I found yours of the 12th and

night before last, for which I am much
obliged to you. — I think G. R. J. judges
quite rightly that this last paper requires
no answer, nor, if these things should ever be
to appear, can there be a better close to the
Correspondence. — You will observe that
they have the impudence to assert that they
have stated the principles on which they
have acted, though there is not in the
preceding Notes one word of the sort, &
that the Chancellor completely evades
replying to what the P. said about the
Interval ^{between March & June} and satisfies himself ^{with saying} that he

can not give further explanation consistent
with duty to H. M. though he particularly
had agreed with W. R. H. that there should
no longer be any Secrecy. I have no doubt
but these observations have already suggested
themselves to the P. and to yourself. -
