Dear March 19 1793

Dear Brother

I have been so exceedingly occupied ever since I have been in these parts that I literally have not had it in my power to write to any person. The moment I landed I made Crawford wait to you as you desired it; since that time, except four days that I was at the Hague, I have been here, witness - a League of the enemy expecting every night to be attacked, however the French for some reason or other did not do it, as they on Saturday morning withdrew all their guns from their Batteries and raised the siege of Willemsstadt. On Sunday morning as I was going by water to Willemsstadt, we had the pleasure of commanding one of their Colonnas which was returning. I do not know whether he did them much mischief, but we put them into terrible confusion.

I had a letter yesterday from the Dutches

I was very much shocked at the account of Barrymore's

I confess that when she pleased, she could be exceedingly
company.

My Horses arrived today all pretty well except a
very nice Maggot Horse which I bought two months
ago of Chipping who died on board the Transport at
Sheerness
