Sir  
Lord Melbourne not being able to write himself, hopes you Royal Highness will excuse his taking the liberty to employ me to addess a few lines to your Royal Highness - he has been with much concern, the resolutions of Parliament which have caused the necessity of the arrangements you have now made, and it is with the greatest regret he is obliged to relinquish a situation he has held for so many years, with so much satisfaction, as it procured him constant opportunities of paying his respects to your Royal Highness & more frequent occasions of showing his

stronger attachment to your person &  
service than can be presumed he now  
allow'd him; when he is removed from it  
he deserves me with his duty, to offer  
his attendance & services of at any  
time they can be agreeable to your Royal Highness,  
without any other consideration  
than the pleasure he shall receive from  
being useful to your Royal Highness.  
The begs have to add that he shall  
ever remember with infinite gratitude  
the unvaried friendship & kindness  
you have shown him ever since the  
time he first had the honor of belonging to  
your Royal Highness's family, & feels  
particularly obliged for the earnestness  
with which you endeavoured a few months  
ago, to procure him an object for which  
he must ever be anxious, for the sake  
of his family, for whom he begs to claim  
your protection & hopes that by their

may merit your Royal Highness's  
favour - To be it unsuitable that by  
this he takes the liberty of addressing  
your Royal Highness in the free &  
friendly way you have so long allowed  
him, a he hopes he shall not be

to you sometimes at Carlton House

After all I hope you will allow me to say  
simply, how sorry I have been for  
all the arrangements made by Past  
as I always shall be fit any thing  
that diminishes your happiness &  
comfort - I have the power to be
