R. H. in my life I will say that no man lived 28 years in Business with more Credit than my selfe I thought it an Honour to be employed by his H. R. H. for which Reason I quide Business - Jaery soon parted with all my money for his H. R. H. and have Borrowd all that I can long ago and those which I Borrowd from says they will have thire money - now Sir I have Bills which I have accepted to the amount of Eleven Hundred pounds which comes due the 10th Instant March - and if I have not money to discharge them I must live London and they will make me a Bankrupt - I hope His Royal Highness will take it into his Consideration - I declare now if I had twenty thousand pounds his Royal Highness should be well come to it in stead of asking him for money though I am now five Hundred pounds worse then when I came to his Royal Highness -

between the first and tenth of aprile next I have Bills to pay which I have accepted to the amount of five thousand pounds

I hope his Royal Highness will not let me sink now for I have kept his Credit good in Every thing that I have had to do for him -
