Farnes May 28 1793

Dearest Brother

I should have answered your very kind
and affectionate letter by Crawford, but I was so
exceedingly hurried that it was out of my power.
The Battle of the 23 succeeded beyond our expectations
as the enemy has abandoned all his strong posts
round Lodi' and Valenceines, which are both now
completely blockaded and will be besieged in a few
few days. The sight in the morning when the fog
cleared up was the most beautifull that ever was
seen. Our friend Doyle had an opportunity of destroying
himself with the 14th Regiment in supporting a
Bataillon of Hungaria's Grenadiers, who had been
killed by the enemy's Cannon as they were throwing a
redoubt. The Hanoverian Life Guards behaved well

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remarkably well, they charged a very considerable Body
of French Cavalry, and overthrew them completely
unfortunately they pursued too far and lost a
very considerable number of Officers and men from
the Dragoons Riflemen, then an but two Officers
in the Regiment who have not been killed the one
of whom took a French Officer Prisoner. In my
opinion we were exposed to a very severe cannonade
but did us very little damage indeed, the Eleventh
Regiment of Light Dragoons behaved wonderfully
well and took eight Captains ledad by Lt. Amherst
and baggage in hand under the fire of all the enemy's
Batteries. The Duke left with me and informed me of
your goodness in conveying his children and spending the day
^{at the Bullion} with them. Both Ernest and Adolphus by their love to
you, they both behaved very well on the 23.
