May I presume to beg Your Majesty will
be pleased to sign the Ratification of
the article with Denmark at the
Bottom of the Instrument which is
the usual Place of Signature, and
permit that at the Top to be
erased.

Your Majesty's gracious attention to the
Interests of the House of Lords will
I am persuaded be of essential
advantage to Your Service, as it is
there where the great support of
Government should naturally lie.
