I have the honor to inform
your Royal Highness, that upon my arrival at Guildford
on Thursday Night, I waited upon Mr Manby, and
used every argument in my power to convince him
of what appeared to be his error, and
that there was the most apparent evidence against
Mr Denton in regard to the letter; that it was the
opinion of people of the highest respectability,
that in case of his being brought to a Court
Martial, he would most assuredly be broken -

words contained in the Letter your Royal Highness

a respectable person to be present as a witness -

Mr Marby has requested that I should allow
