When I returned from St James's yesterday
Mr Robinson was gone out of Town; He left
however a letter for me, which I think it
right to send inclosed to your Majesty, as
it contains some account of what passed
between Lord North & Lord Dartmouth, as
well as other particulars, which it is
proper that your Majesty should know.
Though the present Speaker is it, I am
persuaded that He & His Friends make
them worse than He really is, & He will
appear in the House of Commons on mon-
day next or not, as it will best answer
His purpose, He has a communication
open with Lord Rockingham through Mr
Thos. Dundas & with Lord North through
Mr

Mr Dwyer; & He will act according to the
Information they bring him & the Bureau
He is able to make with either Party. - I
think it likely also that Lord North has
open'd a Communication with Mr G. Moore
through Mr J. Townshend or Lord Dart-
mouth, which makes Him very much in-
clined to His being Speaker in preference
to Mr Crowder; I shall take care to give
Mr Robinson the best Hints & Advice on
this subject I am able. If the Attorney
is to be made immediately Chief Justice
I hope that Lord North will lose no time
in securing Mr Mansfield.
