy the room adjoining the King, altho' they have al^{TE}
ready set up during the more critical Periods

Independantly of the arrangement which I have made in consequence of what
passed between You and Dr. W. yesterday I proposed that the other Physicians
should occasionally relieve Dr. W. from the attendance below stairs during the
Night, which altho' it will be some forth less necessary must still as probably
just to frequent interruption of rest be considered in my opinion more safe
quany than it would be reasonable or necessary to impose upon them.
