I have this moment learnt that Mr. Pitt has announced to the House of Commons that a communication is to be made to Parliament from His Majesty on Tuesday next. Your Majesty will I am sure have observed that notwithstanding the impatience I must naturally feel to have a fit opportunity of submitting to His Majesty a faithful statement of my conduct, & my sentiments on the conduct of others, I have abstain'd from every idea of intruding on

His Majesty's attention, until the opinions of those who can best judge shall point out the proper time for submitting matters of business & public importance to his consideration. The notice given this Day, I conceive to ascertain this point, & as Your Majesty was graciously pleas'd to assure me that the Papers I lodg'd in your hands should be communicated to His Majesty, the moment it was fit for him to attend to public business, I request from Your Majesty to be inform'd whether the present is a proper time to make that communication, & when, in consequence,
