Sir I did myself the honor of waiting on you for the purpose of mentioning a Circumstance, which should be immediately attended to, if considered of Interest by you and the Gentleman concerned. Hearing from the Honble Mr Andrew John that Mr Frywit was not provided with a Seat in Parliament, I thought it my duty to acquaint you that I have been at some pains to procure one for myself in the Bores of Callington, but as the influence of Mr R. Hayslop's name was in some measure necessary to the success of my Endeavour, I did think myself very much wanting, in respect and Duty to him, if I hesitated a moment in giving up to a Gentleman so closely connected with him as Mr Frywit every pretension to the place. I have had for some weeks past an able and intelligent Agent there who is every day urging me to go down. It was my intention to do so early next week, but under these Circumstances I shall cheerfully relinquish all my hopes of Parliamentary honors and contentedly wait a more convenient season. Mr John as much to Mr Clinton, has it in his power to render material Service and is perfectly well inclined to do so. But not a moment is to be lost. My Agent who is a Native of the Country and perfectly acquainted with his duty will I have no doubt effectually secure Mr Frywit's Election. I remain Sir your respectful Servant
