My Dearest Son. I have the Pleasure
to Inform You, that I delivered Your
Present to Charlotte which occasioned
great Satisfaction & I believe that before
this can come to Your Hands She will
have acknowledged Your Kindness by Letter.

I had half an Hours Conversation
with Her on the 8th to which She was
very attentive & after having left me
expressed Herself as pleased with what
had passed between us both to Mary
& Augusta— She had a Visit from
the Dutches of York who observed me
that She was extremely reasonable
in Her Conversation, particularly so
when She talked upon the Subject of

the Grand Duke's declaring that she
felt no partiality towards Her, & that
the last Visits which pass'd between
them were most disagreeable & that she
was a very Intriguing Women. The
Prince of Orange was of Course not Nomin'd
but she ~~tho~~ assured the Duke of York
that being convinced that you had
the Power over Her Person, she was
determined to Submit entirely to your
will. the same Language she has held I
believe to some of your Sisters which
encourages me to believe Her sincere
in Her Professions.

I have had a Letter from Stuttgart
announcing to me by the desire of the

Princess Royal the Divorce between him
& the Princess Royal. She has left Stuttgart
& is at present with Her Aunt the
Duchesse de Deuxpont, Yr Sister com-
ments this Event ~~with~~ very much as
Nothing can be alledged against the
Princess, but Her Ungliness, for She is
a Fine Figure, mild in Her disposition
Talented & uncommonly well behaved
& with the ^{by} Yrs Leave & the Princess Royal
desire Your Sister is to keep up a constant
Connection with Her. — No further par-
ticulars are mentioned, but I have
the Promise of having the whole com-
municated to me, to justify the Princess
conduct upon the Occasion. If the report

He will not like His return to God
Chesham's quite so well, for there is no
Company at all.
