My Dear Friend

In this day week / Sun-

you have reported to me has so

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I am sure it is the best for us: had  
I should think it ultimately advantageous  
for the Prince also, were it not for  
the low opinion of Government which  
these tricks permanently impress on the  
Multitude. No sort of confidence can be  
attained on Edin's station so far. The  
approaching war will require great de-  
-wards on the People. They will be paid at

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least willingly; and if misfortune happens  
such a manly spirit will spread thro'  
a Country which we ought to recollect  
has been thro' the Militia, Penitents, &  
the Yeomanry trained to arms. If we are  
to contend with France, we have no chance

to the Government. What hope is there



of it at present. Will say your seal  
-ation must be an English Property. I  
can borrow it; & I have not had  
instructions.
