Mr. Fox

15 Feb 1789.

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Sir

I can not let the opportunity
of Grenville's going to town go by without
troubling your Royal Highness with a
few lines. The Reports of the great amendment
in the King's health will I doubt not be
made use of by Mr Pitt and his friends to
justify the restrictions, and consequently will
be much exaggerated; but I humbly submit
to your Royal Highness that it is wisest
for you to act precisely as if the King
were in the same state as he was a month
ago. To make any alteration in your

conduct would be a sort of confession
that your Royal Highness knew the
measures you were taking would be
disagreeable to him in case of his recovery.

I shall leave this place Thursday
and be at St. Anne's Hill Friday where I
shall stay Saturday and Sunday unless
your Royal Highness has any commands
for me in town.

Mr. Amhurst and General
Burgoyne desire me to present their
duties to your Royal Highness.
