Most sincerely do I condole with you the turn of Affairs in France & cannot but enter into your Feelings most deeply when I consider the Consequences which must naturally follow such a disastrous Catastrophe - The Emperor of Russia & King of Prussia must now fight ~~the~~ their Battles over again & if it was not that I pity the Country through which their Troops must March, Town I feel not much for them, as they had it in their power to prevent this Tyrant to do any more mischief, by crushing him when

at stake, there is no fear of their

His upright Conduct from the moment
